SEEK \$3,000 FOR INJURIES

Suit Claims Boy Permanently Hurt When Hit by Line

For injuries he sustained when struck by a power line being constructed by employes of the Kentucky & West Virginia Power Company, seven-year-old Arlie Jean Hall filed suit in circuit court here Friday through his mother, Mrs. Martha Hall, asking \$3,000 damages.

The petition, filed by Atty. Edward Allen, stated that the boy was sitting on a stump near his home in the vicinity of Buckingham while the company workmen were constructing the line and that, as a result of their carelessness and negligence, the line fell onto the boy. The lad suffered a brain concussion, permanent impairment of his right eye and loss of four teeth, the petition alleges. His injuries, it is contended, are permanent.

EIBNER SIGNS FOR 4 YEARS

As Athletic Coach In P'burg Schools; Is Presented Auto

John R. Eibner, who this year guided the Prestonsburg Black Cats to the Big Sandy conference championship and post-season honors in the Pineville Flood Bowl, has signed a four-year contract to continue his coaching work here, it was announced this week by Chalmers H. Frazier, superintendent of Prestonsburg schools.

Term of the contract will begin on August 1, next year.

Except for next summer, when Mr. Eibner will be in school for his Master's degree, the work will be a 12-month job, with the coach supervising a community playground during the summer vacation period.

Eibner was offered the four-year contract during the football season as interest increased in his work which was off to a highly successful start, though he was working with a team largely composed of green material. An athletic association was formed here as a further effort to retain his services, and this group is expected to continue work.

Even more tangible proof of esteem was offered last week by the Prestonsburg Kiwanis Club in the presentation to Coach Eibner of a new Chevrolet sedan.

Within the next few weeks, the coach and his football and basketball squads will be feted at a banquet, with "Bear" Bryant and Frank Mosely, of the University of Kentucky football coaching staff, and possibly Adolph Rupp, famed U.-K. basketball mentor, as guest speakers.

With the coaching situation settled, school authorities this week were getting down to cases on the problem of providing lights for the field (old Gasco Park) which the City Board of Education recently leased from J. O. Webb of Prestonsburg. A Westinghouse technician met with the Board Tuesday evening and presented plans for lights to provide night football.

Although the Westinghouse installations are not the cheapest, they are considered best, it was said here. Lighting systems at the Jenkins and Olive Hill fields were pointed to as examples of Westinghouse excellence.

BOARD ORDERS EQUIPMENT
As First Move To Light School Football Field; Project to Cost \$6,500

Placing of an order Tuesday night by the Prestonsburg Board of Education for two transformers was the first definite step toward lighting of the school's football field.

The transformers are being purchased from the Westinghouse Electric Company, and a representative of the company was instructed at Tuesday's meeting of the Board to submit complete plans for the lighting system with prices.

The 108,000-watt system to be installed here is the most powerful to be placed in operation by an Eastern Kentucky school, the strongest yet installed being of 72,000 watts. The system planned at Wheelwright for both night football and baseball, however, is expected to be even stronger.

Improvement of the Prestonsburg field will be made without the Board of Education making any expenditure out of its general budget. Financing of the project will be self-liquidating, it was said.

Total cost of the lighting equipment is estimated at \$6,500. Installation as a community project is expected to be made without cost to the Board.

Although night baseball will not be possible, softball will be played under the lights.

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FISH & GAME CLUB ELECTS NEW OFFICERS

Wide-Range Program In County Next Year Planned by Directors

George E. Allen, of Langley, was re-elected president of the Floyd County Fish & Game Club at the club's annual election of officers last week, with George W. Newman, of Hi Hat, named vice-president to succeed Claude White, of Prestonsburg, Ray Stephens, of Prestonsburg, was re-named secretary-treasurer.

These three officers and the chairman of the club's three permanent committees—Henry May, John R. Baldrige and A. R. Cassidy, all of Langley—form the board of directors.

The board of directors Saturday night, in a meeting here, planned a budget for 1948 which will be submitted to the club membership at the meeting, Jan. 5. Items of this proposed budget follow:

1. Quail brooder construction, \$500; rearing expense, including feed, etc., \$650. This item looks to construction of two more brooders and the rearing next year of approximately 1,200 quail for liberation on Floyd county farms.

