The farmer loads a 12-gauge shotgun with a special shell containing pollen and a carrier, steps to the windward side of the tree, aims at the upper branches and lets 'er go. Each shell contains a fiftieth of an ounce of standard pollen gathered in the apple region. Five shots take care of a tree.

Of course, if the bees and the wind do right by the trees, a shotgun wedding isn't necessary.

Lear, had started to Huntington, W. Va., but when it was discovered that there was something wrong with the automobile they turned around and were headed back toward Van Lear. 
