939 PUPILS ENROLL HERE 333 in High School At Opening Tuesday; Cafeteria Feeds 700

Nine hundred thirty-nine youngsters ranging from kindergarten age to the 1st year of high school were enrolled in the Prestonsburg schools on opening day, Tuesday, Chalmers H. Frazier, city superintendent of schools, said. The grades may be augmented by enrollment of as many as 20 returning late from vacations, he said. Wednesday, 333 were in high school and 606 in the grades, including 25 kindergarten pupils.

600 VETERANS VISIT BANKS, CASH BONDS

Estimated \$120,000 Worth of \$750,000 Issued Are Cashed

Terminal leave bonds worth not less than \$750,000 were issued to Floyd county's 5,000 veterans of World War II, but by Wednesday morning, a day after banks began exchanging currency for the bonds, 600 of the vets had cashed \$120,000 worth of that total.

This estimate was reached after the three banks of the county had supplied approximate figures. Each bank--The Bank Josephine and The First National here, and The First Guaranty at Martin--estimated it had cashed 200 bonds. The First National and First Guaranty estimated the average value of each bond at \$200; the Bank Josephine gave a slightly lower figure.

The federal government has urged veterans to hold on to their bonds, and bankers have pointed out that the 2 1/2 per cent interest rate paid on the bonds is higher than the banks could pay. It also was pointed out that the veteran may hold his bond till a later date and cash them when needed. Some veterans have "cashed up," acting under the impression they had to convert the bonds into cash at once.

