J. E. HALL, 79, DIES TUESDAY

Retired Farmer, Father Of County School Head, Victim of Complications

James Emory (Poik) Hall, 79 years old, prominent McDowell man and father of Palmer L. Hall, Superintendent of Floyd county schools, died early Tuesday morning at the Beaver Valley hospital, Martin, following a week's illness of pneumonia, with heart complications.

Mr. Hall, a retired farmer and one of this section's best citizens, had been in ill health for more than 15 years. His fatal illness began July 21. He was a son of the late Owen and Judy Stumbo Hall and was born and reared on Prasure's Creek. He was twice married—first to Miss Mary Akers, of Mud Creek, and after her death to Miss Minda Moore, of Pike county, who died in 1921. He is survived by nine sons and daughters, in addition to Superintendent Hall; Mrs. Lee Hall, Russellville, O., M. J. and Butler Hall, both of Flemingsburg, Ky., Mrs. Bert Hall, McDowell, Mrs. Sheridan Crum, Orkney, Mrs. Sylvia Newsome, of Hill Hat, Mrs. C. D. Hall, Prestonsburg, Mrs. James W. Hopson, of Auxler, and Mrs. Maxie Hall, Tucson, Arizona. Also surviving are two brothers, Floyd Hall, of Greenup county, and Willard Hall, of Martin.

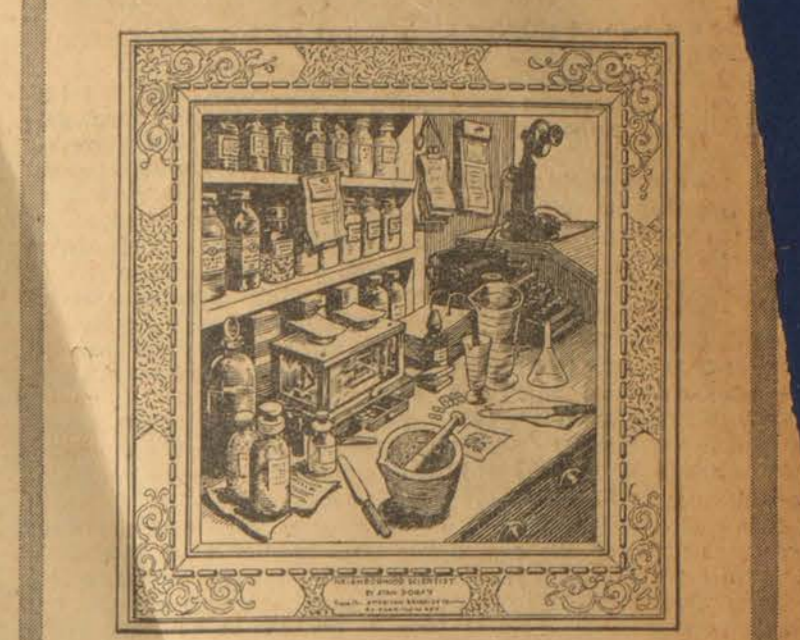

Labor Should Support Mason Dixon Lee Waterfield

MASON DIXON'S LINE
(Ky Post of June 21)

From various sources, it is reported that an interesting development is developing in the primary race of the Waterfield and Clements for the nomination for Governor of Kentucky.

There are signs around that labor will play a prominent role in the contest.

It is reported, the miners, for instance, will remember his (Waterfield's) championing of rock-dust legislation in the coal districts line up for the Clinton candidate.

From one labor leader this came a report that it is "Clements is on the ground and that Waterfield is forging ahead."

Turn of events, said the man, can be credited to labor. It was reported that some of the most

influential Kentucky labor leaders in the state have been irritated during the last two years because of some of the actions of Mr. Clements. Cited as such was the fact that labor was very much concerned about a bill to draft labor in February, 1945, and that Mr. Clements voted for this measure.

Again, say the leaders, when the President's labor disputes bill was pending in May, 1946, Clements again was credited with voting unfavorably toward labor. At that time one of the largest railroad organizations notified all of Kentucky locals that Clements was unworthy of labor's support for re-nomination to Congress in the 1946 primary. Reports are that a large segment of labor has not forgotten and that Mr. Clements has failed to mend his fences with many of the labor boys.

