Jeep-Truck Smashup Claims 2nd Victim; Shannon Dies Dec. 21

Wreck of a jeep in a collision with a coal truck at Hite, Dec. 18, in which Tracy Blackburn, of Drift, was instantly killed claimed the life of a second Drift man, Denver Shannon, 23, miner, three days later at the Beaver Valley hospital, Martin.

Shannon, a wartime navy veteran, suffered a deep cut in his throat and internal injuries when the jeep in which he, Blackburn, James Osborne and Richard King were driving toward Drift was almost demolished in a collision with a coal truck, Osborne and King are recovering.

Harvey Tackett, driver of the coal truck for the Josephine Elkhorn Coal Company, executed bond to answer to possible voluntary manslaughter charges. The tragedy took place on a curve.

Shannon was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Shannon, of Drift, and was well-known in the Left Beaver Creek section. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Glenna Jewell Shannon, an infant child, his parents, and several brothers and sisters.

Christmas 'Celebration' May Lead To Ban on Fireworks

The sound and fury of Christmas and the Eastern Kentucky custom of "celebrating" with fireworks left approximately 15 persons, mostly children, injured, with one losing an eye.

So noisy and dangerous did the Christmas fireworks become that State Senator Doug Hays, of McDowell, declared "something must be done."

"I intend," he added, "to introduce a bill at this session of the Legislature to ban the sale of fireworks except for the celebration of the Fourth of July."

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At Prestonsburg General hospital three persons were treated, Christmas eve. One, Frankie Derocsett, had a badly injured eye.

Clerks in some uptown business places and their customers were plainly frightened during the Christmas eve uproar.

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Senator Hays told THE TIMES the bill also will include stringent penalties for bootlegging and the manufacture of moonshine whiskey. The state liquor store system he proposes would have no effect on dry counties, such as Floyd he added.

"I believe the state should sell both by the drink and by the package, but not in the same places," he said, "and should include beer and wine in the state liquor monopoly. The employes dispensing beverages should be under bond. It would be a blow to bootleggers."

"Kentucky needs more funds," he declared. He pointed to budget requirements for the coming biennium totalling around \$170 million, which Governor Earle C. Clements and a group of legislators are working to pare down around \$80 million in an effort to keep within the state's estimated general fund income.

Senator Hays said he would propose to use the additional funds, which he said would flow in, to supplement appropriations for education and welfare, including old-age pensions. They are the two biggest items in the budget and the group studying the subject has indicated these two items, because of their size, will have to take the heaviest cuts from their estimated needs.

"West Virginia cleared \$11 million off its state stores this year through September," Hays said. "Ohio took in \$18 million in the same period and New York \$45 million."

Hays said his plan as now formulated would provide for the state to buy direct from the distillers and to sell direct to consumers. There would be no retailing in dry territory, he explained, but dry territory would not share in such revenue.

He declared state control of whiskey from the time it leaves distilleries would go a long way toward breaking up bootlegging. That, he added, is more prevalent than ever in some counties in his senatorial district, and in many dry counties.

"I'm not a wet," he added. "I want to give the state more revenue that it has to have and want to break up bootlegging."