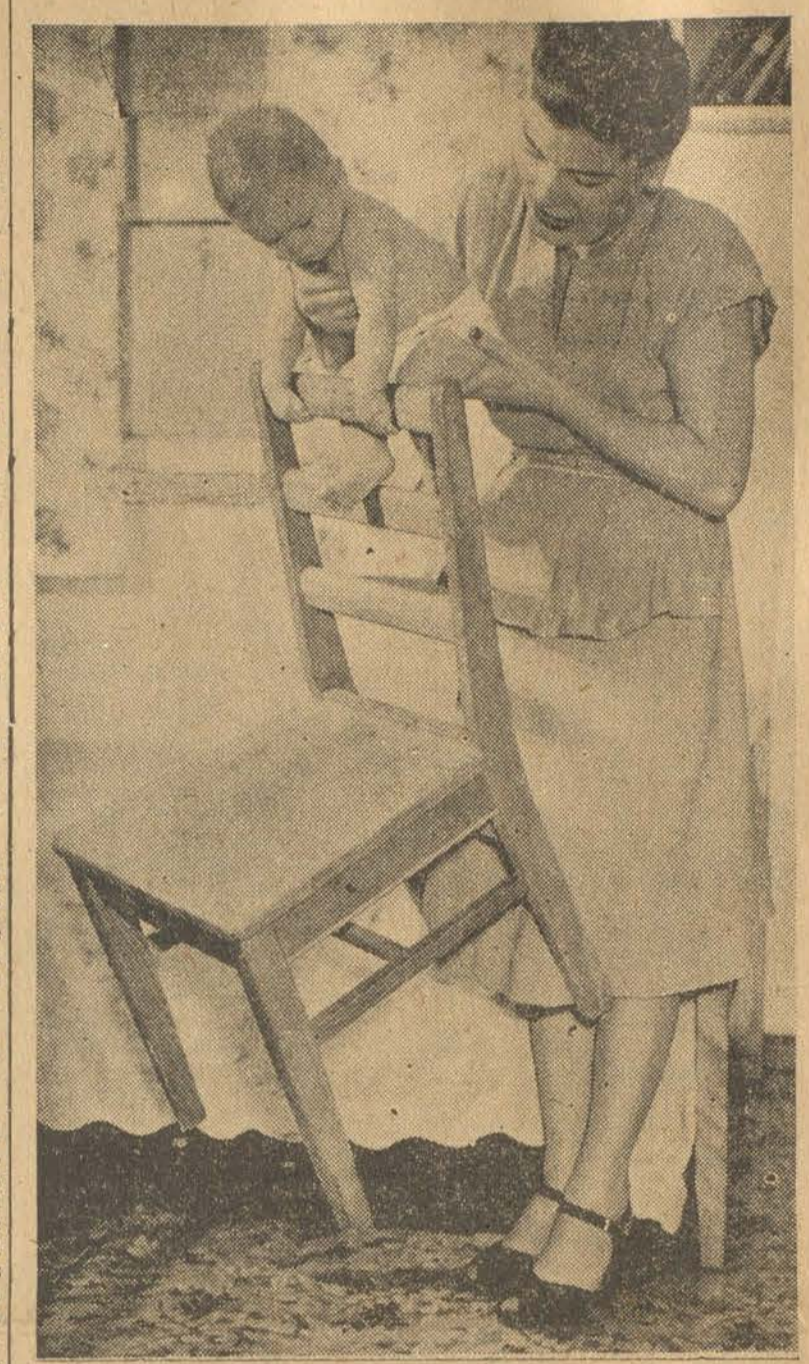

Victim of Fishing Trip Tragedy in Michigan Buried at Harold

An outing on Lake Franz, Ypsilanti, Mich., ended last Friday in tragedy as one Floyd county native was drowned and another barely escaped with his life.

The boat from which they were fishing partially capsized when a member of the party caught a fish and, rising to his feet, fell into the lake. As the boat filled with water others fell or jumped out. Edward McCowan was the only member of the party who was unable to swim.

The victim was graduated from Betsy Layne high school and after 17 months' wartime service entered the College of Pharmacy, University of Michigan. He had completed two years of his course and was a summer student at the time of the tragedy.

JUROR DEARTH SLOWS COURT

Petit Panel Incomplete Till Wednesday; Guilty Pleas Entered by Three

A busy Floyd county, with its citizens drawing wages and salaries beside which the juror's daily stipend of \$3 becomes insignificant, taxed the resources of the Floyd circuit court this week in its efforts to get going.

Not until Wednesday morning and only after the regular panel had been exhausted and names of 63 others rolled from the jury wheel and summoned for service was the No. 2 petit jury completed.

Those receiving sentences, their offenses and penalties exacted follow: Dee Carroll, carrying concealed deadly weapon, \$50 and 10-day jail term; Edgar Disls, detaining a woman, \$200; Claude Hays, drunkenness, \$10.

SAYS PITTYING JURORS HURT COURT WORK

Four Indictments Name Floyd Men for Murder; Two Trial Dates Set

Special attention to violations of the laws designed to curb the liquor traffic, the carrying of concealed deadly weapons and drunk driving was asked of the grand jury by Circuit Judge Edward P. Hill in his instructions on the opening Monday of the September court term.

Aside from his emphasis on the need of finding and indicting law violators, Judge Hill stressed the importance of trial juries exacting the penalties deserved by violators. "I have spent 180 days now on the bench in criminal court and there hasn't been much accomplished," he said. "We still seem to have about as many cases as ever. The trouble is, juries listen to hard-luck stories of the defendants, turn them loose or give them light sentences, with the result that they soon are back in the courts."

J. M. Turner, of Wayland, was named foreman of the grand jury. Of the 12 indictments returned by the grand jury up till noon Wednesday, four named Floyd countians on murder charges and six alleged child desertion. Murder indictments returned:

Charles Bates, fatal shooting at Wheelwright Junction of Theodore Scott, \$10,000 bond asked; Dewey Gibson, slaying of Taylor Blackburn on Abner Fork; Earl Blackburn and Albert Hall, Floyd officers, in the slaying at Wheelwright of Bill Bryant, bond \$10,000 each asked; William Johnson, wife of William Hamilton on Mud Creek, bond set at \$10,000.

