OKEHS VETS' TAX REFUNDS

Judge Ardery Holds Tax on Military Pay Should Be Refunded

State income-tax refunds to veterans were approved late Tuesday at Frankfort by Circuit Judge W. B. Ardery. He explained he had made a cral ruling in a test suit filed in behalf of Thomas F. Marshall, Frankfort. He directed Blakey Helm and Lee S. Jones, attorneys for Marshall, to draw up a formal order for him to sign. The 1948 General Assembly authorized that state income-tax payments made on military pay in World War II be refunded or credited to future payments. Some veterans, however, now are not making enough to pay the state income tax and thus could not benefit from credits. The test suit was presented to determine whether refunds can be made under Kentucky's Constitution. Whether the state will take the case to the Court of Appeals for final ruling is expected to be determined after the formal order has been signed by Judge Ardery. The ruling gave Marshall a \$90.32 refund on income taxes paid when he was in military service.

CITIES INVITE STATE POLICE

To Join Local Officers In Enforcement of Law; Law Requires Request

Thirty-two Kentucky cities, including Paintsville and Louisa in the Big Sandy area, have formally authorized the state police to join local officers in law enforcement within their corporate limits. The same action is expected to be considered soon by Prestonsburg authorities. In creating the new state force, the 1948 General Assembly forbade its members to go into cities of the first five population classes for general police duties except on request of city officials. Police Commissioner Guthrie T. Crowe in announcing that 32 cities have granted authorization, said others are expected to do so. He named the 32 as: Augusta, Barbourville, Berea, Brooksville, Burkesville, Cadiz, Clinton, Carlisle, Everts, Falmouth, Flemingsburg, Franklin, Georgetown, Glasgow, Greenville, Harrodsburg, Hazard, Henderson, Hopkinsville, LaGrange, Lancaster, Lawrenceburg, Louisa, Marion, Morton's Gap, Mount Vernon, Owingsville, Paintsville, Paducah, Paris, and Richmond.

2 WITNESSES JAILED HERE

Negrees Held in Failure To Appear Before Jury; Return 5 from Prison

Jailed here Tuesday on contempt of court charges after they had failed to appear as grand jury witnesses in a murder investigation were Gordon Jones and John Williams, Wheelwright negroes. The two had been recognized as witnesses in the slaying of John Johnson by Isaac Smothers in the colored clubhouse at Wheelwright, in June. They said they did not know they were expected to appear here. The two remained in jail this morning (Thursday) and will not be released, it was said, without adequate bond. Five Floyd countians now inmates of the LaGrange reformatory are being returned here by Sheriff Troy B. Sturgill to appear as either principals or witnesses in circuit court trials next week. Charles Bates and Dewey Gibson are to testify in the murder trial of Albert Hall, slated for next Wednesday; Collie Salisbury in the grand larceny trial of Johnnie Martin and Edward Smith; Charlie and Basil Compton, brothers, in the shooting and wounding case in which they and others are defendants Monday.

START WORK ON CLEARING

Of Reservoir Area; Filling of Barrier Itself Near Finish

Farrens Tree Surgery, Jacksonville, Fla., last week began work as sub-contractors on the clearing project in the Dewey reservoir area, another of several work phases which must be completed before the Johns Creek valley is inundated. Contract for removal of timber, undergrowth and shrubs from the area was awarded by the U.S. Corps of Engineers to the Wyoming Valley Nursery, of Pennsylvania, and at least a part of the work was subcontracted to Farrens. A crew of approximately 40 men is now working with others possibly to be added to the force. Work now is in the immediate vicinity of the dam at Dewey. Clearing will be done to 650 feet elevation. Where the diversion of Johns Creek has created a backwater pool, brush and timber will be cleared only to the present water level. Upstream from that sector, trees will be cut close to the ground. Completion of the earthen fill forming the barrier across the Johns Creek valley should be completed within the next month, it was learned here this week. Yet much remains to be done after that. An access road remains to be built, completion of the outlet and intake works, spillway concreting, excavation for a dam-tender's cottage and relocation of graves are among these unfinished jobs. The earthen dam itself now is at elevation 690 and is approaching its peak. No prediction has been made by any authorized official as to the date when the lake will begin to fill. This may not be until late spring or next summer, was one prediction. Also to be done before the dam project may be considered complete is the acquisition of property rights in the reservoir area. It became known here, a few days ago, that the federal government has refused to accept title to at least two tracts of land on Johns Creek because all taxes have not been paid on them for a full period of 10 years. On one of these tracts, it was said.

