

# HANCOCK DIES IN CAR WRECK

### Garrett Miner's Skull Crushed As Automobile Overtakes Near Bosco

John S. Hancock, 32 years old, Garrett miner, was almost instantly killed early Saturday night when an auto he occupied overturned in the vicinity of Lick Fork of Salt Lick Creek, crushing his skull. Jim Patrick, also of Garrett, driver of the auto, escaped serious injury.

State police investigated the tragedy and told County Judge Alex L. Davidson a warrant may be asked in the case, but they did not indicate what the charge would be or who would be named.

The victim was a son of the late Luke Hancock and of Mrs. Manuel Fitzpatrick, of Garrett. He is survived by his mother, his widow, two sons, Clarence Ray and Johnny J., one daughter, Gertrude, two brothers, Lawrence Hancock, of Garrett, and George Hancock, Dayton, Ohio, and four sisters, Mrs. Warren Craft, Huesville, Mrs. Thomas Lewis, Dayton, O., Mrs. Melvin Sammons and Mrs. Hobart Cox, both of Garrett.

The funeral was conducted Tuesday morning from the Regular Baptist Church, Stone Coal, the Revs. Alex Coburn and Banner Manns officiating. Burial in the Tom Martin cemetery at West Garrett was directed by the Ryan Funeral Home.

# PIKE-HARLAN ACT OKEHED

### Case Has No Bearing On Redistricting Act Hitting Floyd, Claim

Although the Court of Appeals last Friday upheld constitutionality of the 1948 General Assembly act which created separate judicial districts for Pike and Harlan counties, opponents here of legislation enacted at the same session re-districting other parts of this section were undismayed.

The two acts, they say, have no kinship and an altogether separate question is at issue in the attack on the legislation separating Floyd and Knott counties, creating a separate district in Boyd and making one entirely new district.

A hearing on the motion to dissolve the injunction procured by opponents of the act to prevent Governor Clements from appointing a judge of the new district is expected within the next few days, and opponents of the measure express confidence that they will be able to establish violation of the state constitution.

The Pike-Harlan judicial redistricting act was held invalid at Pikeville by Special Judge Will H. Fulton, of Louisville, on the grounds that neither Harlan nor Pike has a city of 20,000 population as recommended for circuit court districts of one county.

Appellate Judge Clyde B. Latimer commented, however, that Pike and Harlan are not cities.

# LIQUOR RAIDS CATCH SEVEN

### Booze, White and Red, Found by Deputies; 3 Taken on Peace Writs

Seven persons have been arrested within the week by Floyd deputy sheriffs on charges of illegal liquor possession.

First of the raids by officers was made Saturday afternoon at Martin where Herb McGlothen was arrested after two slot machines, approximately a case and a half of whiskey and four cases of beer were found in a place of business he allegedly operated. He executed \$500 cash bond.

Tuesday, search of the Willard Hamilton premises on Mud Creek was fruitless until an officer saw Hamilton walking, barefoot, across a field. They backtracked him to six half-gallons of moonshine. He executed bond for his appearance here Saturday before County Judge Davidson.

The same officers arrested Grant Hall and Ola Newsum on warrants naming them for selling whiskey. Three men arrested over the weekend on drunk charges were booked for possession of illegal liquor. They are Charles Eads, Kirby Newsum and Paul Moserip.

Thomas Riley and Jerry Branham were jailed on drunk driving charges. Jailed Sunday was Azzie Newsum, of the Mud Creek section, who is accused of attempted rape. Bond of \$1,000 was asked for his release on the rape charge and \$2,500 on a peace warrant.

John and Daisy McCoy, of Johns Creek, were arrested Tuesday on a peace warrant after having allegedly threatened their neighbors, and John Challum was brought here on the same day, also on a peace warrant sworn out by his wife who is postmistress at Melvin.

# FORMER JUDGE BUYS BROWN HOTEL HERE

### \$75,000 Is Reported Involved in Purchase Made by H.C. Stephens

Former Circuit Judge Henry Stephens, Jr., assumed management Monday of the Brown hotel here which he purchased last week at a price reported as upwards of \$75,000. Judge Stephens bought the 60-room hotel from Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Brown last week, a few days after he sold his residence and adjoining land near Cliff.