2. Junior Sportsmen Club program, \$300. This amount is earmarked to bear expense of junior sportsmen in camp, the various local club activities and their organization of rifle teams. These junior rifle teams, it was said, may enter the National Rifle Association, which will lend them rifles and contribute to each club 400 rounds of ammunition. The Floyd County Fish & Game Club proposes to pay the \$3.50 NRA membership fee for each club and to post the \$10 bond required of each club for safety and care of rifles loaned by the national organization.

3. Completion of the club's fish pond, \$300. The main pond on the E. R. Burke farm, near here, is almost complete, but remaining to be constructed is a dam above it to provide a feeder pond.

4. Fish rearing, \$100. The club hopes to rear between 5,000 and 6,000 fish next year.

5. Gray fox bounty, \$165. The price on the head of each gray fox remains \$1.50, and the figure set up for next year is approximately the same as collected by Floyd hunters this year.

6. Ten pairs raccoon, \$150.

7. Seed for game farms, \$50.

8. Purchase of fish for liberation, \$450. The club hopes to buy 3,000 smallmouth bass fingerling for release in county streams next year. Between 3,000 and 4,000 crappie also will be released in Floyd county waters, it was said, since an earlier experiment with this species has proved successful. Crappie, however, is available without cost. The first crappie were released in the Big Sandy in August, 1946, and last January 2,300 more were released. This summer, several fishermen reported catches of good-sized crappie.

9. Purchase of a \$500 bond to be deposited against the future date when the club is financially able to build a permanent clubhouse.

At last week's meeting the proposal to raise the club membership fee from \$1 to \$2 was defeated.

Joseph paid amounts due other complainants, including Callie Joseph and Walter Meek, who had filed cold check charges against him, and Johnson authorities considered a move to dismiss charges against him, it was said. These two cases, however, were later continued till the next court term.

INAUGURATION CROWD GREAT

Governor Clements Asks For 'Unselfish Service'; Wetherby Takes Office

Frankfort, Ky., Dec. 9—Earle C. Clements, Morganfield Democrat, was sworn in as Governor of Kentucky today and he promised to do all possible to bolster the state's agricultural and industrial status.

The inauguration ceremony, made classier by a beautiful winter day, was watched by throngs that milled around the capitol city all day.

Clements took the oath of office, administered by Appellate Chief Justice Porter Sims at 12:27 p.m. (CST). Sworn in with him was Lt. Gov. Lawrence W. Wetherby, Louisville.

Leaving office and signalling the end of four years of Republican rule were Governor Simeon Willis, Ashland, and Lt. Gov. Kenneth Tuggle, Barbourville.

About 3,000 persons, most of them partisan Democrats, were jammed around the inaugural platform which was laden with political dignitaries of the outgoing and incoming regimes.

When the oath-taking was finished, the crowd let go a long cheer. A 19-shot salute of an army cannon behind the capitol building provided a solemn rhythm for the throng's roar.

High School Band Joins in Parade

Adding to the color of the inaugural day parade was the scarlet-garbed Prestonsburg high school band, 45 strong, directed by Mrs. Oval B. Hall, music instructor.

The band, its performance color and dash, drew the comment of a radio newscaster giving a running account of the inaugural activities.

Transportation of the band, as the county's representatives, was furnished, gratis, by the Sparks Brothers Bus Company.

Clements Immediately Retreated to the Governor's Executive Chamber

but he was closely followed by eager admirers.

His first official act was the appointment of Robert B. Hensley, Louisville attorney as executive secretary. Hensley served in the army as a captain and was publicity director of Clements' campaign for governor.

Then the new Governor named Roscoe Murray, a veteran of World Wars I and II, as state adjutant general. Murray, 52, is from Upton and is a former school teacher and school administrator.

Hensley replaces Forrest Hume, Richmond, who served as confidential aide to Willis. Murray succeeds G. H. May, Ashland. Both posts pay \$5,000 a year.

Governor Clements then issued a proclamation urging Kentuckians to give freely to the March of Dimes during the period Jan. 15-30 to help fight infantile paralysis. He posed for photographers and got a big kiss on the cheek from Nancy Drury, 5, Louisville, who was national poster girl for the 1947 March of Dimes campaign.

Then the informal reception began. For hours his followers mobbed the office in an effort to grasp the new chief's wearying but steady hand.