The labor leaders who reported to Mason Dixon also are recalling the Clements influence in the Senate of the

1946 legislature where, they say, he was "credited with assisting utilities and industry, but did not assist labor in getting the Unemployment Compensation Bill reported from a Senate committee." Then these leaders declare that "Waterfield, on the contrary, was very popular with labor because he always listened sympathetically and assisted strenuously when he was called upon by labor lobbyists, particularly the United Mine Workers with their safety bill, which carried the rock-dusting provision for which Waterfield was given the credit."

As one labor leader put it, "Labor feels that Kentucky has had too much too long of the ordinary political type Governor. They want a statesman. Labor embracing teachers' unions want adequate funds for education. They are tired of lip service. Waterfield was specific in how to get the funds by supporting as Speaker of the House, a liberal budget; while Clements is charged with opposing such liberality in the Senate."

Continuing, this same labor leader also had this to say: "As a candidate for Governor, Waterfield has stated he favored a five-cent tax on pari-mutuels which exists in other racing states and at a much higher rate in some states." Clements is accused by this labor man of "still generalizing, stating that more money is needed for education."

Labor is wise, of course, to the old story based on past experiences, that campaign chairmen, both state and county, play influential parts in the administration by the Governor they succeed in electing. Labor men, in some instances, say they are looking with dread at a great part of the Clements machine.

A consensus of labor opinion coming from several leaders can be summarized as follows: As a result of the present Congressional activities, labor is soberly and intelligently weighing all issues. Its members realize that such matters as housing, health, public welfare, education, taxes must be construed in the category of labor legislation. They realize further that politicians generally can be pressured—that power and money count most in the pressuring—and that a politician who will bend from pressure in one direction will bend in another direction and that the salvation of labor and the nation is the election of statesmen to office.

Labor also realizes that the definition of "statesman" is one who has the courage and the character to take a position, one who will talk, work, and vote in committees behind closed doors, the same as he talks, works, or votes for the record. A decade of observation has proved to labor that it may well have a man of such caliber as the candidate for Governor this year, some of the leaders declare.

One leader to whom Mason Dixon talked was quite vehement in his championship of Mr. Waterfield. He declared: "The line-up proves that the support of utilities, capital, industry, and other selfish groups is centered in Clements, while those rich in human principles, although poor in worldly goods, the real supporters of democracy, are gathered in the Waterfield camp." "I am the baby son, a twin, of a father who lived 94 years, two months and 20 days. Honor thy father and thy mother that thy days may be long upon the earth is the way he lived. When I was a boy I followed him to the woods to fell the trees and cut the lumber to build what was known for years as 'the May Chapel' in the community where I grew up.

"My father had five brothers. Every one of them lived beyond 75 years of age and he, with every one of them, was active in school work and church work in their respective communities and not one of them was ever suspected of violating the law. Three of them were ministers of the Gospel and one was a judge of the court.

"The name 'May' is labeled on the town where I grew up, Maytown.

"I practiced law for 35 years, diligently and industriously. I defended men and prosecuted men.

"I have held public office 24 years, including 16 years in Congress and I never received a dollar, directly or indirectly, that was not honestly earned and justly due. I have always lived this way.

"I was superintendent of my Sunday School. I was a teacher of the Bible class as long as I was in my home community and when I came to Washington, I attended the Baptist Church on 16th street regularly.

"I never tasted liquor, wine, or beer in my life, and I never used tobacco in any form because I had hoped in my old age that I would be able to enjoy life physically and not be diseased and contaminated in my system.

"I say this to the court now that I never did a thing while I was in Congress that today affects my conscience in the slightest. I never received a dime as compensation or otherwise for any service I rendered to anybody, including the Garssons and Freeman.

"I stand here today on the mercy of this court, and if I go to prison, my grandchildren will drop out of college and that may be a break of a golden chain that might lead to greatness.