END OF DRAFT REGISTRATION YET DISTANT

Clerk Seeks Help To Speed Work Here; Deadline, Saturday

Although the nationwide registration of men 18 through age 25 is scheduled to be completed with the end of this week, it was evident, days ago, that registration must continue in Floyd county past the deadline and possibly for weeks to come. Miss Emogene Allen, of Northern, clerk of the draft board here, said Wednesday that approximately 2,000 Floyd countians have been registered. How many more remain to be registered, she made no attempt to estimate, although she expressed the belief the job is no more than half done. Working with only one registration center established in the county, and with never more than three assistants, sometimes two, Miss Allen appealed for volunteer help. "We are doing our best but as fast as we can work does not keep registrants from having to stand for long periods in line, waiting to take their turn." Help from volunteers, she pointed out, not only will be a patriotic service but also will be helping those who must register. In October, 1940 when men from 21 to 35 were required to register, more than 6,000 Floyd county men were registered in a single day, with registration being made at 51 of the county's voting precincts. Long lines formed here, every morning this week, in front of the Combs building on First avenue and through the day would-be registrants became restive as they waited to register in the draft board office upstairs. Tuesday, A. B. Combs, part-owner of the building, closed the door when it appeared the crowd might cause damage. The same action was taken Wednesday, the draft board clerk said, adding that no damage had been done.

GRAND JURY INDICTS 70

Name 8 After Probe Of Storehouse Break; Indicts Coal Company

After making approximately 70 indictments last week, the Floyd circuit court grand jury adjourned till Sept. 29 for remainder of its nine-day session. Indictment of eight persons resulted from the jury's investigation of the robbery of Raymond Turner's store at Drift and the disposition of stolen goods. Named for knowingly receiving stolen property were Mrs. Ann Clevenger, Bob Wiley, Everett Wiley, Lebanan Clevenger, Clede Cecil, Mrs. Grace Hewitt, Earl Hall and Jackie Hall, the latter being held here without bond as ringleader-suspect in a widespread series of lootings. Mrs. Clevenger's bond was set at \$1,000. Earl Hall, named by Jackie Hall as having purchased stolen goods from him, was placed under \$2,000 bail, and the bonds of all others was fixed at \$2,500. The only bill filed since last Wednesday morning involving gunplay was that against Foster Brewer, who is charged with shooting and wounding Luther Allen at Garrett. Evidence produced by Bernard Baldrige, county conservation officer, and residents of the vicinity of Martin resulted in the indictment of the Utilities Elkhorn Coal Company on a charge of stream pollution. The indictment followed what was described as the wiping out of all fish between Martin and Allen when poisonous waters from the company's mine were permitted to enter Beaver Creek. Another indictment involving the conservation officer was that lodged against James Trimble, of Ivel, who was accused of obstructing justice. Conservation Officer Baldrige alleged that Trimble followed him and demanded the release of Charles Conn whom the officer had arrested on a game law infraction. Another indictment made by the Floyd county jury with obstructing justice named Junior Howell who.

Hinkle Electrocuted While Working Alone In Mine at McDowell

Body of Bert Hinkle, 51 years old, was found late Friday afternoon in a small mine on Doty Creek, near McDowell, where he had worked alone during the day, and death was held the result of electrocution. The body was discovered by a son who went in search of his father when the latter failed to return to his nearby home when expected. Investigation disclosed, it was said, that he was electrocuted while attempting to connect an electric wire to a water pump inside the mine. Surviving the victim are his widow, Mrs. Florence Moore Hinkle, 10 children, a brother, Crit Hinkle, Stidham, Ky., and two sisters, Mrs. Len Wells, Wabaso, Fla., and Mrs. George Fleming, Hardy, Ky. Mr. Hinkle was a native of Martin county. His funeral was conducted Monday from the graveside in the Lucy Hall cemetery at McDowell. His chest was crushed. Junior Allen, the driver, whose address was also given as Brainard, escaped with minor hurts. It was said the auto left the highway, struck a culvert and plunged into a field, ramming a tree. Adams was thrown clear of the car, however, before it stopped. Surviving the victim are his parents, Hargis and Carrie Whitaker Adams, of Brainard, five brothers and four sisters: Cecil, Aaron, Henry, Merrill, Ellis, Helen, Omagene, Opal and Mary Beatrice Adams, all of Brainard. 'The' Goodman, Victim At Portsmouth, Ohio; Funeral Is Held Here