Veteran Methodist Minister, Now 75, Native of County

A native Floyd countian who has found green pastures elsewhere, as a spiritual shepherd, is the Rev. James N. Herald, who was born and reared on Cow Creek, near here.

The Reverend Herald, now 75 and in his 45th year as a Methodist minister, was the subject of a recent feature article in his "hometown" newspaper, The Crescent City Courier, Crescent City, Florida.

His father, John Wesley Herald, a Floyd county teacher, died when James, an only son, was 15. He, his mother, the former Charity Hackworth, and his three sisters carried on the work on the farm, and at an early age he became a member of the Methodist Church. At 16 he was superintendent of the Sunday School in his community. At 18 he married Miss Mamie Mays.

Twelve years later came the decision to become a minister. He became a student at Morris-Harvey College, Barbourville, W. Va., and for 34 years served circuits and churches in West Virginia. During a five-year pastorate at Greenup, Ky., he solemnized 452 marriage ceremonies.

After going to Florida in 1941, he continued his ministerial work, serving as supply at Webster and Hawthorne, Florida.

His first wife died in 1938 after he had observed their 50th wedding anniversary. In 1942 he was married to Florence B. Hall in Florida.

Of the six children born of his first marriage, four daughters survive: Mrs. Nora Adkins, Irton, O.; Mrs. W. W. Brown, Huntington, W. Va.; Mrs. W. M. Spears, Gallipolis, O.; and Mrs. L. C. Reese, Millville, New Jersey.

The three sisters with whom he worked with their mother on the Cow Creek farm, those long years ago, are still living. They are Mrs. Reuben Taylor, Prestonsburg, Mrs. J. L. Clark, Williamsburg, O., and Mrs. William Clark, Siloam, Kentucky.

First Girl Scout Cabin In Section Built at David

The first Girl Scout cabin to be built in Eastern Kentucky and one of the few in the state was recently completed at David by the Princess Elkhorn Coal Company.

Its completion gives Girl Scouts there all the conveniences enjoyed by the Boy Scouts of the mining town. A Boy Scout cabin was constructed by the company earlier in the year.

The new cabin, located up "Schoolhouse Hollow," is situated at a place where a wooded hillside surrounds the building except for the front. The structure, a frame and cinder block building, contains a meeting room 15 by 30 feet, a large kitchen and a smaller room for the storage of supplies and equipment. The meeting room has an open fireplace, with andirons, and a log fire heats it. The kitchen has a range, cabinets and a sink. Water is now being piped into the cabin and the building has been wired for electricity and lighting fixtures have been installed.

All construction has been supervised by Miss Ora Howard, senior Girl Scout leader and chairman of the Scout committee. Painting of the exterior and interior was done by the Boy Scouts, with the assistance of Boy Scouts, and drapes for all the windows were contributed by the David Woman's Club.

