I don't know if excerpts from these old records at the courthouse here interest readers of this newspaper, but I find them irresistible, and so from time to time I pass them along in the form of paragraphs for this column or, on occasion, as feature stories. Outstanding court cases and the like are difficult to find among these old records, with time having a habit of running cut on us, but this one caught my eye.

It has to do with a contract one Stephen Tolar, assignee of John Nichols, claimed one Zacharia Johnson entered into, back in 1816, with Nichols. Because Johnson had not fulfilled "a special covenant to pay Nichols 100 barrels of good, merchantable salt in good barrels and deliver the same to Nichols in Greenup county" within 20 days after entering into the contract, Tolar in 1819 went to court. He claimed damages of \$200.

A trial was had, Tolar was awarded damages in the amount of \$116.50, plus \$9.23 costs, none of which, it would appear, Johnson was able to pay. So the defendant found himself in jail.

And there he stayed, from mid-June till July 12. And then he gained his liberty only by invoking a new law which permitted citizens imprisoned for their debts to take the insolvent oath. Johnson took the oath and set up the following schedule of property subject to execution:

"1 skillet, some flax growing on his farm, six spoons and one hoe . . ."

Restaurant, Bottling Firm Entered at Allen; Cash, Foodstuffs Taken

LIGHTS MUST AWAIT 1948

Night Games Planned For School Next Year In Football, Baseball

Although interest in football under the lights has been heightened locally as Prestonsburg fans and school authorities witnessed night games at Paintsville and Whitesburg before big crowds, lights will not be installed on the Prestonsburg field this season, it was said this week.

And when night football is played here, it will be on the old field (Gasco Park). W. A. Spradlin, member of the City Board of Education, said this week. This became a certainty when J. O. Webb, owner of the property, proposed to lease the field to the school, rent-free, until cost of installing lights and constructing a fence is paid.

Mr. Spradlin said the decision not to attempt lighting of the field resulted from the fact that the Black Cats have only three home games scheduled this year. Present plans call for lights in time for both spring football and baseball, next year.

With the field lighted, an attempt will be made to schedule eight home football games in 1948, it was said. Crowds attending night games in other towns of this section indicate that football under the lights is a paying proposition rather than a loser, it is pointed out by local school authorities.

Only Bottling Plant In County Operating In New Community

The Red Rock Bottling Co., Inc., has begun operation in the new Hall Addition to the town of Allen of the county's only bottling plant. SISTERS BUY GEARHEART HOSPITAL

Martin Institution 6th Catholic-Owned Hospital in Diocese

Purchase of the Gearheart hospital at Martin by the Sisters of Divine Providence, Melbourne, Ky., Monday brought to six the number of Catholic hospitals in the Covington diocese.

Amount paid Dr. and Mrs. Orris Gearheart, of Martin, founders and owners of the hospital, was not disclosed.

The transaction was completed here, with Mother Celeste Marie, superior of the Sisters, coming here to close the deal and with the Rt. Rev. G. H. Geisen, diocese chancellor, representing the Covington diocese.

Immediately thereafter, the new owners began operation of the institution which is to be known as Our Lady of the Way hospital. Name of the hospital is derived, it was explained, from its dedication to the Virgin Mary and from the fact that it stands on a main highway.

The 40-bed hospital was completed by Dr. and Mrs. Gearheart and first occupied in January, 1938. The property conveyed included the hospital, all equipment, real estate comprising four lots, and also the equipment in the nurses' home on the Lawrence Keathley property.

Dr. Gearheart and Dr. J. A. Stumbo will remain on the hospital staff under the new management, and they will also do their office work in the hospital, it was announced. All existing contracts, it was said, will remain in effect until further notice.

Three sisters have been assigned by Mother Celeste Marie to take charge of the hospital. They are Sister Mary Edgar, who is the local superior, with Sisters Angelo and Mary Helen as her assistants.

The report that enlargement of the hospital is planned could not be confirmed this week. New owners of the hospital also operate Our Lady of the Mountains Academy at Paintsville.