Isaac Richmond Goodman, 40 years old, native Floyd county man and former star Prestonsburg athlete, died suddenly at his home in Portsmouth, O., Sunday morning following an illness of six months of stomach trouble. A son of G. L. Goodman, of Prestonsburg, and of the late Settle Calhoun Goodman, he was born on Bull Creek, near here, and spent all his life until manhood in this vicinity. He had resided for the last five years in Portsmouth where he was owner of a dental laboratory. Surviving, besides his father, are his widow, Mrs. Opal Parsley Goodman, four sons, Robert Irwin, Ronald Eugene, Larry Madison and Richard Lee, all of Portsmouth, five brothers, John Goodman, of Louisville, Tom Goodman, Pikeville, Neilson Goodman, Wilmington, O., Houston and Jack whose present addresses are unavailable. He also leaves three half-brothers and two half-sisters, Robert, Joe, Samuel, Ruth and Mary Catherine, all at home. The body was brought here Monday to the home of his widow's parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Parsley, and funeral rites were conducted Wednesday afternoon from the Presbyterian Church, the Rev. Harold Black officiating. Burial was made in the May cemetery here under direction of the Carter & Callihan Funeral Home.

POLL OF JURY REPORTED 11-1 AS TRIAL ENDS

Week-Long Trial Packs Courtroom In Latter Stages

The jury in the trial of Fred Dickerson, charged with murder in the slaying here last April of James Roark, Jr., was discharged Sunday morning by Special Judge Jean L. Auxier, Pikeville, as hopelessly disagreed. The trial thus ended on the sixth day after the task of empaneling a jury was begun last Tuesday, first day of the court term. The jury of seven men and four women received the case Saturday afternoon. A report via the "grapevine" said the jury at the time of its discharge stood 11 to 1 for acquittal. Second trial of the case was set for January 17. The trial, once the hearing of evidence got under way Thursday, drew crowds which packed the courtroom at every session. Fifteen Commonwealth witnesses testified and the defense had an equal or greater number. The Commonwealth produced evidence claiming Roark was shot and fatally wounded while sitting, unarmed and offering no offense, in Dickerson's drug store here. Consensus of this testimony was to the effect that Dickerson entered the drug store and without speaking opened fire. Some of this evidence stated Dickerson remarked, in reply to his wife, that "I told him I would kill him." Others quoted him as saying, "I told you I would kill him," or that "I told him to stay out." The defendant himself testified Roark had repeatedly threatened to kill him and that the other moved as if to draw a gun before he fired. Burden of defense testimony was a story of repeated acts of intimidation on the part of the victim and of the fear the defendant entertained for his life. One defense witness, Edward Gayheart, told of finding a revolver, said to have been the victim's, in a taxicab in which the wounded man was taken to the Prestonsburg General hospital. It was testified that Dickerson had asked Roark to stay out of his place of business following an altercation in which Roark swung at the other and that Roark, a short time before the shooting, told Dickerson at the door of the building he would kill him. Trial of Deputy Sheriff Harold Conn, charged with the murder of Arthur Hall at Boldman, was postponed this week till Monday of next week. Two-year pen terms resulted this week from the trials of Boyd Barnett on a charge of knowingly receiving stolen property and of Lee Hamilton for cutting and wounding Andrew Tackett. Mack Johnson drew \$50 fines on charges of drunkenness and breach of the peace. Billy Joe Hall and Verlin Sparks were each given 60-day jail terms and fines of \$100 on their conviction of illegal transportation of liquor. A fine of \$128.50 was assessed Wednesday morning of Hobert Spurlock for illegal fishing on Left Beaver Creek.