Parents, 5 Children, Formerly from This Section, Are Victims

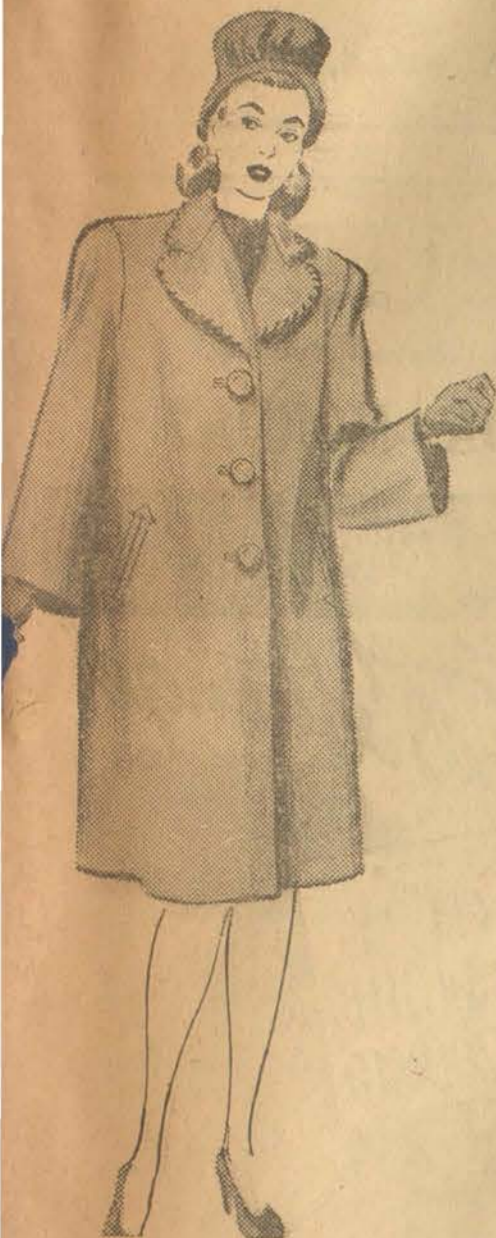

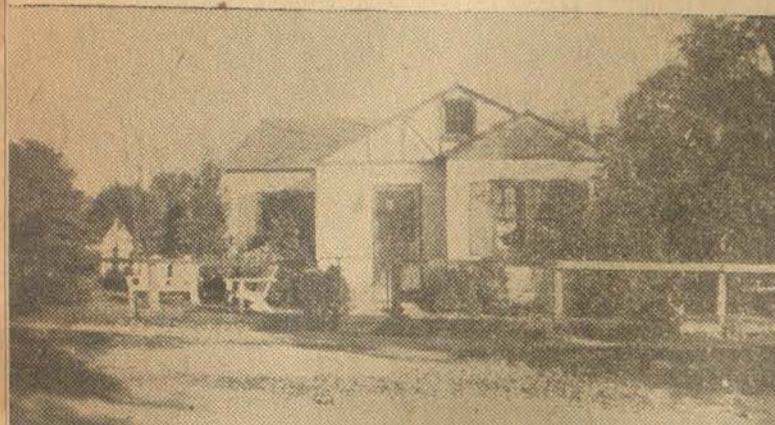

Pike 4-H Council To Locate Camp On Johns Creek

Dummit Tells How Sheriffs Get Pay

Letters to Attorney General Eldon S. Dummit indicate an address at the recent meeting of Kentucky sheriffs in Louisville caused confusion over their compensation, and he said this week he would like to explain the situation.

Charles J. Hahn, Washington, executive secretary of the National Sheriffs Association, was quoted at that time as saying he was "shocked" to learn that many Kentucky sheriffs have been paying for their own office equipment and even paying their deputies.

In reply to letters of inquiry from Sheriffs W. E. Stevens of Carter county and Charles McIntosh, Owsley county, the Attorney General commented, "It would seem that Hahn is not familiar with the laws of Kentucky in this matter." Dummit then gave the following explanation:

In counties having more than 75,000 population, salaries of the sheriffs and their deputies are fixed by the General Assembly and paid by the state out of sheriffs-offices fees.

In Fayette county the fiscal court is required by an appellate court interpretation of the statutes, to pay the expenses of the sheriff's office.

In other counties sheriffs' salaries are whatever is left over from their fees after paying deputies and other expenses.

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OF INTEREST TO VETERANS

Veterans selling property purchased with G.I. loans should obtain releases from personal liability as protection against defaulted payments by the new owners, Veterans Administration said this week.

VA Branch Office in Columbus, O., pointed out that a veteran remains personally liable for repayment of a loan after selling his property if the new owner fails to keep up with the payments. The veteran may have to pay part of the debt defaulted by the new owner if the property is sold for less than the unpaid balance of the loan.

Veterans should obtain releases from personal liability on their G.I. loans by express agreement with the lenders, upon selling or transferring the property.

VA officials cautioned veterans to beware of deals in which they are offered lucrative fees if they will use their G.I. loan guarantee to purchase property for other persons. In these cases, also, the veteran is liable for the amount of the loan if the ultimate buyer defaults in his payments.

Veterans Administration said recently in answer to several inquiries that there is no provision in the G.I. Bill (Public Law 34) which permits VA to make loans or advance subsistence payments to veterans enrolled in educational or training programs.

Under Public Law 16, which is the Vocational Rehabilitation Act for disabled veterans, a \$1,500,000 revolving fund has been provided to make advancements not exceeding \$100 to disabled veterans who are entering training. The advancement must be repaid to VA in installments.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. I would like to change the beneficiary of my G.I. insurance policy without letting the old beneficiary know about it. Can I do this?