The new owner said re-arrangement of the hotel will be made to accommodate from 10 to a dozen additional guests. Otherwise, he said, operation of the business will be along the same lines so successfully followed by the former owners.

The hotel business which thus changed hands was founded by the late John Sellards as the Sellards hotel, later became known as the Valley Inn, operation of which was continued after his death by his widow, Mrs. Maggie Sellards. After Mrs. Sellards' death, a few years ago, her daughter, Mrs. Brown, and Mr. Brown remodeled the hotel and changed the name to the Brown.

### Both Groups Pledge Work to Community; Playground Stressed

The fraternal and civic groups of Prestonsburg were increased by two Wednesday night when the Prestonsburg Eerie, Fraternal Order of Eagles, and the Prestonsburg Lions Club were organized.

Institution meeting of the Eagles was held at Odd Fellows Hall with 125 members and visitors from other cities attending. Prestonsburg Eerie had a membership of 172 at its first meeting, and was said by Roy Burton, organizer, and Delbert Glaser, Cincinnati, deputy grand auditor, to have the second largest membership in Kentucky upon organization.

Twenty-five business and professional men formed the membership of the Lions Club on organization by C. C. Den Herder, Louisville, special representative of Lions International. The club here was organized under sponsorship of the Wayland Lions Club which was represented at Wednesday evening's meeting by Frank E. Harmon, J. C. Wells, A. N. Cooley and Roy Souleyrette.

# Four 'Cash Registers,' 9 Cases of Beer Found In Prater Cr. Cornfield

A Prater Creek family, hoisting corn last Friday morning, made a discovery. A hurried phone call was made to officers here.

"There's nine cases of beer and four cash registers up here in the field," a woman telephoned officers here.

Two hours later, the find was at the office of Deputy Sheriff Epp Lafayette—the nine cases of beer and the "cash registers," which to the initiated are better known as slot machines.

The loot apparently had been hurriedly abandoned. The money was still in the "cash registers." There was no clue as to the identity of the persons who left the beer and machines in the field, nor could officers learn, it was said, whence the loot came.

# COURT TEST POSSIBILITY

### For Lewis in Union Shop Clause Defense; 'Captive Mines' Reject New Pact

John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers, may have to go to court to defend the union-shop clause in his 1948 soft-coal contract.

Industry officials revealed that U. S. Steel and nine other operators of "captive" coal mines are being polled on whether unfair labor-practice charge should be filed against Lewis with the National Labor Relations Board.

The companies refused to sign the wage contract which Lewis concluded last week with the rest of the industry. They maintained that its union shop clause is a violation of the Taft-Hartley act.

The clause provided that "all employees shall be, or become, members of the United Mine Workers" except in certain classifications.

The Taft-Hartley law bans the union shop until at least 51 per cent of the employees vote for it in a N.L.R.B. election. And it is an unfair labor practice to try to force an employer to sign an agreement against his wishes.

Lewis cannot petition the N.L.R.B. for an election, although there is little doubt that his U.M.W. members would vote overwhelmingly for the union shop. To obtain an election, the mine boss would have to file the non-Communist affidavit required by the Taft-Hartley law. He has refused to do so on grounds of principle.

Harry M. Moses, chief negotiator for U.S. Steel and other "captive" mine-owners, said his companies were willing to go along with the wage increases granted by other operators, but will not "knowingly or consciously" defy the federal laws.

# STATE POLICE IN OPERATION

### No Politics, Promise Of Crowe; Police Get Enforcement Authority

Today (Thursday) a new law enforcement agency, the state police department, came into being in Kentucky.

Although detailed plans for operation of the state police remain to be formed in many of its phases, it was announced recently that the department's first director, Guthrie T. Crowe, a war veteran, is determined to keep it clear of the taint of politics.

The state police supplants the state highway patrol which was restricted in its activities to enforcing traffic and motor vehicle laws on the state's highways. The new police force, said to have been modeled after the best state police systems in the United States, will have full police powers equal to those possessed by county enforcement officers.