RECEIVERSHIP END SIGHTED

Elk Horn Coal's Debt Of \$2,667,000 Paid As Earnings Rocket

The Elk Horn Coal Corporation, owner of the big coal operation at Wayland in this county and of 191,000 acres of coal lands in this and surrounding counties of Eastern Kentucky, is ready to shed its receivership. This statement was made in Baltimore, Md., last week after The Mitchell-Hoffman Company had completed an analysis of Elk Horn operations. The report said results of "strict receivership," plus increased prices and demand for coal, had enabled the coal company to show a decided improvement in earnings. Retirement of the funded debt of the corporation, which had reached a peak of \$2,667,000 in 1944, nearly had been completed by the end of 1947, the report said. (See Story No. 4, Page 4)

Notice is hereby given that the undersigned will, pursuant to an order and resolution duly adopted by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Wayland, Floyd county, Kentucky, at the door of the Town Hall (in the office building of Elk Horn Coal Corporation), of said town, between the hours of 2:00 and 4:00 in the afternoon on the 29th day of September, 1948, offer for sale to the highest and best bidder, and receive bids for the right, privilege, franchise and authority to acquire, maintain, construct, and operate in, above, under, across, and along the streets, thoroughfares, alleys, bridges

and public places (as the same now exist or may hereafter be laid out) of the town of Wayland, Floyd County, Kentucky, lines, poles and equipment for the distribution of electric energy, either by means of overhead or underground conductors, with all necessary or desirable appurtenances for the purpose of supplying electric energy to said town and the inhabitants thereof, and persons or corporations beyond the limits thereof, for light, heat, power, and any other purpose or purposes for which electric energy is now or may hereafter be used, and for the transmission of the same within, through, or across said town subject to the following conditions, to-wit:

(a.) Said lines and appurtenances shall be constructed so as to interfere as little as possible with the traveling public in its use of the streets, thoroughfares, alleys, bridges and public places. The location of all lines or conduits shall be made under the supervision of the proper Board or Committee of the town government.

(b.) The right, privilege and franchise shall be in full force and effect for a period of twenty (20) years from the date of the ordinance granting such franchise.

(c.) The grantee of such franchise shall save the town harmless from any and all liability arising in any way from negligence in erection, maintenance, or operation of said lines and appurtenances.

(d.) Whenever the grantee of this franchise begins the erection of any lines or other equip-

ment said work shall be prosecuted to completion without any undue delay, and the streets, thoroughfares, alleys, bridges and public places where such work is done shall be left in as good condition of repair as before such work was commenced.

(e.) Wherever in such franchise either the town of Wayland or the grantee of such franchise is referred to, it shall be deemed to include the respective successors or assigns or either and all rights, privileges and obligations contained in such franchise shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the respective successors or assigns to said town or said grantee whether so expressed or not.

(f.) The grantee of such franchise may make rules and regulations covering the furnishing of said electric energy as may be fair and reasonable and consistent with the standard practice of the grantee. Said grantee shall render such service under said franchise of like quality that is, adequate, efficient and reasonable, to that customarily rendered to towns of the class in question.

## Utilities Elkhorn Safety Measures Are Commended

A federal coal mine inspector endorses many recent safety improvements in the 1,300-ton-a-day Martin No. 8 mine and recommends additional rock-dusting and other precautionary measures in a report released by the Bureau of Mines. Operated by the Utilities Elkhorn Coal Company, the mine employed 235 men when Leslie Johnson reinspected it in July.

The greater part of the mine had been well rock-dusted, and coal-dust accumulations were removed from the tippie. However, Inspector Johnson proposed rock-dusting to within 80 feet of the faces of some dry rooms, and elsewhere as needed to minimize dust-explosion dangers, using water or other means to alloy coal dust during cutting, removing coal-dust accumulations from one roadway, and dusttight electric motors for dusty tippie places.

Inspector Johnson endorsed the improvement in ventilation, and progress in installing concrete-block stoppings and air-lock doors. Permissible explosives and permissible single-shot blasting units were used for on-shift blasting, but the inspector suggested firing all shots or series immediately after charging, and examinations for gas and roof-testing before and after all blasting. He commended the new explosives-storage magazine, and the fire-proof door on the detonator magazine.