"I say to this court, regardless of the verdict of the jury, regardless of what has been said in a malicious press, regardless of what may happen in the future, I have no fear of conscience and I am not guilty."

There followed appeals for Murray Garsson by Attorney Perry Howard, negro Republican national committeeman from Mississippi, and for Henry Garsson by himself and his attorney, former Pennsylvania Attorney General Charles J. Margiotti.

Murray Garsson, Howard said, lived through the trial on strychnine and would not survive three months' imprisonment because of a "hopeless" heart condition.

Margiotti dwelt at length on the outstanding production record made during the war by companies in which Henry Garsson was an officer.

"He is the most brilliant man I have ever met. His war record is outstanding. Above that, he is a gentleman and I'm proud to have defended him."

Said Henry Garsson:

"I want to dispose of two myths. One is the myth of 'the powerful chairman of the House Military Affairs Committee coming to my aid, obtaining favors for me. He may be powerful in formulating policies, but I knew then and know now that Congressmen have very little power in getting things accomplished in the executive agencies. I reported cases of racial discrimination against us to him because I thought he should know of anything hindering the war effort.

"The second myth is that I made a lot of money. The end of the war left me in a financial position worse than at the start. Every cent I made was reinvested in the companies. I'm in debt today."

The court, after conference with attorneys, acknowledged that all

three defendants are unable to pay fines. The judge said also that he would consider the three counts of the indictment on which they were convicted as one offense.

"Therefore, the sentence in the case of each defendant will be a minimum prison term of eight months, a maximum of two years."

The new charges made by Margiotti in the early stages of today's hearings, involved alleged failure of the jurors to observe the court's instruction to refrain from reading newspaper accounts of the trial, and other misconduct by the panel.

Members of the jury admitted to a defense investigator, he said, that they had read what the attorney termed "prejudicial and distorted facts, misleading and inaccurate quotations of the court" in Washington newspaper accounts of the 11-week-long trial.

Further, he charged members of the jury had discussed and prejudged the case among themselves before the close of the evidence, that "one or more" of them had reasonable doubts of the guilt which they surmised improperly to accommodate the majority.


He said also that it is difficult at best for defendants to receive a fair trial away from their home communities before a Washington jury containing many government workers predisposed to favor the government's case.

"After 73 days of trial, after 12 hours of closing arguments, two hours of instructions by the court, this jury took only an hour and 50 minutes to return a verdict. One juror said they agreed in 40 minutes. Why, they couldn't even read the indictment in that length of time," Margiotti charged.

These and a score of other assignments of error by the court will be filed with the Circuit Court of Appeals within 40 days. Within 30 days thereafter, the defense must file its brief. Margiotti estimated that the case will come up for argument late in the fall. If the defendants are unsuccessful in the Circuit Court of Appeals, the case will be taken to the Supreme Court, he said.

