LAUNCH SEAL SALE MONDAY

2,000 Letters Go Out To Citizens Soliciting Funds for Fight on TB

Floyd county's Christmas Seal Sale campaign to raise funds for the fight on tuberculosis began Monday with the mailing of 2,000 letters, accompanied by Seals, to citizens of the county, Mrs. Edward P. Hill, chairman, announced.

The fund-raising drive will continue through Dec. 24. Particular emphasis is being given the Christmas Seal drive this year, with the Tuberculosis Association hoping to raise sufficient funds to employ a fulltime nurse for tuberculosis work. Sale of Seals is the only source of revenue available for tuberculosis work in the county, it was explained.

Mrs. Hill said approximately \$5,000 worth of Seals have been mailed to Floyd county, with no individual receiving less than \$2 worth. She urged that recipients make remittances promptly in self-addressed envelopes accompanying the Seals.

Individuals who have not received Seals as a result of an incomplete mailing list in the hands of the Tuberculosis Association may help by sending contributions direct to Mrs. Hill here, who in turn will mail them Seals ordered.

A larger percentage of the Christmas Seal fund remains in Floyd county than any other fund annually raised. If as much as \$1,900 worth of Seals are purchased, 75 per cent of the fund remains in the county, with 20 per cent going to the Kentucky Tuberculosis Association and 5 per cent to the national fund.

FLOYD MINES CLAIM TWO

Slatefalls Are Fatal To Smith, Vanhose Within Past Week

Slatefalls in Floyd mines have within the week claimed two lives. Instantly killed Friday was Adam Smith, 23 years old, of Eastern, in the Hall & Gibson Coal Company truck mine near Maytown where he was a coalloader.

The second victim was Walter Vanhose, 37, of Wayland, assistant foreman for the Elk Horn Coal Corporation, who died at the Beaver Valley hospital, Martin, Tuesday morning at 7 o'clock, approximately eight hours after he had been trapped beneath slate.

Smith, a native of Knott county and a son of Mr. and Mrs. Elias Smith, of Eastern, was killed, it was said, on the fourth day of his employment at the Maytown operation. His skull was fractured and he suffered internal injuries.

Vanhose was a native of Paintsville and a son of Mr. and Mrs. Perry Vanhose, now residents of Fort Gay, W. Va. He was a veteran of World War II and had resided at Wayland for several years.

Smith is survived by his parents, seven brothers and three sisters; Kelly and Joe Smith, of Eastern, Benjamin, of Garrett, Abe, of Vicco, Sam, of Garner, Fair, of Hindman, Jerry Smith, Mrs. Ralph Beverly and Mrs. Andy Ritchie, all of Vincennes, Ind., and Mrs. John P. Lawson, of Minnie.

His funeral was conducted from the home of Mrs. Lawson at Minnie and burial was made at Eastern under direction of the Ryan Funeral Home.

Mr. Vanhose is survived by his parents, his widow, Mrs. Mabel Castle Vanhose, and several brothers and sisters. Funeral rites will be conducted Friday afternoon at Wayland.

THIRD MINER SLATE VICTIM

Patton Dies 9 Hours After Fall in Mine At Bosco, Tuesday

The third Floyd county coal mine employee to die within the last week of injuries sustained in slatefalls was John Patton, 44 years old, who succumbed at St. Mary's hospital, Huntington, W. Va., at 6 p.m., Tuesday to internal injuries suffered in the Diamond Elkhorn Coal Company mine at Bosco, nine hours earlier.

The victim was a son of Bill and Mary Patton, of Garrett, and was a native of this county. He is survived by his parents, his widow, Mrs. Ada Patton, one son, Carmel, two brothers and three sisters, James and Moses Patton, Mrs. Perry Rice and Mrs. Reuben Laferty, all of Garrett, and Mrs. Edgill Davis, of Eastern.

Funeral rites will be held Friday, the Rev. Henry Mullins officiating, and burial will be made in the Huff cemetery at Bosco, under direction of the Ryan Funeral Home.

