Swamping or upsetting from big waves is the greatest hazard of small boating. The newcomer to boating should stick to sheltered waters until thoroughly familiar with his craft. One of his toughest jobs is to learn to avoid collisions with objects under Exciting water. Here are a few elementary GRANDSTAND Don't start the outboard unless Shows headed straight out toward clear water, and with at least six inches of water under the lowest part of the motor. Never start an outboard where it is too congested and unnec essarily shallow. When underway, avoid weedbeds: den't go too close to shore, and slow CONTESTS down at once if logs or recks are present., or if shallow bottom is and Events seen passing under the boat. Stay well clear of jutting pcints of land Reduce speed if any man-made obstructions are seen above water. Keep speed down off rocky shores. Treat all floating objects with respect and stick to marked channel in unfamiliar waters. The beginner must learn never to underestimate the power of waves, or to take chances with them. Particularly must he guard against swells of other boats and he mus not carelessly swamp another bca with his own wake. Always head into dangerous waves. This is an invariable rule of boating. Making the landing, the final step in boat operation, is something that can be learned only by experience It is better for the beginner to err on the side of a too-slow landing until he has learned the best speed and just how to handle the boat at that speed.
