



Farm Pond Survey Shows Good Results

ponds stocked during the 1947-48 fiscal year shows good results, J. T Cox, superintendent of Farm Ponds for the Division of Game and Fish. from complete enough tests have ......\$8,750.55 been made to reveal that good results were obtained in most all cases. Tests have been made in ponds in nine counties and will be continued to reach every section of the state, t was revealed. In a majority of the ponds bass up to two pounds and bream as large as seven ounces were found, while in some the efforts of ..... 250.00 the Division's stocking program have been largely nullified by tampering \$2,267.57 by pond owners. It was found that some ponds have been seined since stocking, and in others additional fish had been added by the owners. This tended to offset the balance as worked out by the Division and these ponds were far inferior to those not 15.00 tampered with, it was pointed out. The Division has worked out a 78.00 ratio of stocking that is paying divi-10.00 dends, and interference with this 10.00 system by the farm owner is detri-40.00 mental to the fish, Cox stated. He declared that inferior ponds after stocking were the result of four factors. These are: (1) ponds illegally seined; (2) additional fish placed in ponds; (3) winter kill of fish due to 227.00 freezes in ponds too shallow, and (4) death of fish in dry weather by 100.00 water becoming too low. The survey showed that growth of 81.60 fish was doubled in ponds where fer-110.00 tilizers had been added. For rapid 50.00 growth of fish, the Division has 206.63 found that fertilizer is a decisive factor. Proof of this was found in the recent surveys, it was pointed The tests were made by actual fishing and by using a 30-foot minnow seine to determine the results 425.00 of the stocking. After the fish were 190.00 captured scale samples were taken 145.00 to determine the age and the rate of 355.00 growth. The minnow seine was used 186.00 to determine the rate of reproduc-In the ponds that had not been tampered with, it was found that reproduction of both the bass and bream was excellent and the rate of growth above par. The Division rec ommends stocking 100 bass fry o 103.00 fingerlings and 30 adult bream 189.74 each acre of water. This ratio has 9.07 proved to be the right balance as 82.00 evidenced by the rapid growth and reproduction in these ponds. The Division urged pond owner who have had their ponds stocked refrain from adding additional fis and to keep seiners out of these bod ies of water. If there is any prob the Division is ready to offer its ad vice, so that the balance as established by the Division and found to be the best, will not be upset. During the fiscal year 1947-48 2,473 ponds were stocked, totaling 2,072 acres of land. Since July 1 of this year more