Wilburn Johnson and Cleveland Johnson were also accused by the grand jury of obstructing public justice. Freddie Hamilton testified that they paid him \$5 to give false testimony here in a preliminary hearing held by County Judge Alex. L. Davidson of the Hamilton slaying case. Marvin and Bill Johnson were accused in an indictment of damaging railway track by throwing a switch and causing a train to wreck. ## Conley-Fairchild Vows Said at Salyersville

(Continued from page one)

On the wooded hillside overlooking the spot where Daniel Boone spent the winter of 1767, before he had ever looked upon the Great Meadow that is the Bluegrass, the Princess Elkhorn Coal Company has built a cabin for Daniel Boone Troop No. 143, Boy Scouts of David.

And the Scout troop itself is distinguishing itself by work no less important.

The park it is preparing in the timbered area surrounding the cabin is now almost complete—woodland trails, rustic bridges across ravines, benches and tables and all—and next on the troop's agenda will be erection of a marker on the site of Boone's lean-to, which has been located by students of history as having been within a few feet of the David Community Church.

The marker will be similar in construction to the memorial in the courthouse yard here to Greenville R. Davidson and Floyd county Confederate veterans, and a fitting plaque will be provided by the coal company.

This undertaking will be the first to memorialize an event which probably spared Daniel Boone from starvation or death by freezing while he was en route through the hills to the Bluegrass. Overtaken by winter and heavy snowfall, he and a companion, Kentucky historians record, built a rude lean-to near a salt spring at what is now David. The shelter was adequate, the hunting fine—they shot deer, bear and other game as it came to the spring for salt.

The Boy Scout troop of 21 youngsters is led by the Rev. W. E. Durham, Scoutmaster and pastor of the David Community Church. It was organized last year with a membership of 12 and the coal company immediately began its plans for a Scout cabin. To help decorate the interior of the cabin, David L. Francis, Princess Elkhorn president, donated a "hog" rifle with its powder horn and deer skin shot pouch, all said to be more than a hundred years old. Mr. Francis also procured from the Queen City Coal Company, Cincinnati, 10 sets of deer antlers for the cabin.

With such encouragement, the troop set to work on its park which is complete, even to its **Lover's Leap**, a jutting rock which needs only a legend. At the site of the cabin the boys are grading a parking space. Two hundred yards above the cabin, on a flat, the troop has finished a council circle to which they march in torchlighted procession on meeting nights.

The troop won a plaque this year as the outstanding troop at Camp Arrowhead. This plaque also is among the cherished trophies of the cabin's interior—and there will be others, the boys declare.

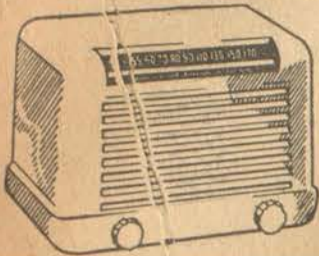

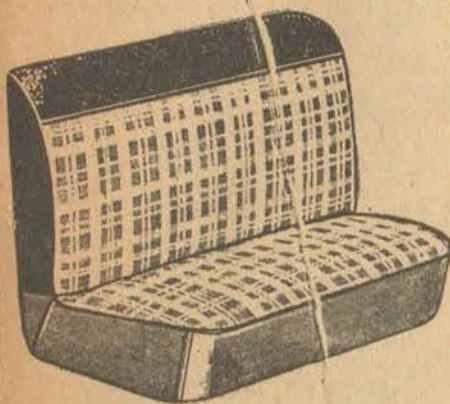

## Floyd County Woman, Partially Paralyzed, Shows Ohioans How Not To "Give Up"

An outstanding example of sheer grit, Floyd county brand, transplanted from the hills to the broad fields of Ohio, was discovered recently near McGuffey, O., by Dr. M. T. Dotson, of Prestonsburg.