REPORT SAYS LINE TO OPEN BIG COAL FIELD

Study of Three Routes May Result in Surveys From Floyd-co. Points

Engineers for the Chesapeake & Ohio Railway Company are reported as preparing to make surveys of three possible rail routes into the Spring Fork of Quicksand section of Breathitt county to tap rich coal resources of the region.

The Salversville Independent last week reported that camp cars have been set at Royalton as a base of operations for engineers plotting a course from Royalton up Licking river to the mouth of Trace Fork and on into Quicksand.

Other routes that may be considered, according to reports received here during recent weeks, are up Brush Creek in this county into the headwaters of Licking and thence into Spring Fork; or up the Open Fork of Middle Creek in this county to Licking.

Whichever route is followed, it is held almost certain that a railway will be built into Spring Fork where Butler Brothers, Wisconsin steel manufacturers, have big coal acreage.

The Butler Brothers Company, it was said, will install a "raptive" mine with a production capacity of 100 cars a day—all its tonnage to be used in Butler steel mills.

Aside from the tonnage produced at rail's end by the Butlers, extensive coal development in the Licking river section, hitherto untapped, is expected.

Concurrently with this report came another and a more official statement outlining plans of the Louisville & Nashville Railroad to build a six-mile spur-line to open a 12,000-acre field in Perry, Letcher, Leslie and Harlan counties.

Construction at a cost of \$1,000,000 will begin immediately after the Interstate Commerce Commission approves the line.

In its announcement of the plan, the railroad said the field is in the Perry county area and is expected to produce 8,000 tons a day. Its total content is reckoned at 300,000,000 tons.

The spur will extend from the Leatherwood branch which runs 10 miles up Leatherwood Creek. It will be called the Blair Fork Branch.

2 WAR DEAD FROM COUNTY

Arrive in New York As Body of Nelson Awaits Last Rites

As the body of the fourth Floyd county soldier returned home from overseas for burial lay Tuesday at the home of his parents, two others arrived in New York harbor on the U.S. transport Robert Burns from Europe.

Body of Pvt. Alvin Nelson, who was killed in Germany Dec. 13, 1944 while with the combat engineers of General Hodge's army, arrived here Monday and was taken to the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Denver Nelson, of Dwaile. Pvt. Nelson's body was taken from Germany to a military cemetery in Belgium from which it was disinterred for shipment home.

Arriving at New York Tuesday with 89 Kentucky war dead were the bodies of 1st. Lieut. Darwin Caudill, son of J. D. Caudill, of Garrett, and Pvt. Olva Spradlin, son of Cager Spradlin, of near Prestonsburg.

Those arriving on the Robert Burns had been buried in the Henri Chapelle military cemetery, Belgium, and the Saint-Laurent-sur-Mer cemetery, near Bayeux, France. Many of the 89 were killed in the D-Day assault on Omaha Beach.

Most of the Kentucky war dead will be sent to the general depot at Columbus, O., prior to reburial in a private or national cemetery in accordance with the wishes of next-of-kin.

Surviving Pvt. Nelson, besides his parents, are two brothers, Billy and Ralph Calvin, both of Dwaile. Funeral rites were conducted Wednesday afternoon, with Floyd Post, American Legion, according military honors. Burial in Dwaile cemetery was directed by the Arnold Funeral Home, the Rev. Alex Stephens and others conducting funeral rites.

100,000 LEAD NOW OFFICIAL

Official Tabulation Of Kentucky Vote Completed Monday

Congressman Earle C. Clements did pass the 100,000-vote mark in his lead over Attorney General Eldon S. Dummit for the Governorship of Kentucky.

"This fact was established only with completion Monday of official tabulation of returns from the state's 120 counties by the state election board.

The heavy swing back to the Democratic party November 4 swept into office eight other candidates on a statewide basis and gave that party its greatest majorities in the House and Senate in years.