A. Yes. A veteran may change the beneficiaries of his G.I. insurance at any time without their knowledge or consent.

Q. Will VA guarantee a loan for an automobile house trailer?

A. No, unless used as a necessary part of a business.

Q. May I be furnished a wheelchair by VA?

A. VA will furnish you a wheelchair if you have a service-connected disability requiring the use of a wheelchair, or if a wheelchair is required at your home upon your discharge from a period of hospital treatment or domiciliary care.

Q. I am an ex-WAC with an honorable discharge and contemplating marriage to a non-veteran. Will the rights to benefits under the G.I. No.

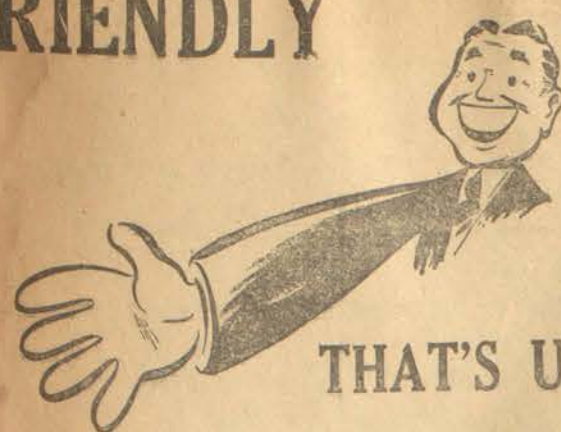

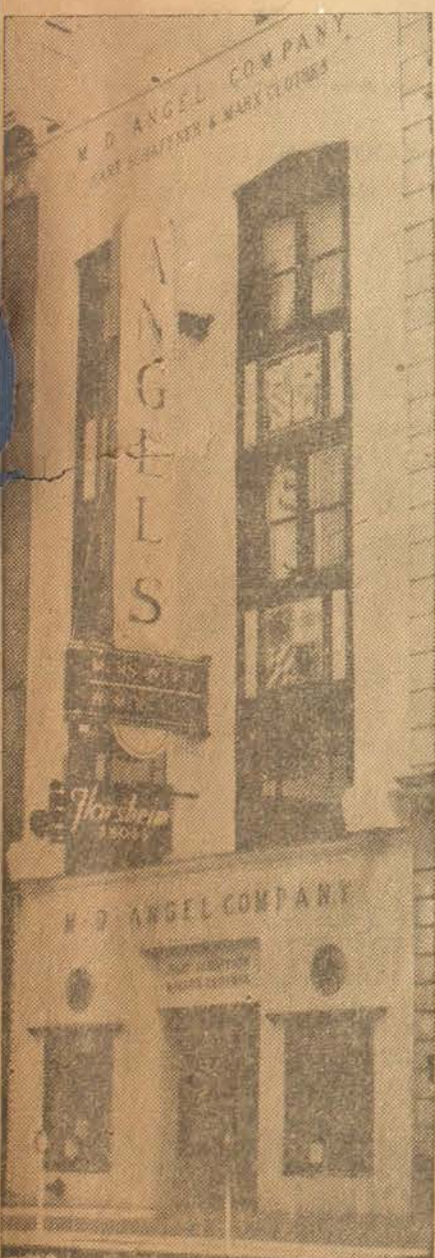

**Kentucky Ag Bulletin
Proposes Forest Acres
Increase for East Ky.**

Forested acres would increase from 69 to 96 per cent of all land in sections of Eastern Kentucky typified by the Quicksand area in Breathitt county, if improvements in land use were to be completed, according to a survey by the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station reported in bulletin No. 507. On the other hand, if the present practices of subsistence agriculture were intensified, forested acreage might decline to as low as 17 per cent.

If progress in land-use improvement were completed, only 4.2 acres in every 100 acres would be cleared. With a continuation of subsistence practices and further large growth in population, clearing might extend to 83 in every 100 acres. The system of increasing forest acreage would maintain families at a net cash income of \$1,563 per family, but the subsistence system would yield only \$238 per family. Hence, the survey shows, an increase of 38 per cent over the 1943 forest area would be accompanied by a decline of about 65 per cent from the population in 1943, but income per family would be more than five times as large as in a system of intensified subsistence.

The survey presents in this manner the two extreme possibilities for changed land use and economic conditions in the farm and forest areas in Eastern Kentucky.