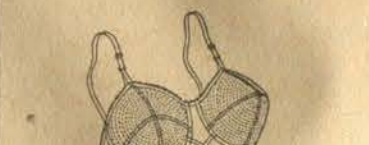

Alfalfa acreage, in Montgomery county increased by at least 100 acres last spring, and indications are for a far larger increase this fall.

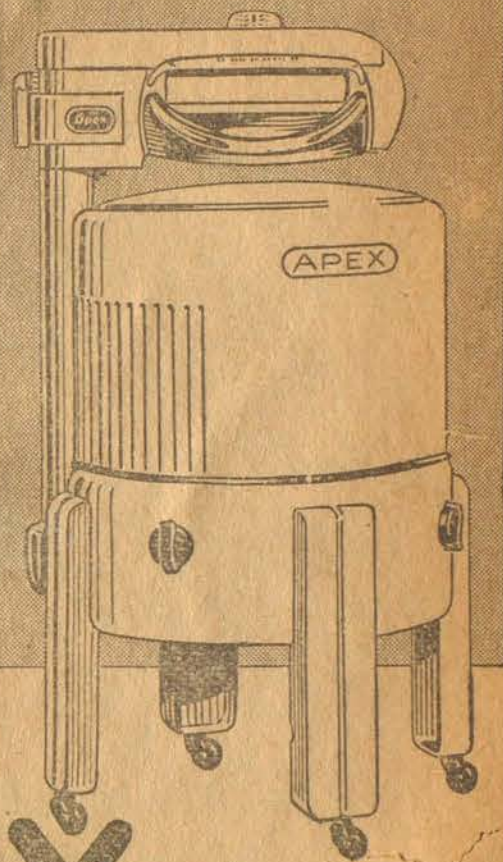

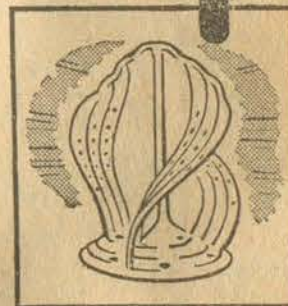

**INJUSTICE VIA THE LAW**

I believe I have told in this column before the anecdote concerning the Floyd county man who, guilty of adultery, was asked what the Bible said about that sin and who drolly replied, "It says, 'Cussed be she and let her go.'"

The only excuse for this rebash of the anecdote is to establish it as a parallel for the law and those who eye with scorn, yea, indignation, offenses such as gambling and liquor-dealing if the offenses are committed by certain groups or classes of individuals but who sanction the same offense if it is committed by another group or class.

It is reprehensible (the law says) for a bookie to take bets on a horse race—yes, sir. Even the newspapers yell to high heaven about such dens of iniquity. But the Kentucky Derby or any other horse race draws wagers at the track running from the thousands into the millions. And that's legal and the newspapers print the total the boys and girls laid on the nose or across the board.

It is reprehensible for a group which doesn't have much to start with to play nickel-limit poker. They have found themselves in durance vile for such infractions of the law. But big-time gambling with a social background gets the green light and few are the wiser. Few are the wiser unless it's the case of a traveling road show with its barkers and con men operating, with utter imperviousness to prosecution, every known skin game. Then everybody knows everybody is wise but simply does not care.

At the Kentucky State Fair this week the road show concessions were closed. Professional gambling was stopped. The Now-You-See-It-Now-You-Don't game was in the hands of the simon-pures, with all profits going to the Optimus Club for, it is said, a good cause.

That is an improvement, we admit. Folks may not so frequently and derisively refer to the Fair as a "glorified carnival." And the "take" will stay reasonably close to Louisville as matters now stand. Yes, it's better this way—but far from perfect. There's the little matter of a law being given the runaround and made ridiculous.

But, after all, are these laws made to be enforced? We wonder. We are not blasting anybody; we're not demanding anything in particular, though we do find more reprehensible than some of these law violations the distinction the law and its representatives makes between this person and that or this group and others.

"Cussed be she?" No! It should be cussed be both or nobody at all.







### SPORTS AFIELD

By TED KESTING

In no other form of angling is the superiority of artificial lures over live bait so extremely marked as in fly casting for sunfish. Often dismissed as child's play, the sunfish taken on a fly rod soon proves to doubters that it is rightly called a game fish, claims angling master Jason Lucas.