Clements' official total was announced at Secretary of State Charles K. O'Connell's office as 387,795; Dummit's as 287,756, and that of the third candidate, Socialist W. A. Sandefur, as 1,928.

Dummit, in losing, got 8,612 more votes than Governor Simeon Willis, polled four years ago in defeating J. Lyter Donaldson, Democrat. But Clements piled up 126,810 more than went to Donaldson in 1943.

The vote on the issue of a new Constitution amounted to 49.8 per cent of the total given the three gubernatorial candidates. The official returns showed the proposal was defeated by 191,876 to 145,192.

Lifting of \$5,000 Salary Ceiling To Halt Teacher-Raids on State

Frankfort, Ky., Nov. 22—Freeing education from the \$5,000 salary ceiling will halt raids from other states among teachers of Kentucky's institutions, prominent educators declared today.

"I think Kentucky has been the happy-hunting ground of institutions of other states seeking competent teaching personnel," said President W. P. O'Donnell, of Eastern State Teachers College at Richmond.

"I believe the Court of Appeals, in a far-reaching decision yesterday, ruled that presidents and faculties of the state institutions of higher learning are exempt from the \$5,000 annual salary ceiling imposed on all 'public officers' by Kentucky's Constitution."

The presidents of three teacher colleges said they did not believe the court decision would bring immediate jumps in the salaries of their personnel.

Most of the colleges already have submitted their budgets for the next two fiscal years, the presidents said. None of them anticipated having to revise their budget request in the light of the court's ruling.

"We have figured reasonable increases for most of our staff in our budget request," said Dr. Paul L. Garrett, president of Western State Teachers College at Bowling Green. "All of the increases have been made within the old \$5,000 limitation," he added.

As an example, Dr. Garrett said professors at Western were receiving \$3,000 a year a few years ago. They were raised to \$4,000 during the present biennium. Dr. Garrett said he has fixed a span of \$4,200 to \$4,800 for professors for the next two fiscal years.

He does not anticipate having to pay any of Western's personnel

INTRODUCING A WELL-KNOWN FIGURE—

High School Hit Grid High, Result of Coach's Hunch

Prestonsburg high school hit an all-time high on the gridiron this year, strictly on a hunch.

The hunch was Coach John R. Elbner's. Folks around the Big Sandy Conference have, for months now, wondered how Prestonsburg came up with such a coach. And now, after all these months, the secret's out.

"I decided to cast my lot with Prestonsburg on a hunch," he explained recently. More than that, he was put on his mettle when a friend offered to wager he would be a doorman for other teams of this area.

That was how "Big John," as he was known during his days in the uniform of the University of Kentucky, came here last summer to begin work with a green team, and, starting literally from scratch, drilled them in the T-formation, a system of play some of them had never heard of and only a few had ever seen, till they executed it to the proverbial "T."

His ability as a football teacher is no greater, however, than his ability as a trainer of boys in preparing themselves for the rigors of a football campaign. Prestonsburg teams have never distinguished themselves till this year in keeping in condition. Well, every man on the team did this season. Those early games, with the mercury in

the 90's, were played without a time out, without a Prestonsburg player being helped to his feet at any time. Elbner doesn't play the Paul Pry on the boys. That isn't his system. His way is to set the example (he doesn't drink or smoke) and to give them long practise sessions, after which the youngsters were quite willing to hit the hay early and to keep strictest training in the hope they will be able to meet the coach's exacting requirements on the field, next day.

This matter of being an athlete is a big part of Elbner, who has been in training since boyhood. A native of Wellston, W. Va., he was captain of both the high school football and basketball teams there, was an all-state tackle, member of a team which won 23 consecutive games. The javelin-thrower he made at Wellston stands today a record for a West Virginia high school athlete.

After that he played tackle for the University of Kentucky, was captain of the Wildcats in 1940, for two years was all-Southeastern tackle and was twice given all-American honorable mention. Graduating from U.-K. in 1941, he played two years of pro ball with the Philadelphia Eagles where he learned a lot about the "T."