There he found his sister-in-law, 73-year old Vina Shepherd Dotson, widow of Alex Dotson, living alone, her left side paralyzed as the result of a cerebral hemorrhage suffered in June, 1942. She dragged her left leg in walking about, she could swing her left hand and catch it with her right but otherwise could not use it.

But was the former Floyd county woman helpless, discouraged and demanding the attentions needed by an invalid of advanced age? She was not.

When Dr. Dotson arrived at her home, three miles out in the country from McGuffey, she was mowing the lawn, the handpowered lawnmower actually supporting her and making locomotion less difficult. The 60- by 60-foot lawn was neat, its flower beds weedless and bright. Nearby was the half acre garden and its beans, corn, peas, cabbage, onions and the like that she, unaided, had planted and hoed. More than that, she does her own washing and ironing; the cellar is well-stocked with her canned fruits and vegetables. Every household chore is done by her, and the Prestonsburg physician marveled at her efficiency.

When Mrs. Dotson suffered the stroke, five years ago, her physician advised her not to give up, and she remained as active as possible under his instructions. But it was not his idea that she live alone and do all her work.

Mrs. Dotson, a daughter of the

late Johnny Shepherd and a native of Middle Creek, has grownup children who would stay with her or who would take her home with them. But she prefers to live alone, to do her own work—and never to give up the fight.

Mrs. Daisy Margaret Potter, 51 years old, mother of Mrs. Betty McSurley, of McDowell, died Saturday at her home at Fraze, Pike county, a victim of pulmonary tuberculosis from which she had suffered for the last eight months.

Besides her daughter at McDowell, she is survived by six sons, three daughters, five brothers and four sisters. Burial was made in the family cemetery on Elkhorn Creek Monday.

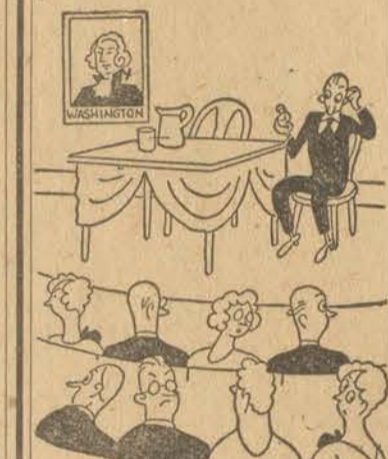

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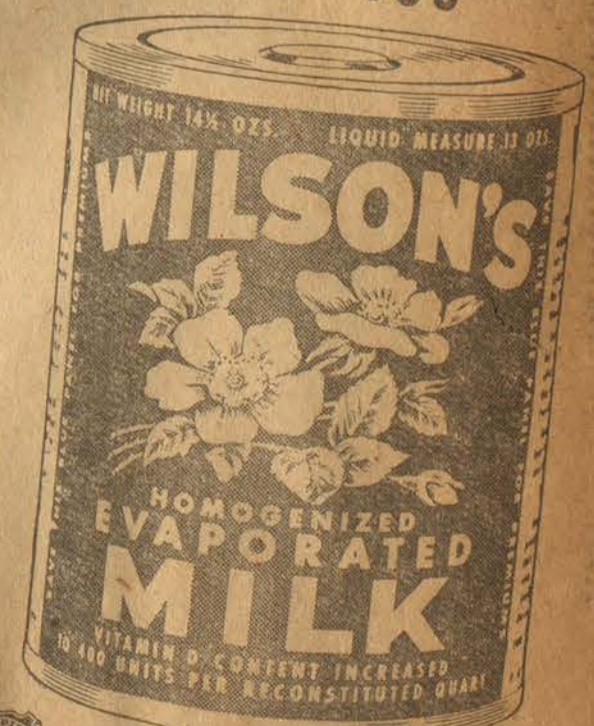