Brother of E. R. Price Succumbs at Jenkins

Frank Price, 56 years old, and a brother of E. R. Price, general manager of the Inland Steel Company at Wheelwright, died at Jenkins hospital Sept. 5.

He had been ill for the past year and had been confined to Johns Hopkins hospital in Baltimore, Md. Born in Meyersdale, Pa., on Nov. 11, 1890, he was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Kennedy Price. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Edna Payne Price, one son, Lt. Com. Frank Price, Jr.

Funeral rites were held at the home and the body was taken to Meyersdale, Pa., for burial.

Mr. Price first went to Jenkins in February, 1914, as a clerk in the auditing department of the Consolidation Coal Company. He was transferred to Van Lear in June, 1914, where he held the positions of voucher clerk, distribution clerk, shipping clerk and chief clerk. At the time of his death he was assistant secretary of the Consolidation Coal Company (Ky.).

Prestonsburg defeated Van Lear in a well-played doubleheader here Sunday afternoon before a small crowd, 4-2 and 2-1.

With only two members of the regular Eastern Kentucky league team representing Prestonsburg, the winners displayed no power at bat before good Van Lear hurling, but Van Lear was slightly more impotent in that department, Ballard Branham, home from Hornell, N.Y., of the Pony league, hurled the first game for Prestonsburg, fanning 13 visiting batsmen, while Jimmy Roark, the converted outfielder, hurled the nightcap.

Court Restricts Use Of Road Machinery

No county-owned road machinery may hereafter be used for any private work, three of the four magistrates voted at last Friday's meeting of the fiscal court. Only Magistrate John May opposed the measure.

At the same time, Samuel J. Leslie was employed as an operator of road machinery at a monthly salary of \$175.

PLAN RECEIVES DUMMIT O.K.

Burial Association Would Write Policies Against Funeral Costs

Attorney General Dummit held in an opinion given Monday that Kentucky funeral directors may legally organize a burial insurance association.

The organization proposed by 19 funeral directors would be known as the Kentucky Funeral Directors Burial Association, Inc., and one of these 19 is the Carter & Callihan Funeral Home, Prestonsburg. Capital stock of the corporation would consist of 300 shares of stock, each of \$500 par value. Any licensed funeral director in Kentucky would be eligible to join by buying a share.

Franklin Moore, of the Arnold Funeral Home, and W. R. Callihan, Jr., of the Carter & Callihan Funeral Home, are directors of the association.

The Attorney General's office was called on under the statutes to advise the state insurance director whether to approve the plan. Counsel for the promoters and for another group opposing it presented their views to Assistant Attorney General Hughett.

State Senator R. P. Moloney and Don P. Moloney, Lexington, counsel for the opposition group, contended the plan would violate a statute which forbids funeral directors putting up money to get business. Joseph L. Leary, Frankfort attorney, argued the plan was legal.

Under the plan, as explained by counsel for the association, it would contract with a life insurance company to write burial policies similar to industrial life policies. Funerals paid for under the policies would be conducted by funeral directors designated by the association.

Leary said an agreement has been made for the Commonwealth Life Insurance Company of Louisville to write policies for the new association.

Heart Attack Fatal To Miner-Deputy, 42, Early Monday Evening

Stricken by a heart attack early Monday evening, Perrin Holt, 42 years old, Ligon miner and Floyd deputy sheriff, died before medical aid could be summoned.

Mr. Holt became ill while at the home of his brother-in-law, Joe Akers, of Ligon. The seizure was without warning.

Mr. Holt was a son of the late Sias and Fannie Hamilton Holt, and was well-known in the Left Beaver and Mud Creek sections of the county. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Bertha Holt, seven sons and daughters, Elmer, Delmer, Franklin, Lowell, Queenie, Laverne and Clara Holt, all of Ligon, one step-daughter, Mrs. Charles Hall, of Melvin; six brothers and two sisters, Mrs. Floyd Kiser, of Virginia, Mrs. Silas Hamilton, Teaberry, Melvin Holt, McDowell, Arnold Holt, Ashland, Edgar Holt, Louisa, Robert Holt, Craynor, Taubee and Willie Holt, both of Ligon.

