The trouble was poor business management, due to political control, with city and county politicians influencing the appointment of nearly everybody but the nurses. Political control will nearly always result in padded payrolls and general inefficiency. All of which means that any community wanting a new hospital should start looking for a good manager the day the money drive is inaugurated.