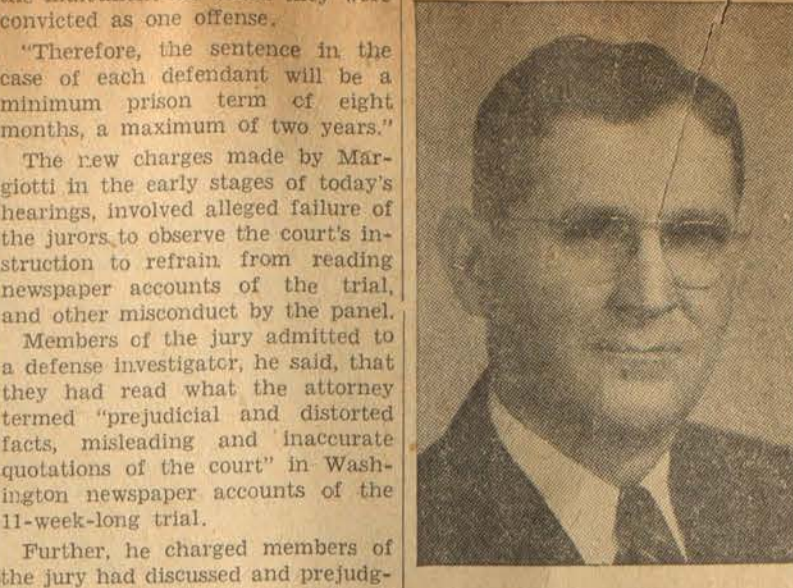

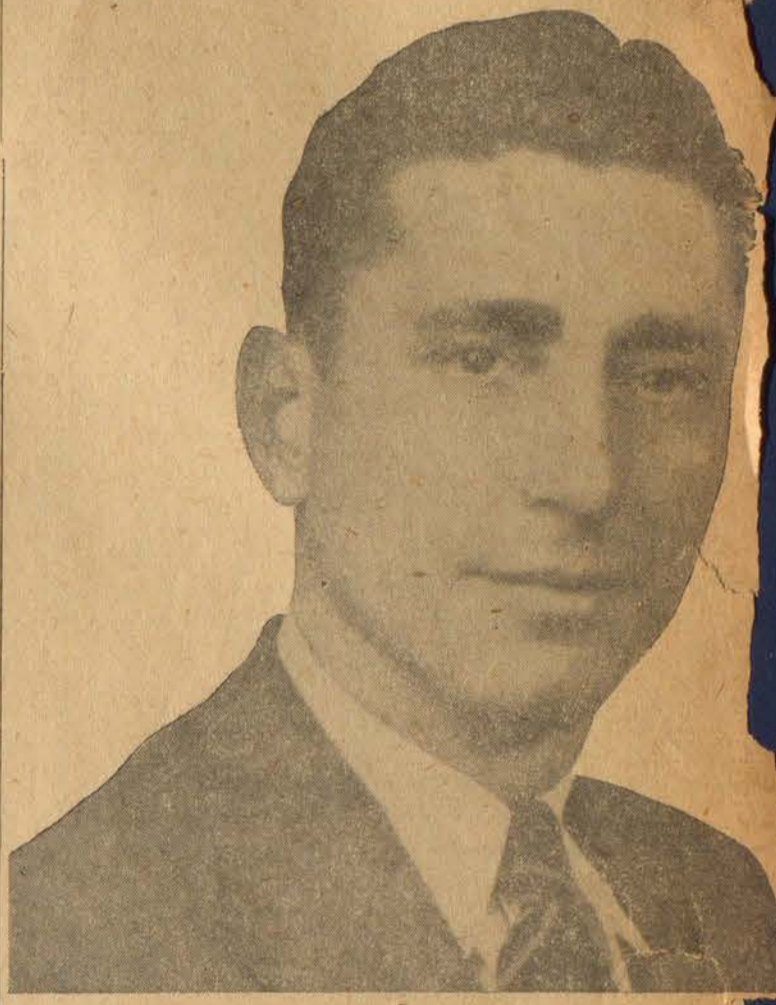



Only Five Per Cent Of Vets Reinstating Insurance Dropped

While reinstatement of National Service Life Insurance is progressing in Kentucky at the rate of \$2,500,000 a week, only 5 per cent of the veterans who dropped the insurance when separated from the armed services have reinstated it. Harry W. Farmer, regional manager of the Veterans Administration office, said value of insurance reinstated by 8,741 veterans since the drive started February 3 was \$60,323,000. He estimated 166,000 veterans in the state have not reinstated the insurance.

Under a recent extension, the insurance may be reinstated without physical examination up to January 1. The previous deadline was August 1.

The insurance may be reinstated in multiples of \$500 from \$1,000 to \$10,000. It may be converted to any of the type of policies issued by insurance companies. It carries loan values after the first year up to 94 per cent of cash value.

Farmer invited all veterans interested in reinstating insurance or converting it from term to one of the standard policies to contact any local office in the state.

Thomas E. Allen, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Allen, of Martin, is one of 14 University of Kentucky students making a five-week study of geological phenomena in the mountains of Virginia.

Dr. A. C. McFarlan, head of the UK geology department, and Dr. Vincent E. Nelson, member of the departmental staff, are leading the field trip which is aimed to afford the students opportunities for practical application of the theory they have learned in campus classrooms.