The bill creating the state police was passed by the 1948 Legislature. It had the stern support of Governor Earle C. Clements who refused to yield to labor's demand that the state police be prohibited from attending industrial disputes and strikes.

State police, in the beginning, will patrol only county areas and sixth class cities. The mayors and police chiefs of cities of the first five classes, however, may request the

# SPEED TRAP NON-EXISTENT

### Says Allen Official, Claiming Action Taken To Slow Down Traffic

"There is no speed trap in Allen," a member of the city council there declared Wednesday in answer to a Times query after several reports had been received here telling of motorists being fined in Allen police court for speeding.

Policeman Ben Collison has, on the insistence of residents of the upper section of the town, been halting motorists driving too fast and to these have been issued tickets, this source said. Upon reporting at the police judge's office there, however, the drivers are warned against speeding and, except in two instances, released without fines, it was said. One of those fined ran the traffic light after he had been halted by the officer, the Allen official said.

The councilman said there have been two or three wrecks at the upper limits of the town where approximately 50 children reside. Parents there, he said, have demanded that traffic be slowed down.

# Prestonsburg Might Vote Wet Says Hoshal, Dry Leader; Talk Of City Liquor Monopoly Heard

Although no petition seeking a local option election in Prestonsburg under the new Kentucky law has been circulated to date, talk of such a move has increased and with this talk came a new local liquor control plan.

This plan, private discussed, would provide a liquor monopoly in Prestonsburg, with one liquor store operating under city ownership or under private management, with the city receiving all net profits.

Sentiment of city councilmen and other officials has been sought on such a move but it has progressed no further than the talking stage. The plan was originated, shortly after a move was launched to raise city tax assessments and gain needed revenues for operation and improvement of the town. A monopoly of this sort, it has been explained to officials, would obviate the necessity of more taxes, would eliminate all but one liquor store and would place the business under close scrutiny and control.

One source estimated a one-store liquor business in Prestonsburg, and under the law the only such store in the county, would net the city of Prestonsburg around \$100,000 a year.

# FORMER WAYLAND SCHOOLBOY HAILED AS HERO AFTER RESCUE OF GIRL, 14, FROM BIG SANDY AT WEST VAN LEAR

Fourteen-year-old Johnnie Price, of Hager Hill, former Wayland schoolboy, is being acclaimed a hero after his rescue of Helen Caudill, 14, from drowning last week in the Big Sandy river at West Van Lear.

The boy, a son of Mrs. Cleburn Price and a nephew of Bill Honshell, of Wayland, was hoeing corn in a nearby field when he heard screams. He ran approximately 300 yards to the stream and saw two girls struggling in the water. He contrived to swim to safety with the Caudill girl, but her companion, 15-year-old

Martha Carol Bayes, was drowned. "I looked back and saw Martha Carol go down as I was bringing Helen in to the bank," the boy said, adding, "You don't know the awful feeling to see some one drowning when you can't get to them quick enough to save them."

Body of the Bayes girl was not recovered till 90 minutes later. The Caudill girl who was rescued is a daughter of Lunda Caudill, who is well-known in this county where he operated a fruit truck for his brother, Fred Caudill.

# NOT TRUMAN BUT BARKLEY

### For President, Leaders Tell Mineworkers Monday During Meet at Pikeville

United Mine Workers, meeting in Pikeville Monday for the announced purpose of explaining provisions of the new coal contract, took time out to look about for friends along the political front and to take verbal pot-shots at those in politics whom they consider their enemies.

Sam Caddy, president of UMW District 30, and Tom Raney, Pikeville, international board member, addressed a gathering of approximately 1,000 miners, and they urged labor to support Senator Alben W. Barkley of Kentucky for the Presidency of the United States instead of President Truman.

The two union leaders also suggested that miners in captive mines which have not yet signed the new contract could do what they wanted when the miners' vacation ends.

Described President Truman on his recent Western tour as "grinning like a Missouri mule eating saviers."

Raney, who spoke briefly before introducing Caddy, told members that the union had been turned into a political football.