MRS. BAYES IS ACQUITTED

Knott Jury Clears West P'burg Woman In Husband Slaying

A jury in the Knott circuit court Wednesday morning returned a verdict of not guilty to the Commonwealth's murder charge against Mrs. Laura Kidd Bayes, 39, in the fatal shooting in August, 1946 at West Prestonsburg of her miner-husband, William Bayes, 41.

The trial was transferred to the Knott circuit court from this county on a change of venue after one trial here had resulted in a hung jury and other trial attempts had failed. The jury deliberated approximately two hours.

Mrs. Bayes testified that on the afternoon of the shooting she had been here to buy groceries and that on her return home her husband stood at the rear door of their West Prestonsburg home awaiting her. He began beating her, she stated, whereupon she ran to an outbuilding on the hillside nearby, was followed, struck on her head with a revolver and kicked. Everything "went black" after the blow on her head, she testified.

Commonwealth evidence contended that, following an altercation inside the home, Bayes ran from the building to the outhouse on the hill and that Mrs. Bayes stepped from the rear door of the home and began firing a revolver into the building.

Bayes staggered outside, hit in the head, but at first was not believed to be seriously hurt. He later came to Prestonsburg, but died during the night.

FLOYD VET, 2 OTHERS DEAD

As Result of Crash Of Auto, Church Bus At Nitro, West Va.

Paul Hamilton, 30-year-old Floyd county World War II veteran, and two West Virginians with whom he was driving to a veterans' meeting were killed Saturday night at Nitro, W. Va., when their auto collided with a church bus. A fourth man was critically injured.

It was said here that the church bus was backing up to a service station when the auto crashed into it from the rear. Rain and fog rendered visibility poor, and this was blamed for the crash.

The Floyd county victim was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Basil Hamilton, of Harold, and was a native of Honaker. He had resided for the last 18 months at Nitro where he owned a grocery store. He had many relatives and friends in this county.

Surviving, besides his parents, are two brothers and two sisters, Ray and Ralph Hamilton, both of Harold, Miss Nell Hamilton, a student at Morehead State Teachers College, and Miss Beatrice Hamilton, Asheville, North Carolina.

The body was returned to the home of the victim's parents at Harold and funeral rites were conducted there Tuesday. Burial was made in the family cemetery under direction of the Arnold Funeral Home.

CATS ANNEX FLOOD BOWL GRID CROWN

P'burg Team Defeats Pineville in Contest Replete with Thrills

Prestonsburg high school's Black Cat football team is not only the champion of the Big Sandy conference—it is champion of all that mountain region from Paintsville to the Virginia and Tennessee lines.

This, the highest grid standing ever achieved by a Big Sandy team, was attained last Friday afternoon by virtue of the Cats' 28-21 victory in the Flood Bowl at Pineville over Pineville high school, Cumberland Valley Conference champs.

The Cats won in a game that literally had everything—Prestonsburg fighting to come from behind in the last half, thrilling runs, a deadly passing attack by Prestonsburg, and a dropkick field goal by Branham, Prestonsburg backfield ace, from a difficult angle. A crowd of 2,500 fans witnessed a seesaw struggle that literally left them limp.

The winners played a wide open type of football and on the attack was seen as a typical pro team. Pineville held a 7-6 lead at the half, with Prestonsburg's ground attack in the first two quarters on the mediocre side. In the last half, however, the Cats were rolling, with Porter passing sensationally.

How sensational was this aerial assault is evident from the statistics: 18 completions in 21 attempts, 14 consecutive passes in one series completed to his receivers. With the Black Cat line affording superb protection, the Prestonsburg quarterback had plenty of time to pick his target and he coolly flipped the ball to receivers while the bewildered Pineville defense fought furiously to break up an attack such as they had never seen in high school football.

Horn, Harmon, Vaughan and Bradley in the line carried the load defensively in the last half after a poor start in the first.

