If we need electric power for national defense purposes in the near future, we must seek other ways of securing that power. Large hydroelectric projects cannot be constructed quick-

Taft, warning of the inflationary effects of large expenditures on public works, said

"The whole question of flood control is important. But some of these projects waited a number of years and can wait a while longer. We have had floods for 160 years. Whether we build the protection this year or later is not a vital question. But whether we exceed the budget is a vital question."

Taft said that every economist, of the right wing or the left wing, is agreed that public works should be restricted in time of full employment and expanded in times of unemploy-

Alben W. Barkley, of Kentucky, the Democratic leader, took issue with that viewpoint as applied to flood control.

"The purpose of flood control is not to give people work," Barkley said. "It is to protect lives and property. Floods go on during depression years and during prosperity. I can't accept the theory that we want to cut down on such proj ects just because people are at work."



The baseball park, located at the been placed in rearing ponds and tendent of hatcheries, declares, From the Williamsburg hatchery 300,000 fry have been placed in ponds in the Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth and Ninth districts, while 150,000 of these youngsters have been kept at the rearing ponds of the hatchery. From the Trigg hatchery, where the hatch was later, already 125,000 have been distributed, while at least 350,000 additional are expected, and probably more than 100,000 additional will come from the Williamsburg hatchery. Counting the number of fry to be kept by the Division for rearing and for brood stock the total for the season is expected to surpass the million mark, which will ar exceed the greatest distribution in the history of the state hatcheries Clark declared that the price of commercial fry is \$30 per thousand and at this rate fry valued at approximately \$30,000 will have been distributed by the Division this season. Deadline for application for stocking of ponds was April 15. This date was necessary so that distribution routes could be mapped to prevent overlapping of truck trips.