The students are spending one month at a field camp in the vicinity of Pulaski and Witheville, Va., where they are working out the regional geology of the area. Six quarter hours credit is given for the experience gained in the course.

The party is also observing and inspecting geological spots of interest while en route to and from camp. Among the stops included are Birmingham, Ala., iron ores; Tate, Ga., marble quarries; Haley, Ga., antique marble; Spruce Pine and other North Carolina towns, pre-cambrian igneous and metamorphic rocks and mineral deposits of the Blue Ridge and Piedmont country; and Cranberry, N.C., magnetite iron ore.

Mr. Allen is a sophomore in the College of Arts and Sciences at the University and is a graduate of Martin high school.

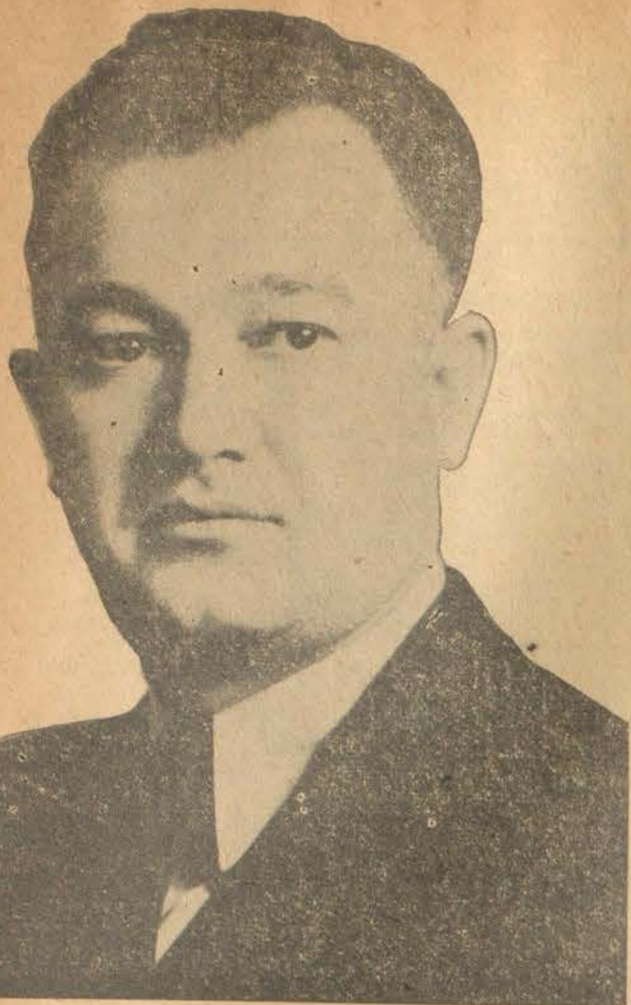

NEWS FOR THE VETERAN

ONLY HALF OF APPROVED VETS TAKE G.I. TRAINING

Slightly less than half of the World War II veterans in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky who have applied for education or job-training benefits provided by the government actually have entered into any type of training program, the Veterans Administration reports.

Officials at the VA's tri-state Branch Office in Columbus, O., said 605,926 applications for education or job-training have been approved, while 48.5 per cent, or 294,100 veterans, have taken advantage of their benefits.

Education and job-training benefits are available to eligible World War II veterans under provisions of the G.I. Bill and the Vocational Rehabilitation Act.

Of Ohio's 770,000 World War II veterans, 325,636 have been approved for training benefits and 150,000 actually have commenced training courses.

In Michigan, 184,471 of the state's 564,000 World War II veterans have been approved for training and 105,000 have started training programs.

Of Kentucky's 270,000 World War II veterans, 95,769 have made application and have been approved for training, while 38,147 have entered into training courses.

VA ADVISES VETS ON ARMED FORCE STUDY

Any correspondence or self-teaching courses which veterans may have taken while in the armed forces through the U.S. Armed Forces Institute or University Extension Correspondence Courses, or courses taken under the Army Education Program, do not reduce in any way the amount of education to which they may be entitled under the G.I. Bill.