Funeral rites were conducted today (Thursday) from the residence at Ligon, the Rev. Jerry Hall officiating. Burial was made in the Elliott cemetery at Beaver, the Ryan Funeral Home directing.

GATES DENIES EXTRADITION

Of Knott Countian Whose Return Asked For Child Desertion

The office of Governor Ralph Gates, of Indiana, last Friday refused to grant extradition of Riley Combs, who is known in Indiana as Homer H. West, to answer to a child desertion charge in Knott county.

A former resident of Hindman and also of Lackey, this county, Combs has resided since 1938 in Indiana, and is a contractor in Valparaiso. Since leaving his wife, the former Sara Dyer, and their three children, 25 years ago, he remarried and has reared a family, it was said.

Commonwealth's Attorney John Chris Cornett said here this week that Hindman attorneys went to Indianapolis during the extradition fight and were informed by Governor Gates' secretary that the indictment as prepared in Indiana. Ruel W. Steele, Gates' executive secretary, was quoted as saying Combs' former wife had remarried, but acquaintances here of the Knott couple say this is untrue.

Combs (or West) was not a fugitive from justice, Steele asserted, and was not in Kentucky at the time of the alleged desertion. He added that the affidavit set out that the three children were minors, but that they now are grown.

Steele said that the children had visited their father in Indiana within the past few years.

"They looked lousy," retorted their coach, John R. Elbner, whose development of the team in the last six weeks had fans handing out posties and arches, right and left.

WAR VETERAN AUTO VICTIM

Weddington Dies Saturday Midnight In Wreck Near Ivel

Don H. Weddington, 20-year-old Emma veteran who as a combat engineer in Germany survived by a quirk of fate a direct shell hit which killed the other 11 members of his squad, met death in a highway accident near Ivel, Saturday midnight.

He died of a crushed skull, 15 minutes after his auto left the Mayo Trail, a short distance above the Davidson cemetery at Ivel, ran around a 12-foot embankment and struck a tree. Two companions escaped with minor injuries—Bobby Harris with a broken right arm and Thomas Lewis, Jr., with cuts and bruises.

All three youths were thrown clear of the car before it stopped. Steel top of the auto was smashed backward by the terrific impact as it struck the tree.

Deputy Sheriffs Harold Conn and J. B. Hall arrived at the scene of the tragedy, a matter of three minutes after the wreck. Weddington died without speaking. Companions of the victim were quoted as saying they had rounded a curve and that Weddington cut to the right to avoid an approaching car. As right wheels of his car left the road, it was said, he cut to the left and lost control, the auto leaving the highway on the left side.

The victim was a son of Jake and Ruth Herald Weddington, well-known Emma residents, and was one of his community's best-liked young men. Besides his parents, he is survived by one sister, Miss Mabe Weddington.

The funeral from the Emma Methodist Church Tuesday afternoon was attended by a large gathering of relatives and friends. Military honors were accorded by Floyd Post, American Legion, and Walter K. Bowling Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars. Officiating ministers were the Revs. Isaac Stratton, James Roark and C. L. Neff. Burial in the family cemetery was under direction of the Arnold Funeral Home.

TREE CRUSHES HAROLD MAN

Ben Howell Succumbs 8 Hours After Injury On Pike Logging Job

Ben Howell, 55-year-old Harold man, was fatally crushed by a falling tree Friday afternoon while working on a timber job on Elkhorn Creek, Pike county, and he died eight hours later at the Methodist hospital, Pikeville.