He urged the union members to vote against Rep. Virgil E. Chapman (D-Ky.) of Paris, who is a candidate for nomination to the Senate, and Rep. W. Howes Meade (R-Ky.) of Paintsville, candidate for re-election.

Raney said, "Loyal union members" cannot vote for Meade.

"The only thing to do is to retire Meade back to the farm," he added. Switching to Chapman, Raney said: "Chapman is so rotten I can't vote for him and you can't if you are loyal union men."

Caddy told the miners, "Don't worry about the captive mines signing up, boys. They will very soon."

He listed three captive pits—Inland Steel Company at Wheelwright,

# TASK OF AKERS TO UP VALUES 3 1/2 MILLIONS

### Reeves Says County Assessments Must Be Upped for '48

Today, July 1, began a new fiscal year, and there probably wasn't anybody less happy about it than Tax Commissioner Clive Akers.

For he had the unpleasant task of undertaking a countywide assessment which, he has been told with a good deal of emphasis, must total a minimum of three and a half million dollars more than last year's assessment.

Floyd, Knott, Johnson, Boyd and Perry were among 28 counties mentioned recently by H. Clyde Reeves, chairman of the State Tax Commission, whose eligibility to school equalization fund benefits was questionable this year because of assessments below the state average. All these counties except Johnson are sharing in the fund, however, since they accepted blanket assessment increases. Johnson refused and does not share.

Wrote Mr. Reeves to Superintendent of Public Instruction Hodgkin: "If the Commission had followed sound and conservative principles in determining the districts which had average assessments, these... would not have been certified as eligible for equalization funds..."

"Unless," continued Mr. Reeves, "these counties show a substantial improvement in their assessments made as of July 1, 1948, they should not expect to be certified by this commission for equalization fund benefits next year."

Two years ago, Mr. Akers said, he had the county assessment up, through increased evaluation on mineral lands, to approximately the required figure. The Board of Supervisors, however, cut the figure back. "I hope," Mr. Akers said this week, "that supervisors are appointed this year who will not back assessments to the point that a blanket raise is necessary, for a blanket raise hits the fellow who is barely making ends meet as well as the big company with all its resources. The assessment I made two years ago raised values, almost altogether, on mineral, and affected the small taxpayer little if any."

# HALL MAIMED NEAR HUNTER

### Arm of Merchant Torn Away by Passing Truck, Police Seeking Tackett

Kentucky state police this week were seeking the arrest of Irvin Tackett, of the Mud Creek section, in connection with the maiming Saturday night of Lee B. (Buddy) Hall, McDowell merchant, whose left arm was torn away when hit by a truck allegedly driven by Tackett.

A warrant was issued here by County Judge Alex L. Davidson for the arrest of Tackett, but police had not located him as of Wednesday afternoon.

State police were told that a truck veered suddenly toward Hall's truck near Hunter, as he was turning homeward and that the bed of the truck wrenched his arm away near the elbow. The arm was said to have been found, 50 feet away, on the bank at the upper side of the highway.

The truck which hit Hall, an elderly man, did not stop, and state police quickly threw out road blocks which failed to apprehend the driver. Hall was taken to the Beaver Valley hospital, Martin, where an operation on the arm was performed. He will recover, it was said.

The only early description of the hit-run truck available to officers was a "red truck." Later, bloodstains were reported to have been found on a truck in the headwaters of Mud Creek.

Harlan each have populations of about 100,000. He said Pike and Harlan circuit courts now have such congested dockets that citizens are unable to get prompt trials.

He noted the constitution states counties with populations of 40,000, including a city of 20,000, "may" be made separate circuit court districts. Harlan and Pike counties do not have any cities of 20,000.

Latimer reviewed the constitutional debates of 1891 and concluded that the debaters desired to base re-districting on population, territory, and business. He indicated that 40,000 was a compromise.

If a petition for reconsideration is not filed by July 30, a mandate will go out then ordering this revision of Southeastern Kentucky districts:

The 26th district, currently composed of Harlan and Bell counties, will become Harlan alone.

The 33rd, now Leslie and Perry, will become Letcher and Perry.

The 35th, now Letcher and Pike, will become Pike alone.