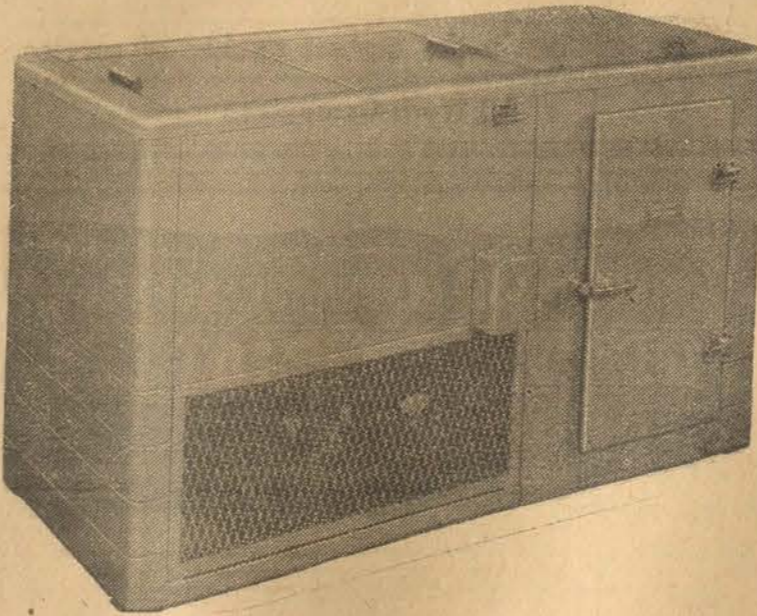

## INFORMATION OF INTEREST TO VETERANS

(No. 4 of Series)

Answers to the 10 questions that veterans ask most frequently about hospitalization at government expense were announced this week by Veterans Association.

The veterans asked the questions in a survey that VA conducted recently to learn how much they know about their federal benefits. The questions and answers follow:

Q. Just which veterans are entitled to hospitalization in a VA hospital?

A. Veterans with service-connected disabilities have top priority for VA hospital care. Veterans with non-service-connected ailments may be hospitalized under the existing law if beds are available and if they say they cannot afford treatment elsewhere.

Q. How and where do I apply for hospitalization?

A. See your nearest VA contact representative or apply at a VA regional office or hospital. A letter addressed to the nearest VA office will suffice. In an emergency, call the nearest VA office, collect. VA representatives will then handle the necessary application and other forms.

Q. Do I have to pay anything for VA hospitalization?

A. No. All charges are borne by the federal government.

Q. Can I go to a private hospital in my home town and have VA pay the bill?

A. Yes, if you have a service-connected disability and receive VA's approval first.

Q. What papers should I bring with me when I apply for VA hospitalization?

A. Bring your honorable discharge certificate or a certified copy. If you already have been granted compensation for a service-connected disability, all you need is your "C" number.

Q. Will VA pay for the medical care of my dependents?

A. No. Under existing laws, only veterans are eligible for VA hospital care.

Q. Do I have a choice as to which hospital I will go to?

A. Generally, a veteran is assigned to the hospital nearest his home. However, crowded conditions in certain hospitals, or the type of injury or disease suffered by the veteran and similar conditions might result in the veteran being assigned to a special center or hospital in another section of the country.

Q. Can my relatives visit me while I am in the hospital?

A. Yes. All VA hospitals have special hours set aside each day for visitors, the same as civilian hospitals.

Q. Will my disability compensation be taken away from me if I am hospitalized in a VA hospital?

A. If you are single, your compensation will be paid you in full for the first six months but, if your treatment or care extends beyond six months, your monthly benefit payment may not exceed 50 percent of the regular rate, or \$30 per month, whichever is the greatest. If the regular rate is \$30 or less, it will not be reduced. Upon discharge by VA you will receive a lump sum equal to the amount that was withheld after the six-month period. If you have a dependent or dependents, your compensation payments will continue at the full rate for the entire period of your hospitalization.