The Bowl champions were awarded gold footballs at a banquet following the game, and Pineville townspeople and the Flood Bowl committee went all out to entertain them.

It was the last high school game for Porter Burchett, Mayo, Bradley, Gobie, Woods, Wedington, Garber, Vaughan, Spradlin Lemaster, Strahan and Laferty, all of whom will be graduated in May.

Coach John R. Elbner, who took a green team, introduced to the boys the T-formation, a new football system in this section, and made them a gridiron power in high school ranks, announced this week that both Porter, quarterback, and Burchett, end, have been signed by the University of Kentucky to full four-year scholarships. Several other seniors are anticipating college careers on scholarships which will be the result of hard work on their part and connections of their coach with various colleges. Coach Elbner is seeking to place as many of his football seniors as possible for college study and athletic careers.

Now for the details of the game: Prestonsburg kicked off to Pineville and the ball was returned to the Pineville 30. The Bell countians' attack stalled on the Prestonsburg 35 and they kicked to the 18. Prestonsburg's running attack did not click and Porter kicked to the Pineville 48. A series of thrusts at the line took the ball to the Prestonsburg 3, from which point Howard scored, then converted, Pineville 7; Prestonsburg, 0.

Pineville kicked out of bounds. Prestonsburg took the ball on its 40, but the attack again fizzled and Porter kicked to the Pineville 20. 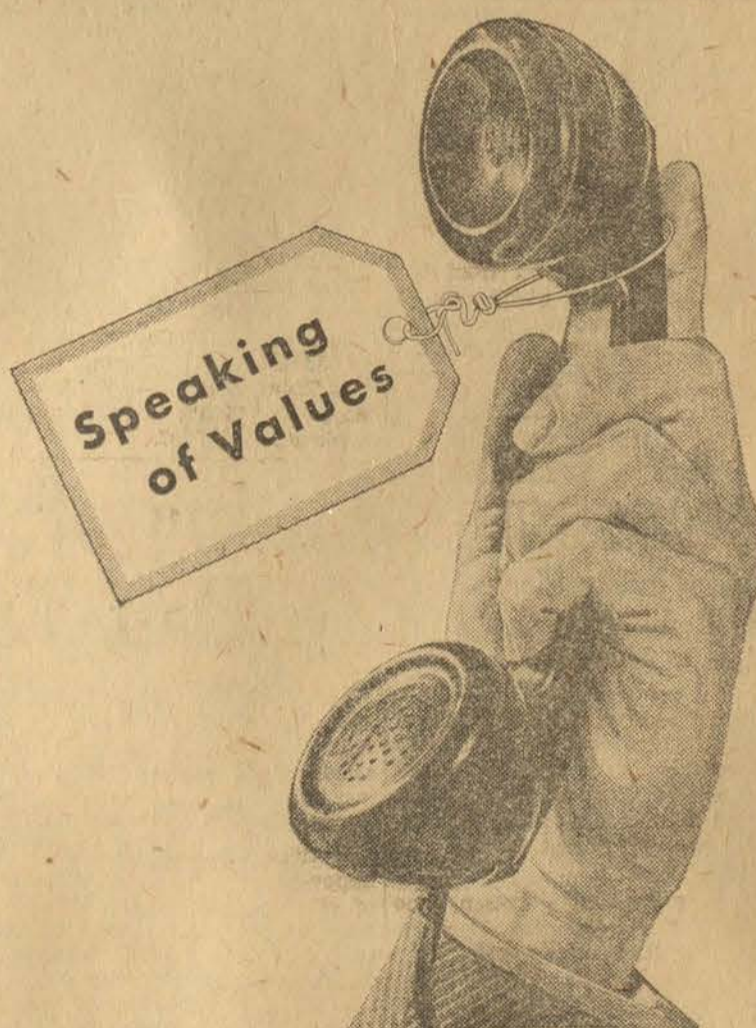