Officials at the Veterans Administration Branch Office in Columbus, O., said that such courses undoubtedly earned veterans definite credits which may be applied on any course they may take as veterans under the G.I. Bill.

VA OPERATES CANTEEN SERVICE IN HOSPITALS

The Veterans Administration now is operating its own canteen service

in each of the nine VA hospitals in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky. It was announced this week by Dale C. Cummings, chief of the Canteen Service for the VA's tri-state Branch Office in Columbus, Ohio.

VA operation of the canteens was authorized last August by Congress, which provided a \$4,000,000 revolving fund to finance the program. Until taken over by VA, the canteens were operated by private concessionaries under contract with VA.

VA operation of the canteen service was consummated recently with the opening of new canteens in the hospitals at Dearborn, Mich., and Outwood, Ky. Other VA hospitals having canteens are those at Fort Custer, Mich., Cleveland, Dayton, Brecksville and Chillicothe, Ohio, and Lexington and Louisville, Ky. VA also will operate a canteen at Ft. Thomas, Ky., when the new medical rehabilitation center there is opened.

VA operated its canteens along lines of the army PXs and the navy ship stores. Veteran patients may purchase at reasonable prices tobacco products, toilet articles, miscellaneous food items such as sandwiches and light meals sold at snack bars, and the services provided by barber and beauty shops, tailor shops and soda fountains.

Special orders and a special shopping service for items of necessity are provided for bed-ridden patients.

Sales in hospitals are limited to hospitalized veterans, their friends and relatives who visit them, employees and members of their families who live at the stations. Sales to persons who do not reside at the stations are limited to items for consumption or use on the premises.

Profits are kept at a minimum and any that accrue are turned over to the U.S. Treasury. VA's canteen service does not compete with private small businesses in the communities where VA hospitals are located. Congressional authorization restricts sales and provides for constant supervision and inspection to prevent abuses.

VA RULES ON JOBLESS PAY FOR STUDENT VETS

Veterans who have been attending school under the G.I. Bill may not use unemployment allowances as summer vacation pay between school terms, Veterans Administration officials emphasized recently.

VA officials pointed out that only veterans actively seeking and willing to accept any suitable work may legally receive unemployment allowances. Even then, veterans are not eligible for unemployment pay during any period for which they receive subsistence allowances under the educational and training provisions of the G.I. Bill.

VA officials said that veterans remaining in school during the summer will continue to receive subsistence allowances, but payments are stopped for those who interrupt their studies during the summer months.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. I am a widow of a World War II veteran and want to buy a home. Can I obtain a guaranty loan from VA?

A. No. The privilege is limited to veterans of World War II.

Q. Can I obtain a guaranty loan to purchase household furnishings?

A. No.

Q. Can I go to school under the G.I. Bill while I am taking on-the-job training under the Act?

A. Yes, you can go to school under the G.I. Bill while you are taking on-the-job training if the school course is determined to be related to the on-the-job course. The government will pay your tuition.

Q. Will the government pay for tools and other equipment while I am taking on-the-job training under the G.I. Bill?

A. Yes, if the tools are necessary for successful pursuit and completion of the course of training and are required by all trainees.

Q. I have been informed that my pension will be reduced in 60 days. What can I do to prevent this reduction?

A. You may submit additional evidence to show the reduction is not warranted.

Q. Must I show that I have had experience in business to get a guaranty of loan for business purposes?

A. The law provides "that ability and experience of the veteran, and the conditions under which he proposes to pursue such business or occupation are such that there is a reasonable likelihood he will be successful."

VA Representative To Skip Wayland Visit

It was announced this week by Estel L. McKinney, officer in charge of the Veterans Administration contact office here, that Donald K. Beverly, itinerant contact representative, will not visit the Wayland itinerant office in accordance with the regular schedule on Aug. 7. Unless announced otherwise, the usual visits on the first and third Thursdays of each month will be resumed August 21.