## TAXPAYERS

Many of you have not listed your property for taxation. It is your duty to do this before Sept. 1, 1947. Please attend to this duty at once.

Following is copy of the law governing listing of property for taxation purposes:

Date of assessment of property; when, where and by whom listed; in whose name assessed.

(1) All taxable property shall be assessed and valued as of July 1 of each year unless otherwise provided by law. It shall be the duty of all persons owning or having any interest in any personal property having a taxable situs in this state to list or have listed between July 1 and September 1 of each year such property with the county tax commissioner of the county where it is located, except as otherwise provided by law. All persons in whose name property is properly assessed shall remain bound for the tax, notwithstanding they may have sold or parted with it.

(2) Real property or any interest therein shall be listed in the county or district where it is located by the owner of the first freehold estate therein, and it shall be assessed without reference to conflicting title. If the owner fails to list the property, the county tax commissioner may swear witnesses in order to ascertain the person in whose name to make the list.

(3) Real property shall be assessed in the name of the owner, if ascertainable by the tax commissioner, otherwise in the name of the occupant, if ascertainable, and otherwise to "unknown owner." The undivided real estate of any deceased person may be assessed to the heirs of such person without designating them by name.

**Success with Pike In Herrington Lake Reported by Division**

The little wall-eyed pike in Herrington Lake are growing up. First reports on the survival of a great number of the approximately 880,000 pike fry which were placed in the lake in May have been received by the Division of Game and Fish from fishermen in this body of water. They report that many of the small fish, now about four inches long, have been captured on worm-baited hooks. The pike were released by the Division with the belief that this cannibalistic fish, which is particularly fond of gizzard shad, would eliminate this species to a large degree thereby depriving the bass in the lake of an abundant food supply.

The Division determined, after tests, that the lake contained plenty of bass but that they would not succumb to the lures of fishermen simply because there was an over-supply of shad, in all sizes, on which they fed. By decreasing this source of food, the Division believes, the bass will again bite and the lake will return to its former status as one of the best fishing spots in the South.

Catching of the small pike in the lake has proved to the Division, Earl Wallace, director, explains, that the pike project is feasible. In a few years, when the pike are larger and their appetite increases, they are expected to devour an immense number of shad and fishing in this lake should be improved by then, the director pointed out.

Minor Clark, superintendent of fisheries for the Division, announced that plans are under way by the Division to obtain muskellunge fish to be distributed in the lake this fall. It is hoped that they, like the pike, will feed on the shad and besides decreasing this type fish will provide sport for fishermen. Also efforts are being made to secure a number of larger pike for distribution in the lake this fall, Mr. Clark said.