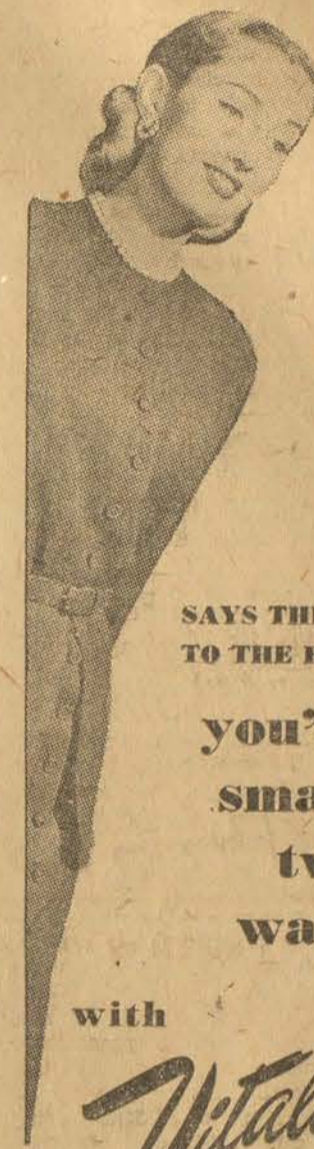

Both lines are in Perry county and the branch is from the L. & N.'s Eastern Kentucky division. The new line was approved at a meeting of the railroad's directors in New York.

Also meeting there were Dr. Huston St. Clair, president of Jewell Ridge Coal Corporation, and R. H. Kelly, president of Fourseam Coal Corporation, who announced the plans for the mining operations.

They said their companies had made an agreement to lease the field from the Kentucky River Coal Corporation of Lexington and build and operate a modern and wholly mechanized tippie of 8-000-tons-a-day capacity near the head of Blair's Fork. The tippie will receive coal from both sides of the valley.

They said their mines would have a joint capacity of 100 railroad cars a day. The workings will be equipped with cutting machines, mechanical loaders and shuttle cars.

John E. Tilford, L. & N. vice-president, said it was believed the commission would approve the line as a further development of a previously approved one, the Leatherwood Branch. He said construction would require more than a year and that mining operations would not begin for one and a half or two years since machinery could not be taken in until the spur is built.