A new district, the 41st, will be composed of Bell, shorn from the 26th, and Leslie, taken from the 33d.

**Three Raises Too Much**

THE TIMES hopes public officials and citizens of this section lose little time in protesting the proposed rate increase by the Southern Bell Telephone & Telegraph Company.

Three raises in eighteen months are too much to bear without remonstrance.

When the Southern Bell workers won pay increases through a strike, we telephone subscribers helped pay the tariff through a rate increase.

Now that the company is well along in a development program, a costly undertaking, we admit, and one which the company admits is badly needed, Southern Bell asks for more money from its subscribers for a service that is far from normal.

We know nothing of the company's financial difficulties, if any, but our ignorance of such matters does not blind us to the no small matter of common justice. It is apparent that the telephone business is a paying proposition; otherwise Southern Bell would have been out of it, long since. And, if it is a profitable enterprise, Southern Bell should maintain its lines, build new lines and provide for public service without inflicting on the public a series of rate increases.

Inflation doubtless has played its part in making the company's charges greater, but the coincidence of one increase with a hike in wages and of another with a construction program makes the whole matter look suspiciously like Southern Bell wants the public to make its capital investment for it as well as to provide the profits of the business.

Rates could have been raised more graciously and less painfully, had the company waited until its subscribers began feeling they were getting value received at the old prices.

**ONE SIDE OF THE BUS STRIKE**

(A statement of principles of Local Union 547, United Construction Workers, Dist. No. 50, United Mine Workers of America.)

Wouldn't you think that the Sparks Brothers who started a small business and with the help of loyal employes have built one of the most thriving businesses in Eastern Kentucky would have some consideration and respect for the loyal employes who have helped to build this business?

Wouldn't you think that an employer who sits down and bargains collectively would honor his word and not come back home and slip another clause that was not agreed to into a contract? This can be substantiated by Federal Conciliator Wilson.

Wouldn't you think a man who agrees to pay by the mile for driving a bus in a duly signed contract would agree to official mileage to Hazard and other points? Mr. Sparks agreed in 1946 that a committee from the union, along with representatives from the company, should check the mileage from Prestonsburg to all bus terminals. This was never done, despite the fact that we have requested on several occasions that the company honor its word by sending their representatives with us. The net result is that the drivers of Sparks Brothers Bus Company have lost over \$2,200 in the past year.

Wouldn't you think that, with the highest bus fares charged by any bus line in Eastern Kentucky, Sparks Brothers would pay wages comparable with other lines? Scott-Nichols Bus Company employes recently received \$1.40 per day increase in wages while we agreed to

work for the same wages. Compare these rates—the fare from Paintsville to Lexington, a distance of 128 miles, \$2.20; from Prestonsburg to Wheelwright on the Sparks Bros. bus, a distance of 40 miles, the fare is 95c—yet Greyhound drivers' wages far exceed our wages. The Scott-Nichols drivers' wages also far exceed our wages.

Would you believe that we agreed to leave the no-strike clause in the contract, despite rumors to the contrary? Wouldn't you think, Mr. Public Citizen, that an employer who will not render to the public the service he should because he is anti-union that the Motor Transport Division of the state of Kentucky should step in and withdraw the franchise to operate buses now held by the Sparks Brothers Bus Company?

We submit the above facts, all of which can be substantiated by reputable citizens of Floyd county. Surely the long-suffering public will be willing to join in righting the wrongs so long endured by us, the employes of the Sparks Brothers Bus Company.

state police commissioner to give state officers jurisdiction in their communities. This would have the effect of augmenting local police forces.  
But if cities of the first classes do not request aid from the state police, their territory may be entered by Kentucky cops under these conditions:  
1. When in hot pursuit of a real or supposed law breaker.  
2. When in search of a real or supposed offender wanted for a crime committed outside the city limits.  
3. When interviewing or seeking to interview witnesses.  
4. When requested by the mayor or city police chief on a specific matter.  
5. When ordered by the Governor in an emergency.  
Possible effects the state police may have on currently unharrassed crime operations could be numerous. Likely to get the early brunt of scrutiny are bootleggers, roadhouses in dry territory and gambling citadels.
