### Say Withers' Action Will Bring Highway Headquarters Home

County officials here, close friends f the new Clements administraion, hailed the action of the new highway commissioner, Garrett L. Withers, in increasing the number of highway districts from seven to nine and restoring district boundaries to conform with those of

Congressional district lines. They pointed out that in this district, for instance, highway headquarters will "be brought home"that is to say, from Ashland to Pikeville where the state already has highway department property.

Asked if there is a possibility that the old nine-man highway commissioner system may be restored County Attorney W. W. Burchett said only an act of the Legislature could make that possible. It is understood locally that Governor Clements is not favorable to a return to the advisory commissioner

A district engineer will be appointed in each district with authority to handle all road matters in his district, Mr. Withers said. "Major highway department pol-

icy will be fixed at the top by the commissioner," Withers said. "But matters which would finally wind up in their hands anyway. Withers said he was not yet deided whom he will appoint as dis-

trict engineers. The change, he added, will not become finally effective until after the end of the present fiscal year, March 30. The seven highway districts were Stephen Watkins, Lexington. They

were designed to include, as nearly Withers said the nine highway districts would have the same boundaries as Kentucky's nine Congres-

sional districts. The change will give better service to the districts and will bring the department closer to the county judges and the public, Withers added. maintenance engineer, Withers con-







The old Pikeville high school gymnasium, scene of many the basketball thriller played to capacity crowds, burned to the ground Tuesday. The blaze, believed to have started from a coal stove that formerly heated the structure while housing basketball crowds, spread to the nearby garage of George B. Harp. gutted it, and ignited window frames of neighboring school build-

Mitchell Chaffin and Marion were entertained. Refreshments caust to write. Seventeen hundred grade and high school pupils were calmly evacuated from the neighboring school buildings to which the fire spread.

The 25 - year - old, ramshackle wooden gymnasium was condemned last summer by the state fire marshal, and had been used only for school band. basketball practice since then.

A whipping wind which prevailed at the start of the fire in one end Pacific Vet Adds of the building providentially subsided, enabling the Pikeville fire department to bring the blaze under centrol without outside help.

Fire Chief Pont Lawson credited teachers in the two schools with herding their pupils to safety, all without injury. Their withdrawal was orderly, he said, but later considerable confusion prevailed among the youngsters until police and volunteers gained control and cleared them cut of the fire zone.

The flames ignited the garage operated by George B. Harp, leaving only the walls of the brick building standing, and destroying machinery and equipment and routing the occupants of an apartment on the second floor.

> Journal and was confusing as to my position on commercial motion pictures. The reference to the educaional system was not a part of the Civic Righteousness report and I did not have any part in that discussion The statements in The Floyd County by H. M. Vallmer in a speech on Christian Education and was one nan's opinion. It was not in a report o be adopted by the ministers.

> The question that involves my objection was in the Civic Righteousness report. There were some good points in the report but I was opposd to two sections which dealt with obacco and movies. I did not discuss ly opposition but merely stated it. This was a mistake as I have been misunderstood. In asking the ministers to vote that they would "never sttend a movie again," I thought they would see the absurdity of calling all commercial movies a sin. I did not mean that I wanted them to vote in favor of the report, but hoped that some of the leaders would amend this section.

However, since it has been misunderstood, I wish to take this opportunity to discuss my attitude toward the use of tobacco, calling actors and actresses whoremongers and harlots, and the statement that all

commercial movies are sinful. My opposition to the first is the word, "sin." If it is a sin to smoke tobacco, it is a sin to raise it, and it is a s'n for any preacher to accept money from the sale of tobacco for the finances of his church or the paying of his salary. I smoke tobacco and I do not consider it a sin. I think my position is clear on

As to the actors in Hollywood being proven "whoremongers and harlots," this in some cases is true. However, in the movies, these words would have been censored. The attitude of the ministry in voting for this statement is definitely an attitude of judgment. It is a more-helythan-thou attitude, and is not Christian. Granting that some actors are guilty, as in Bible times the woman in adultery was brought before Christ to be condemned by her accusers. Jesus said, "Let him that is without sin cast the first stone." The business of the ministers is to tell he whoremongers and harlots, Jesus loves you," and show by their attitude that they also love them. It is to witness to a way of life rather than be a judge. This is my pesition on this point.

As for calling all commercial movies the cancer of the church and Cost of advertising \$15.00 making it a sin to attend, it is not only poor judgment, but it is absurd. I mention one movie to illustrate. It is the picture, "Song of the South." I not only saw the movie daughter, Vicki, to see it. It was not a sin. Some movies are harmful and I am opposed to them, as I am to some books or some radio programs. However, the attitude of the Christian must be the selecting of good movies rather than putting a ban on all commercial motion picture productions. I go to the movies as a Christian minister, openly and with-

The reason I voiced my opposition to the report is obvious. I do not believe that we can withdraw from the world into a narrow shell of righteousness. I believe Christianity is normal for human beings, and it is a way of life with the hely spirit of God filling the person to make that person Godlike. Love is the motivating power of a Christian rather than jealously or hate. These petty things are so absurd in comparison to kindness, meekness, sincerity, love, peace and a desire to see men become Christians

I have many friends in Floyd county to whom I would like to add this word-You can't make a man clean until the Christ of Christmas, the Son of the living God, comes directly into the heart to transform His image. I do not make rules for Christians; we live by principles of love toward God and man in the name of Christ.

o care for Kenneth any longer, so he, too, went to Columbus, where, after a long search, he found his mother and sister, only to be innot allowed to stay in the house where they lived.

Kenneth again went to his grandmother at Portsmouth. After a few weeks the grandmother gave the child 60 cents and told him that his grandfather at the age of 13 had been making a living and she saw no reason why Kenneth couldn't do the same thing.

So Kenneth, who had enjoyed his stay at Portsmouth, decided to start for Tennessee. He got as far as Louisa, Ky., where a doctor picked him up in his car and took him to stay with his family. Kenneth started to school at Louisa, but the other children teased him, and he felt out of place there.

After three months he left Louisa, informing the doctor he planned to go to Prestonsburg to try to locate one of his older brothers who he was sure would care for him. Instead of going there, he decided to try to get to Rockwood again. He had come as far as Lexington when the policeman found him outside the

But that was by no means the end f his difficulties. He was placed in he Fayette county detention home ecause there was no other place for nim to stay and he was happy there except for the fact that he could

not go to school. The Travelers' Aid workers began long struggle to find a permanent nome for him. First they attempted o locate his mother and sister. Solumbus social workers could not find any trace of them, Portsmouth workers never replied to an inquiry concerning Kenneth's grandmother.

The story seemed so fantastic that he Travelers' Aid wrote to Floyd county to check it.

Floyd county authorities refused to take any responsibility for him and refused to send him to the nome at Lyndon because they said they would not spend the dollar a day required from each county for every child it has committed to the home. They did, however, send the