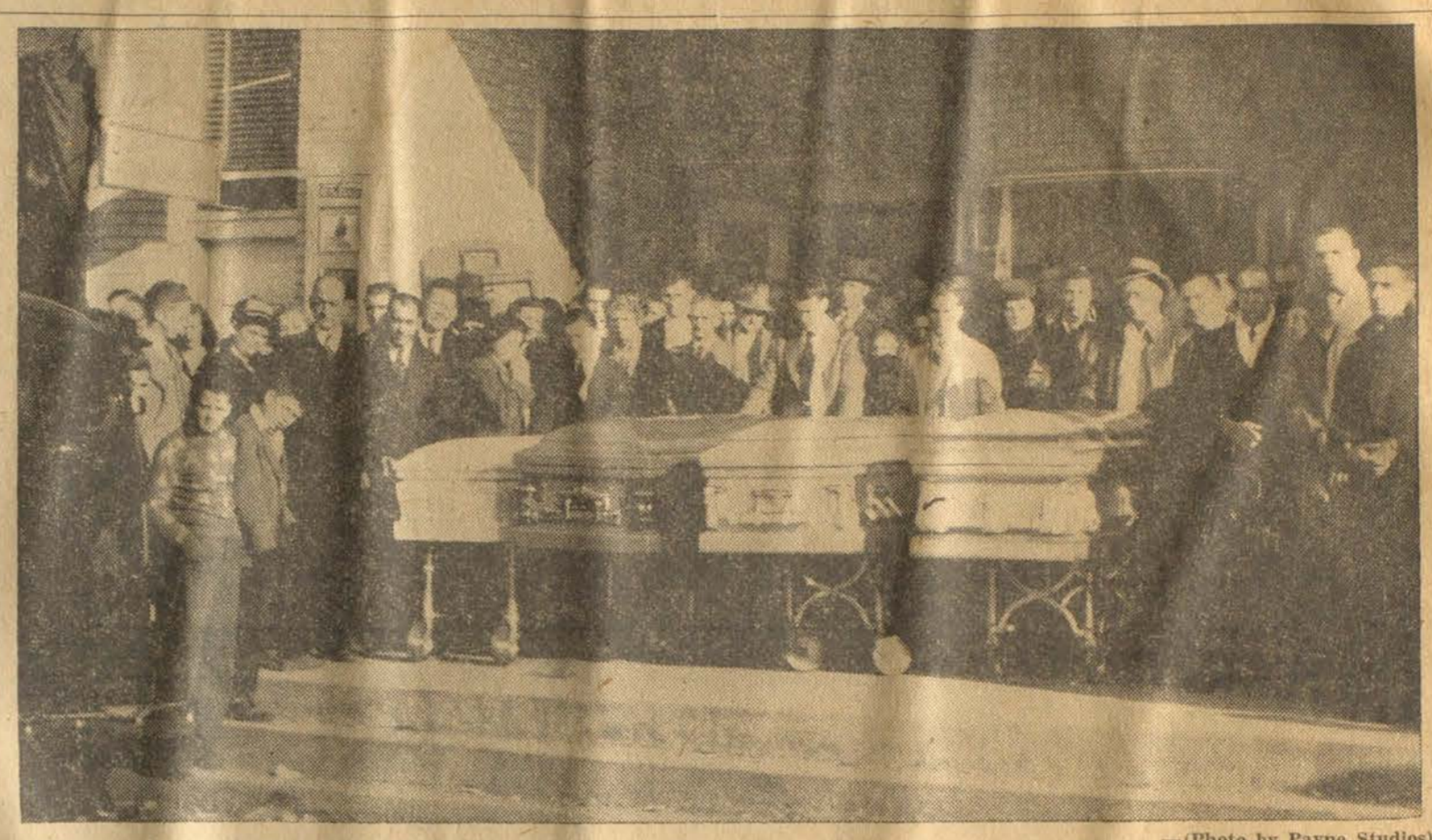

TRAGEDY HITS FLOYD TOWN LAST WEEK

Flanery and Son, 6, Mr. and Mrs. Norris Victims at Martin

An awed crowd of several hundreds of persons saw four persons lie dead at Martin Saturday afternoon after they had been electrocuted by voltage from a high tension wire.

The victims are: Robert Flanery, 38 years old; his six-year-old son, John Hugh; his brother-in-law, Hugh Norris, 30, and Norris' wife, Mrs. Edith Frazier Norris, 28.

The tragedy which appalled the Right Beaver Creek community came as Flanery, neighbor of Norris in Ice Plant Hollow of Martin, sought to string a radio aerial to the Norris home. Coroner Brady Shepherd, of Prestonsburg, who investigated the tragedy and removed the bodies to the Arnold Funeral Home here, said he learned Flanery threw the aerial across the power line conducting electricity to the truck mine farther up-hollow which Flanery and Norris operated jointly.

Contact of the aerial and power line carrying 2,600 volts resulted instantly in Flanery's death. The victim's young son screamed and ran to his father's rescue and fell on his head resting on his father's shoulder. Moments later, according to the story of the tragedy as constructed through the investigation, Norris stepped from a nearby coal house, bucket in hand. He, too, died instantly—electrocuted either by contact with the wire or through electricity-charged ground.

Mrs. Norris, in her home at the time, ran outside at sound of the boy's scream and received a fatal shock. The belief was expressed that she also received the charge from the ground. Although not instantly killed, she was dead upon arrival at the Beaver Valley hospital.

But for the presence of mind and calm efficiency of Elbert Clarke, a neighbor of the victims, a dozen or more others would have been electrocuted in grief-frenzied attempts to reach the four bodies or while milling about the scene in excitement, residents of Martin said this week.

Clarke armed himself with a piece of timber, they said, and with it not only fought back those venturing dangerously near but also used it in removing the aerial from the power line. Bodies of the four lay within an area of a few square feet and the section of Martin in which the tragedy occurred was quickly packed by an excited crowd.

Mrs. Flanery was forcibly restrained from rushing to her husband and a son, Robert Randolph, was reported as having suffered burns on his hands before Clarke could push him to safety.

The grass in the area where the bodies lay was burned. Time of the tragedy was placed at between 2 and 3 p.m.

Flanery was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Hall Flanery and a native of the Martin vicinity. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Myrtle Frazier Flanery, three children, Billie Jean, Roberta and Robert Randolph, three brothers, John and Tavis Flanery, both of Martin, and Phillip Flanery, of Michigan, and four sisters, Mrs. R. C. Barnett, Mrs. Kelly Dings and Mrs. Linville Hagans, all of Martin, and Miss Nola Flanery, Cleveland, Ohio.

Norris, a World War II navy veteran, was a son of Ben Norris, veteran C. & O. railway engineer. Besides his father, he is survived by two brothers, Jack and Bill Norris.

Mrs. Norris was a daughter of W. S. Frazier, of Martin. Her father and the following brothers and sisters survive: Mrs. Robert Flanery, Otto and Thaw Frazier, all of Martin; Mrs. Lawrence Maggard and Eugene Frazier, of Bypro, and Mrs. Sampa Smith, of Melvin.

Funeral rites for the four victims were conducted Monday afternoon in the Martin theatre, with a crowd of an estimated 1,500 persons packing the building and standing outside. The rites were conducted by Dr. Thomas W. Richard, Salt Lake City, Utah, and Elder Hyram Anderson, of Idaho—all ministers of Church of Latter Day Saints, which Mr. Flanery and Mrs. Norris were members. The burial was made in the Frazier cemetery under direction of the Arnold Funeral Home.

Tragedy Mars Yule For Ivel Family; Tot, Burns Victim

A Christmas Day tragedy at Ivel resulted in the death on the following day at the Prestonsburg General hospital of two-year-old Bobby Eant, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roland Eant, of Ivel. Burns suffered when the tot's clothing caught fire from an open grate caused the child's death.

Surviving, besides the parents, is one brother, Robert. Funeral rites were conducted Sunday, the Rev. Wallace Lewis officiating, and burial was made on Daniel's Creek under direction of the Arnold Funeral Home.