An employee of the Elkhorn City Lumber & Supply Company at the time of his fatal injury, Mr. Howell was a veteran of World War I and a native of this county. He had resided in the vicinity of Harold most of his life, and was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Jeff Howell.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Margie Luster Howell, two sons, Willie and Hansel Howell, both of Fraise, and four daughters, Mrs. Stella King and Mrs. Myrtle Howell, both of Rocky Ridge, O. Mrs. Dorothy Spears, Betsy Layne, and Miss Georgianna Howell, of Amba. Four brothers also survive: Lee and Charley Howell, both of Amba, Joe Howell, of Harold, and Willie Howell, Drift.

Funeral rites were conducted Monday from the residence at Harold, and burial in the family cemetery on Toler Creek was under direction of the Call Funeral Home.

TERM'S FIRST MURDER TRIAL IS UNDER WAY

Johnson Case May Go To Jury Today; 2 Draw Pen Terms

Hearing of evidence in the first murder trial of the current circuit court term was under way today (Thursday), with Willard Johnson on trial for the slaying on Mud Creek of Harold Hamilton.

The case may reach the jury late today.

On motion of Commonwealth's Attorney, and over objection of defense attorney, Circuit Judge Hill directed that the indictment against Johnson be amended to charge Hamilton's name from Hillard to Harold and the word describing the death weapon from pistol to shotgun. The Rev. John B. Hamilton was held in contempt when he failed to appear on a witness summons, was fined \$10 and jailed 10 hours.

Trial of Robert Lee Brown and Kenneth Roberts, charged with the murder of Freddy Stillon at Turner's Camp, near here, was scheduled for Monday, but when the case was called not an eyewitness was present. The case was continued till Jan. 18.

Ed Johnson drew a two-year pen term last Thursday under the new law against carrying concealed deadly weapons. Tuesday of this week, Ernest Moore was given a two-year sentence on a rape charge. Clyde Dudley, also charged with Moore by Ethel Gillenwater, of Langley, will be given trial Jan. 22.

Defense testimony contended that the girl met Moore in fulfillment of a date and stayed in the woods overnight with him and Dudley. The girl contended, however, that she was overpowered, taken into the hills and forced to remain there. Testimony was introduced showing that she later was a hospital patient as a result of her experiences.

Both Johnson and Moore plan appeals from their sentences.

After last Thursday's directed verdict acquitting Lee Frasure, founder of an orphanage at McDowell, of a charge of keeping a disorderly house, Circuit Judge Edward P. Hill ordered that Marinda Sizemore and Norma Jean Frasure be recognized as witnesses before the grand jury when it resumes its hearings next Wednesday. The order was made because a violation had "appeared" to have arisen out of the trial of the case.

PRE-ELECTION LULL ENDING

With Official Openings Of Clements, Dummit Campaigns This Week

The lull before the political storm ends next week, with both the Democrats and the Republicans staging their official campaign openings.

Attorney General Eldon S. Dummit, Republican nominee for Governor, opens in Louisville Sept. 26, after the event had been moved from Lexington.

Next day, the state Democratic rally is at Morehead, with Earle C. Clements, Democratic gubernatorial nominee, to follow this up with a second meeting at Murray, Oct. 4.

A special train will carry Democrats of this section to Morehead Sept. 27, leaving Elkhorn City at 6 a.m., arriving in Morehead at 12:30 and returning to the Big Sandy section that night.

"More harmony than could be found in a hall full of barbershop quartets" was the description of Democratic goodwill between all factions. Ben Kilgore, whose campaign for Governor Harry Lee Waterfield managed four years ago, and who this year managed Waterfield's campaign, announced this week that he will actively campaign for Mr. Clements' election.

At the same time Republican leaders were avowing their solidarity for the November fight. John Fred Williams, of Paintsville, whom Mr. Dummit defeated for the nomination, was said to be ready to go on a speaking tour in behalf of the entire Republican ticket.