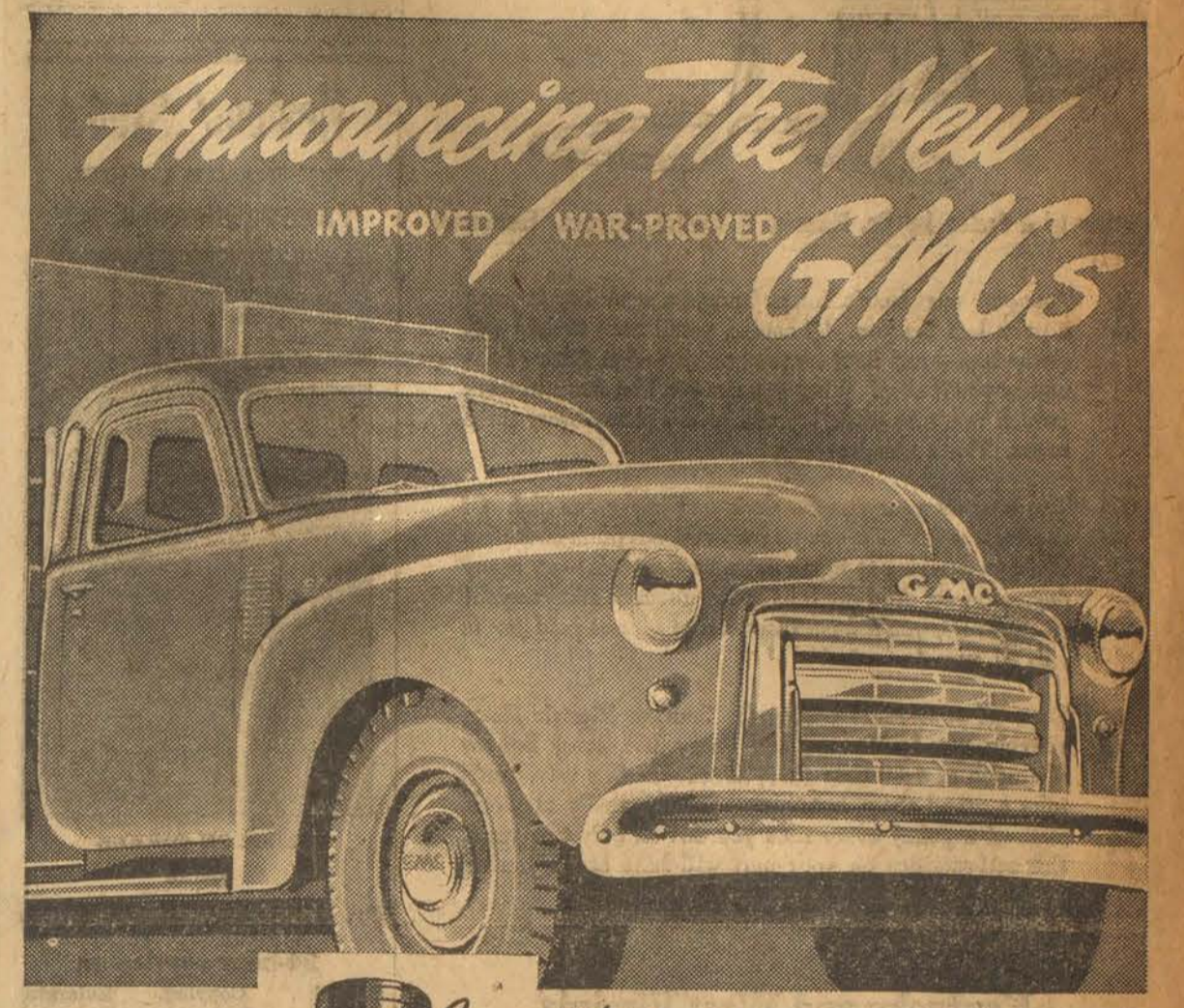

Amherst, Mass., Sept. 1 (Spl.)—Four junior growers from Floyd county are competing in the seventh annual National Junior Vegetable Growers Association production-marketing contest, Professor Grant B. Snyder, of Massachusetts State College, adult advisor of the Association, has announced.