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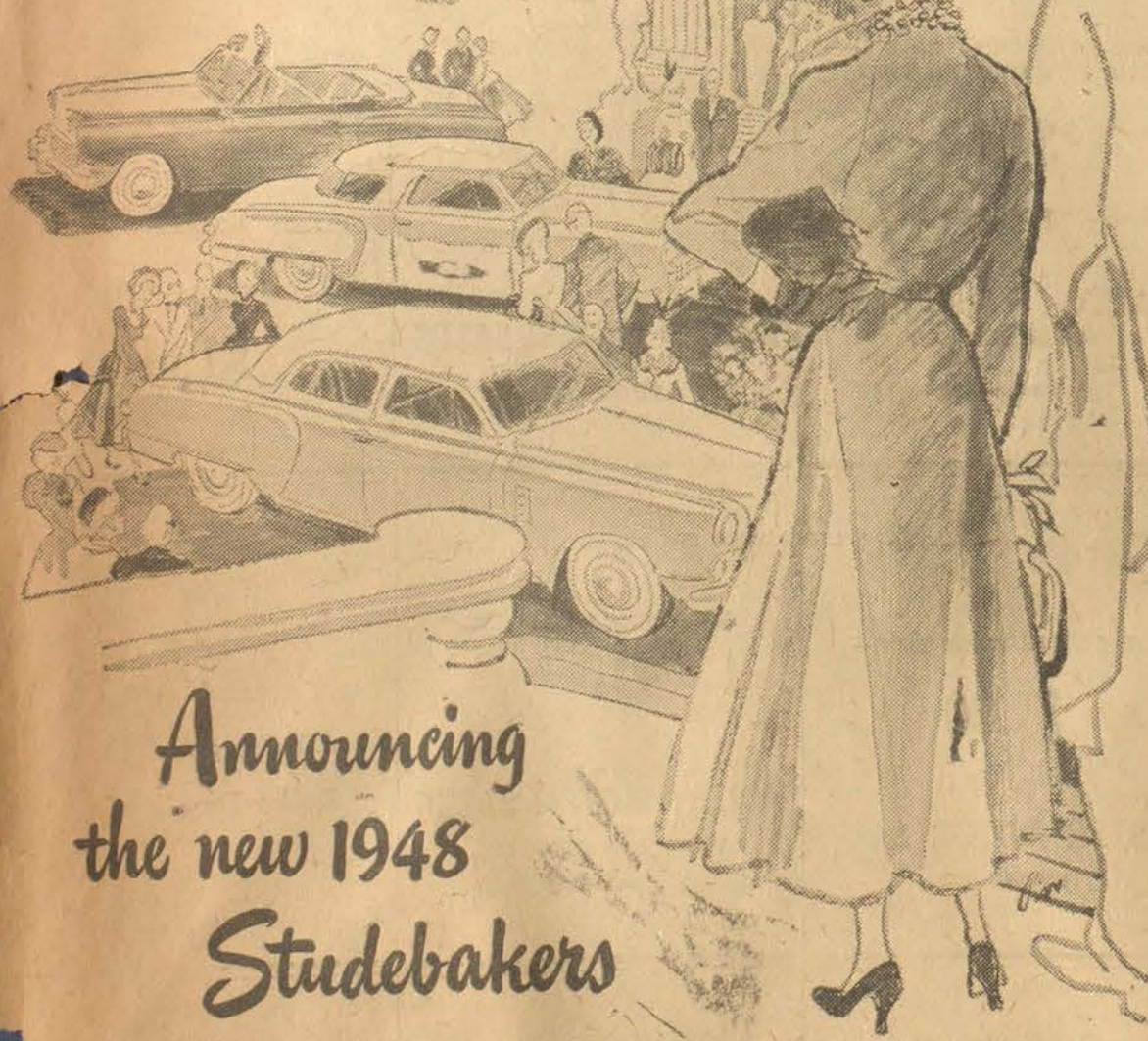

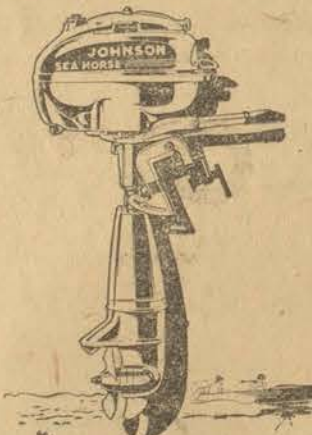
**Polio Sufferer Dies On Buffalo Creek**

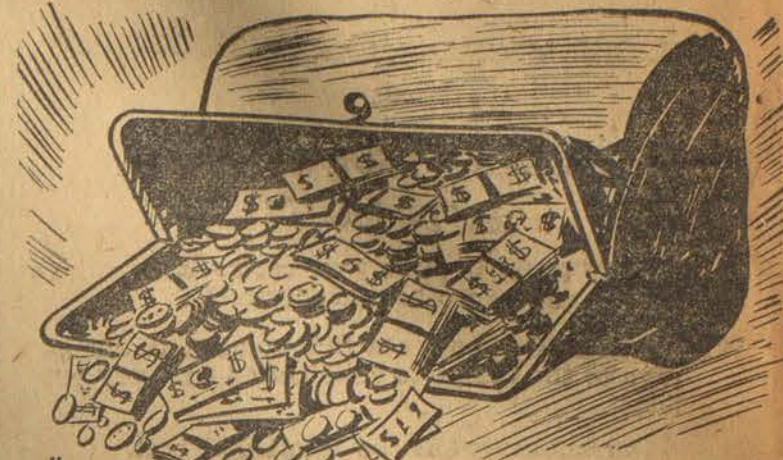