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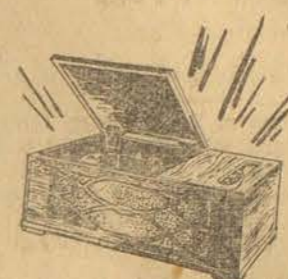

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

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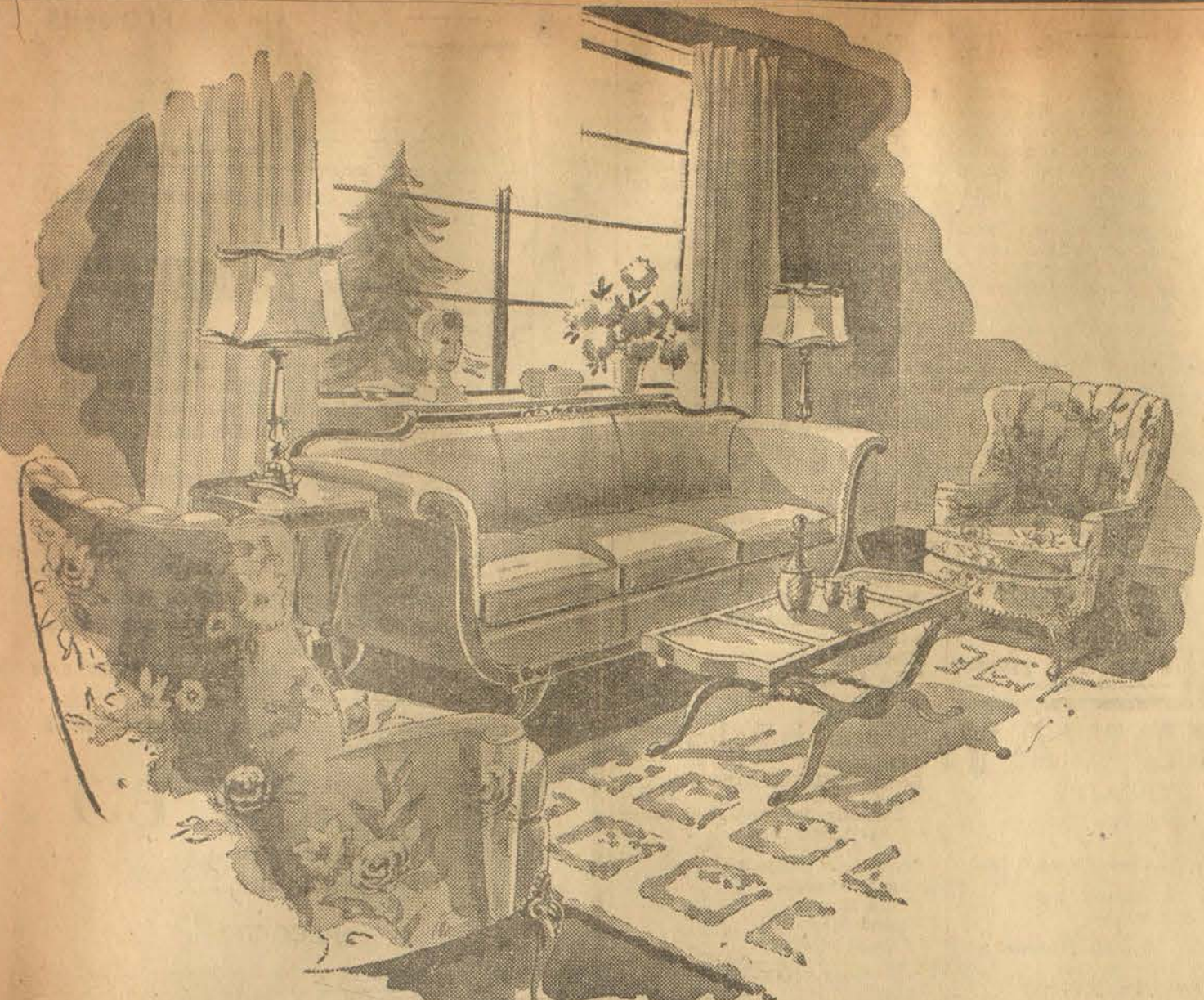