Any fly rod with proper action will do for sunfish, although a light trout rod is more pleasant to use. Most anglers use level lines for sunfish, but Lucas suggests a good three-diameter line, if you can find one.

A six-foot leader is generally used, but there's no harm in trying one longer. A tapered leader of about one-pound test is advisable for either wet or dry flies.

One of the chief reasons why so many claim they can't hook sunfish on flies is that they use flies far too large. Lucas never uses a fly larger than a 10; he often uses 12s and smaller. A sunfish can be extremely choosy about what shade fly he wants, but for the beginning try flies of black, white, brown and gray. And it's well to start out with hackle flies only. Scantily dressed flies are almost invariably best for either trout or sunfish.

When you are ready to expand your collection, try the McGintoy, the Bee, then the Coachman and a Royal Coachman, Dusty Miller, Whirling Dun, Professor and Black Gnat are also good choices. Some anglers swear by rubber bugs of various sorts. Try them—half the fun of fly fishing is trying things. You won't often want to use a spinner, but when you do, keep it tiny and shiny.

The largest crowd ever to witness a Prestonsburg football game—a gathering numbering between 1,500 and 2,000 persons—saw the Prestonsburg Black Cats open their 1948 season under the guidance of a new coach, and on a new field, with victory Saturday night.

Two brilliant runs by "Set" Branham, veteran halfback, netted the Cats a 13 to 0 win over Whitesburg high school. The game was the first sports event to take place under the lights of the new playground here.

Whitesburg came here with a 27 to 0 victory over Belfry to its credit and was rated an edge, with a veteran, experienced team in good condition for the game.

The first quarter saw the two teams seesaw back and forth, with the Cats at one time reaching the visitors' 20 but losing the ball on a pass interception. Whitesburg got down to the Prestonsburg 40 then, but the Cats also took over on an interception. Prestonsburg surged back to the visitors' 30 and again a pass went awry. For that first period Whitesburg looked more consistent in its running attack.

Early in the second quarter, Branham took a short pass from young Eddie Hill at quarter and raced 60 yards for a marker, falling into the end zone as Hall of Whitesburg tackled him. Boyd's line plunge made the score 7 to 0. Remainder of the period was scoreless, with little decided difference between the two teams.

It was Branham again in the third quarter. He went back into punt formation, took the ball from center, cut to the side then turned as if trying to spot a receiver. As the Whitesburg defense spread for the expected pass, he set out on another jaunt of 60 yards, this time with good blocking, and crossed the goal line with three teammates as a convoy. The conversion attempt at the line failed.

Whitesburg's only real bid for a touchdown came in closing seconds of the contest. Hall, who had been passing accurately all evening to fumbling receivers, finally connected and the ball was taken to the Prestonsburg 30. Again he shot a pass which was followed by a lateral, and Whitesburg was in the shadows of the Cat goal. A touchdown appeared to be certain when the game-ending whistle blew.

Nessler at center for the Cats was probably the best defensive player on the field. He and little "Pig" Goodman were both terrific in this department. Hall was outstanding for Whitesburg with his passing and kicking. Prestonsburg did not punt once, although a kick was the play on at least one occasion. The team still lacks reserves and in this first game showed a weakness on pass defense and in blocking.

Saturday night, the Cats are at Everts for a game with a team mentioned as a potential state championship eleven. Everts has a veteran squad and a large one, with two players who last year were mentioned for all-state honors, and has won its two games of the season by lopsided scores. Coach Benedett, however, has his team working hard for the game and the Cats are conceding nothing without a showdown.