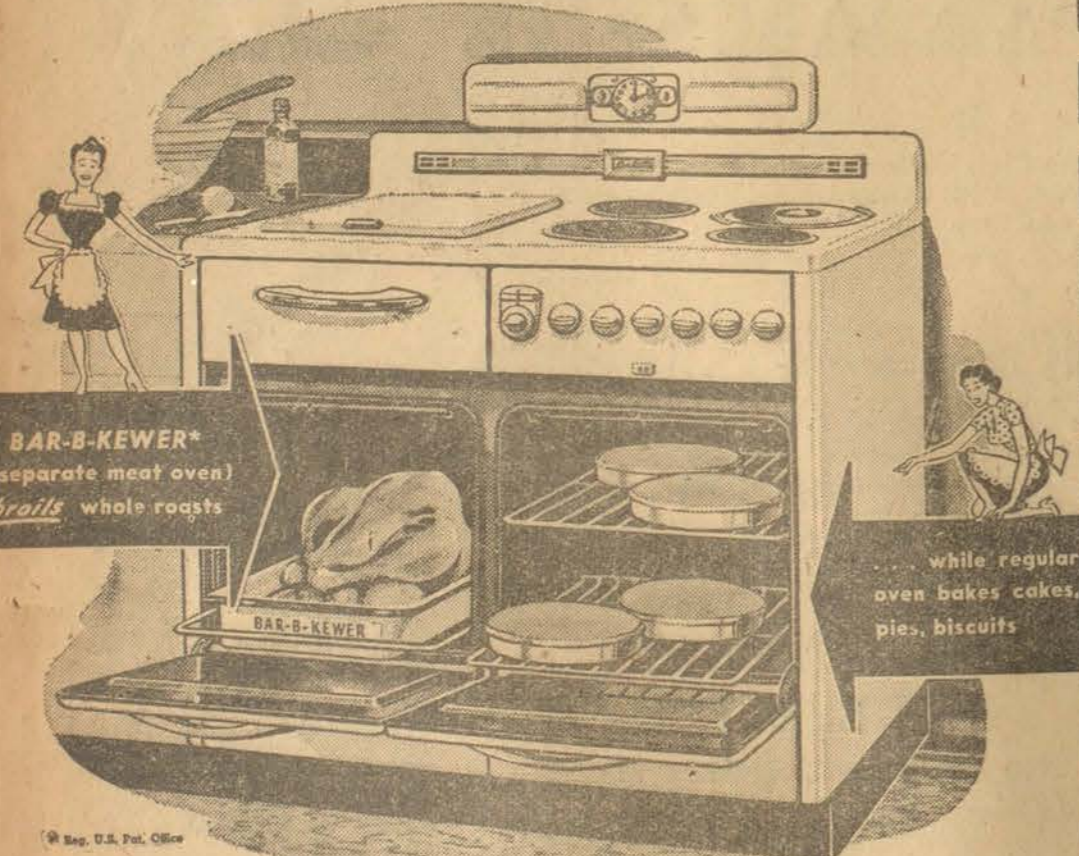

44 ways To get "Something for Nothing"

The railroads have received 44 "rules" demands from the leaders of the operating unions... representing engineers, firemen, conductors, trainmen and switchmen. They say they are seeking only changes in working conditions—NOT a wage increase.

More Money For Less Work

But what kind of rules are being asked for? Twenty-eight of them would compel railroads to pay more money for the same, or less work; 7 would require additional and unnecessary men to do the same work; the rest would bring about changes in operating practices at increased cost.

For Instance:

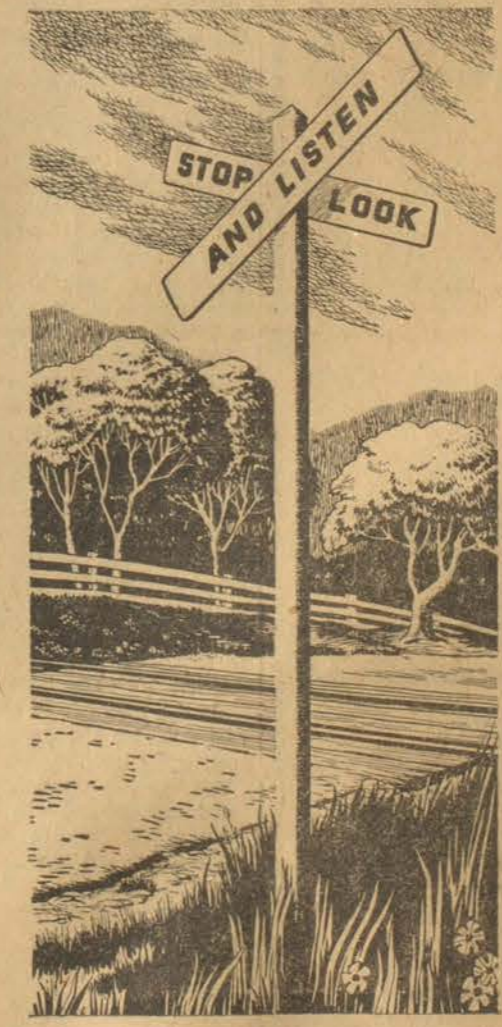
The Union leaders demand additional train and engine crews on Diesel-powered trains—one full crew for every power unit in the locomotive. A freight train hauled by a 4-unit Diesel would have to carry 4 engineers, 4 firemen, 4 conductors, and at least 8 brakemen, or a total of 20 men instead of 5.

"Made Work"—Sheer Waste

The Union leaders demand that full-length freight trains be cut to about half their length, even though such trains are most efficient for low-cost service to you. This rule would call for twice as many locomotives, would double the number of trains, and make accidents more likely.

Additional equipment, yards, and other facilities required to take care of these short trains would cost hundreds of millions. What the Union leaders really want is to make more jobs.

The Union leaders demand that when a crew in one class of service perform incidental service of another class, they will be paid not less than a day's pay for each class, even though all service is performed as a part of the same day's



ductors and trainmen be reduced from 150 to 100 miles, which would have the effect of increasing their pay 50%. Such a run often takes only two or three hours!

You Can't Afford This Waste

Demands like these are against the interests of the whole American people, who depend on railroad service for nearly everything they eat, wear and use.

These rules would cost A BILLION DOLLARS annually—a gigantic waste which neither the railroads nor the country can afford.

Railroad workers are good citizens and good employes, with pride in their calling. Their record during the war was outstanding. We do not believe they fully understand the "featherbed" rules which the Union leaders are demanding. 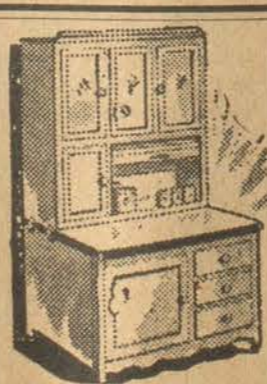

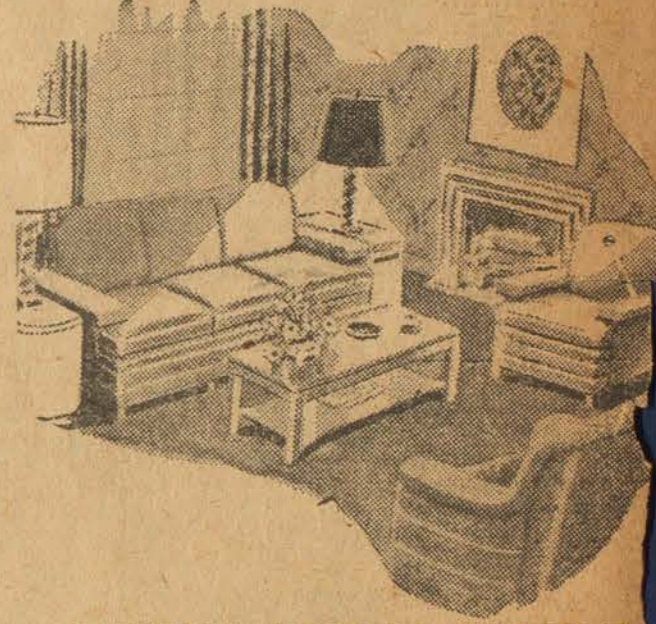
