WE PICK PERKINS

(An editorial from the Hindman News, Oct. 15)

Frankly, if the Hindman News, as his home-town newspaper had nothing good to say of Carl D. Perkins, it would remain silent But, inasmuch as Carl Perkins is the type of man and official whom we can, with full obligation to our readers, endorse, we propose to make clear to the people of Knott and surrounding counties why this newspaper gives him its unqualified support.

Carl Perkins is no stranger to you. Many of you have known him from boyhood. RAILROADS MUST OPERATE around the clock every day and night of the year.

Although they know this, leaders of 16 railroad unions are demanding a five-day, Monday through Friday, week for one million railroad employes.

They want 48 hours pay for 40 hours work -in itself a 20% wage increase.

They also demand a minimum of 12 hours pay for any work performed on Saturdays, and 16 hours pay for any work performed on Sundays and holidays.

On top of all this they want an additional increase of 25c an hour for every employe!

Summing up these demands, they mean that these union leaders seek to force the railroads give one million employes an annual raise hich would average \$1500 per employe!

The total cost of this would be no less than billion dollars per year, which is more in, twice the expected net income of the ikroads this year.

Demands Unreasonable

These employes have had substantial raises during and since the war. Their average weekly earnings are higher than the average weekly earnings of workers in manufacturing industries. They have more job security than the average worker in American industry. They also enjoy paid vacations, a retirement system and other advantages more generous than the average worker receives.

In contrast with the demands of these 16 unions, which add up to the equivalent of 48c an hour, the Conductors and Trainmen recently settled their wage request for an increase of 10c an hour.







Rather than have students buy toothpaste-which they know many would not do and could no afford to do-they are demonstrating to the children in the schools through the teachers, how to mix a

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