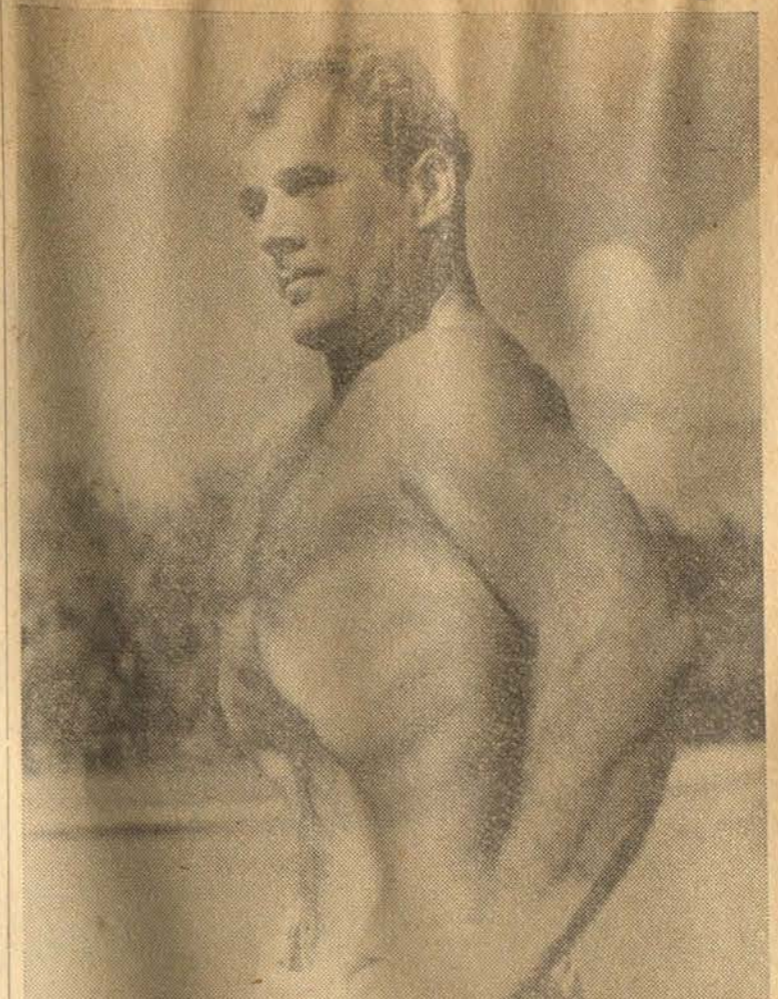

A big mistake of many beginners is that they think flies must be used on or near the surface. Nearly always, except in late evening, one can do best by fishing the fly well down, often near the bottom in water of six feet or more.

If you are the impatient kind, and use lead to hurry the fly down, don't use shot larger than BB. You'll get better action by placing split shot just above the first knot on the leader. Remember the sunfish is a confirmed hit-and-runner. You won't land him by trying to set the hook with the rod tip.

It's a good idea to use barbless hooks for sunfish. So that if one does tangle in the weeds and is a goner, you're out primarily for fun, not for fish, and that extra gamble will add to your sport. Incidentally if you are out for fish (and that could be with the present cost of living), this little fighter is about the daintiest eating of any, except trout taken from an icy mountain stream.

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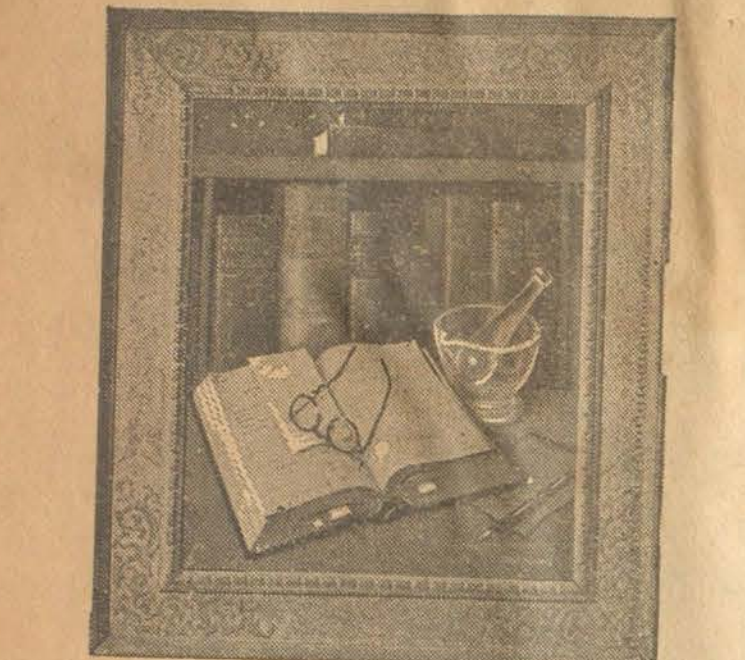
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
