Fish age studies are a vital first step in making fishing better in our lakes and streams, reports Robert O. Beatty, conservation director of the

It works like this: Local anglers contend that nearby Mud Lake is fished out, so a team of fishery biologists is called to diagnose the case. They make a collection of the various species of fish in Mud Lake and do an age and growth study of them. That is, they study the fish scales. The big value of scale readings is the rate of growth, not just the fact that a given fish is so many

Contrary to popular belief, every circle on a fish scale does not represent a years growth. It marks a layer of bone which is formed in relation to the conditions of existence encountered at the time of its formation. Thus, during periods of poor growth, as in winter or during spawning, these rings do not complete their growth. When normal growth is resumed the incomplete growth forms a more or less disinct ring. There may be a number of these in any year. It is by counting the number of true annual rings that the age of a fish is determined

The biologists at Mud Lake find it teeming with bluegills and gass. But they are all small. Yet the scale readings show 70 per cent of the fish in the lake to be three or four years old-time for bluegills to get up to eight inches and bass to two or three

The answer is too many fish for the amount of food, cover, and spawning ground available - not enough fishing instead of too much. With this information to start on size and bag regulations can b changed and other remedies intro-

Thus we see that by knowing the growth rate and general weight of fish in a lake we can tell if that lake is producing the size and number of fish it should. If it isn't, we can do something about it. But first we've got to find out-and fish scales can tell us.

Thirty-one miners died from an explosion the day after Christmas, 1945, in the Straight Creek Coal Co. No. 1 mine. Seven men were brought out alive by rescuers, but two of them died.

Uncontrolled fires forced volunteers to leave 20 or more bodies in the mine some 9,000 feet from its up and abandoned.

A. D. Sisk, chief of Kentucky's Bureau of Mines and Minerals, healing powers and the lovasked an opinion as to legality of the appropriation before starting the task of cutting an entry into the mine to reach the bodies.

The assistant attorney general explained the state Constitution limits levying and use of tax money to public purposes and prohibits it being spent for debts of cities, counties, individuals or corporations, unless contracted for in defense of the commonwealth.

The state had no contract with the coal company, or the miners, said Holifield, adding:

"The opening of shafts to privately owned mines is a private and not a public purpose. The exhuming of dead bodies, unless for the purpose of detecting crime, is a private and not a public enterprise.

"If the estate of the decedents are not able to pay for the expenses of their burial, it is the duty and obligation of the county where the decedents were domiciled, and not the obligation of the state."

Lew Wallace's 'Ben Hur' was a work of fiction but a work so fine that it told with Prestonsburg General hospital. a very real verisimilitude the story of Christ and his times. Memorable characters of that memorable book were Ben Hur's mother and his sister, the gentle Tirzah, who through no fault of their own became lepers, outcasts shunned by the more fortunate, forced to dwell among the tombs and set apart from others by that tragic cry, "Unclean! Unclean!"

Objects of horror, stoned, reduced to the despair of the living-dead, the spirit of these two were unchanged. And they found in the Christ loving-kindness, recognition of their own worth as human beings, and restoration to health.

Down the centuries that same cry, "Unclean! Unclean!" has echoed, and so the sufferer from one of mankind's oldest and most baffling diseases was marked as a pariah to be shunned and forgotten. Only One greater than man was a friend to the leper until medical science, never admitting defeat, always seeking physical salvation for the hopeless, began slowly to edge toward an understanding of this ancient

Finally, men of science and medicine learned that the leper is not dangerous. that the disease is not easily contracted. Gradually they gained ground, step by step ach by inch, in their search

And so in the newspapers there recently appeared a picture which told this story, established this parallel for those who have read of leprosy, its sufferers, the hopelessness which since time immemorial has gripped those stricken by it.

It was the picture of Joseina Guerrero, the heroic "Joey" of the days when her native Philippines were under the Japanese heel and when American boys were dying for that country's reedom.

"Joey" is a leper. Although she smuggled food through the Japanese lines, carried messages to Amercan soldiers, drew maps and charts of Jap gun emplace-ments and mine fields, all at risk of her own life, had she lived a short half-century ago she would have been shunned almost as if she were another Tirzah.

But the picture tells another story. In San Francisco she was a smiling Joey, surrounded by admiring army officers, doctors, churchmen and officials. Her arms were full of flowers and gifts. A grateful nation had placed at her disposal an air force plane to take her to a Louisiana hospital for the treatment men have devised through long, painstaking, discouraging hours of study and experiment.

Not to the tombs for Joey.

They could have loaded Joey with medals and Joey could have died with them as other heroes have died, bitterly eyeing those inanimate, worthless reminders of days of glory.

And, but for man's eternal climb upward, they could have cried, "Unclean!" and forgotten her as millions before her were forgotten.