These young gardeners are competing with other junior growers from 43 states for a share of the \$6,000 scholarship fund provided annually for the Association by A. & P. Food Stores. 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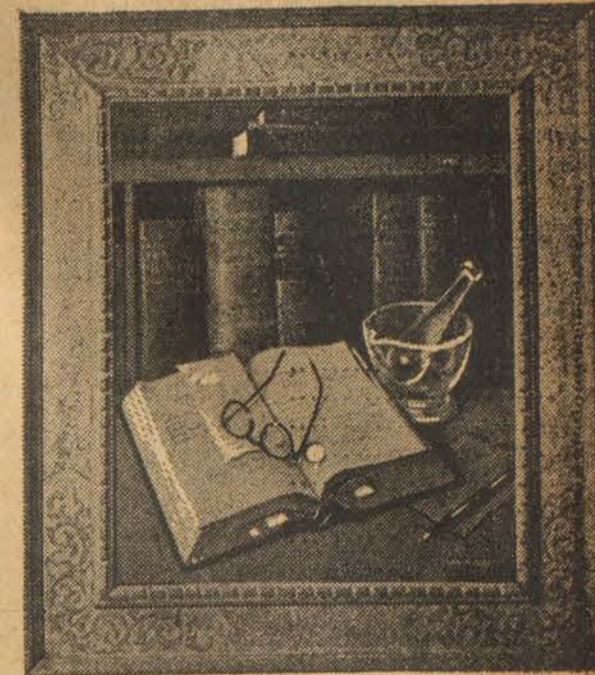
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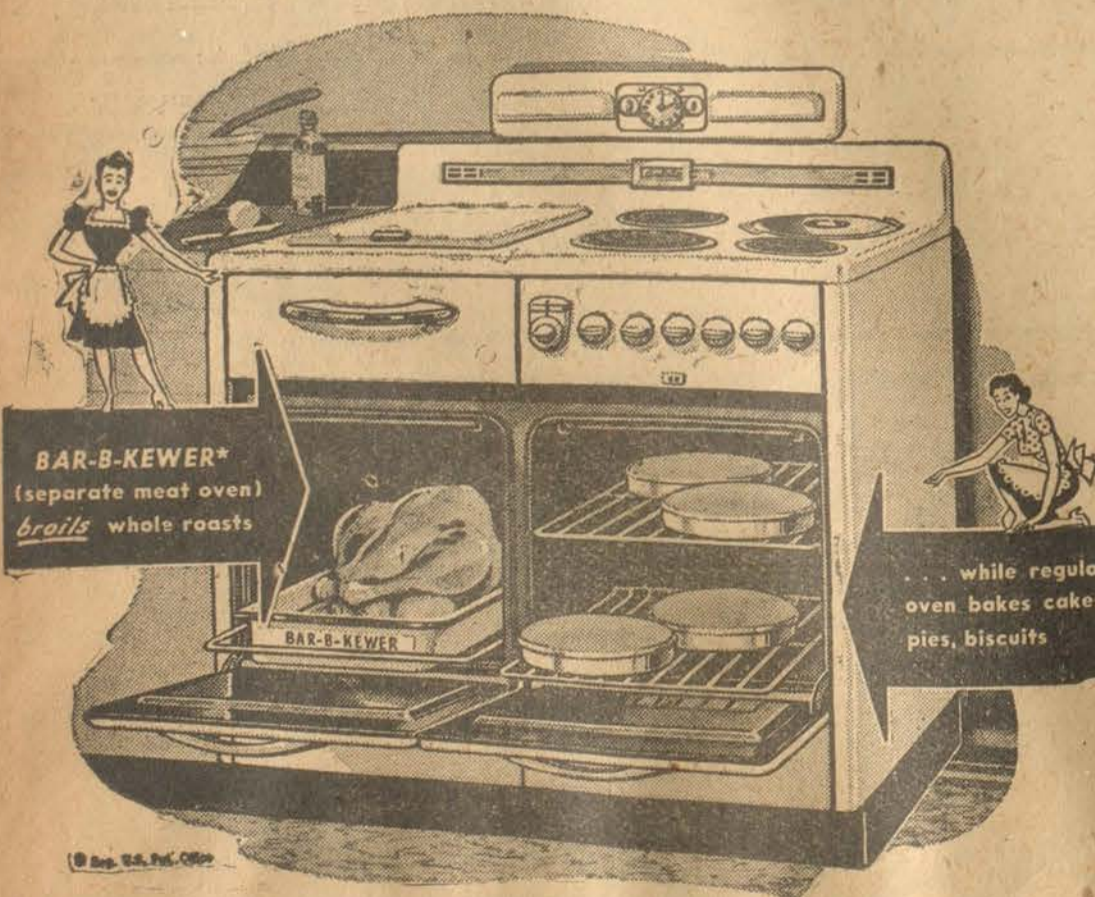
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
