Funeral of Clell Blackburn, 23 years old, former resident of the Johns Creek section, who was killed in a car wreck at Salinesville, O., Oct. 30, was conducted last Thursday from the graveside in the Blackburn cemetery on Missouri fork of Johns Creek.

Blackburn's neck was broken in the wreck which reportedly resulted from locked steering mechanism of his car. He was a son of Bradley and Mrs. Cora Justice Blackburn and was a veteran of World War II, serving in the Pacific theater of action. At Salinesville he was employed in an industrial plant.

Surviving are his parents, two brothers and two sisters, Allen Blackburn, Salinesville, O., Charles Blackburn, in Germany with the army, Misses Celia and Lorraine Blackburn, both of Salinesville.

MISSING SPAN WRECK CAUSE

Hallowe'en Pranksters Remove Barricade; One Killed, Six Are Hurt

Loss of one life and the injury of seven other persons was traced this week to a gap in the Melvin-Weeksbury road where a bridge has been out for several months.

Ben Hurt, retired Weeksbury miner, was fatally injured Oct. 29 and his brother Bascom suffered a broken arm when their car was driven into the gap where the bridge had been. This was followed last Sunday night by a wreck from the same cause in which six persons reported injured, a Chevrolet badly damaged.

It was said a barricade had been placed across the highway near the missing span but Hallowe'en pranksters had removed it, leaving no warning to motorists of the danger. A fill over drain pipes is now in use as a detour.

Both the county and state drew criticism from Weeksbury and Melvin for their failure to replace the span. The bridge broke down last summer beneath the weight of a bulldozer. Told that county officials here had been promised replacement of the bridge by the state which has contracted to maintain it in the future, a coal company official at Weeksbury said, "They should have built it themselves before now."

County Judge Alex L. Davidson said the county has entered into a contract with the state highway department for the state to build a bridge to department standards, with the county paying 40 per cent of the cost. At the time the contract was made the state agreed to begin work immediately, he added.

Most seriously hurt of the six figuring in Sunday night's car wreck was 16-year-old Marlene Bartley who is in the Beaver Valley hospital, suffering a broken thigh. Richard Blackwell, 21, was dismissed from the hospital Monday after receiving treatment for cuts and bruises.

Court To Spend \$6,000 On Road to Magoffin

HIRES FORD TO DO WORK ON HIGHWAY

Bentley 'Fired', May Asks Officials' Wives Discharged as Clerks

Winston Ford, Prestonsburg contractor, was employed by the fiscal court at its meeting today (Thursday) to construct a road from David to the Magoffin county line as a part of the link between this county and the Magoffin county route leading to the big coal development in Breathitt county.

The court's order specified that Mr. Ford is not to be paid in excess of \$6,000 for construction and drainage of the road, a distance of approximately one mile. It was specified that the road is to be built to comply with plans of the Rural Highway Department providing for an 18-foot road-bed, including ditch line.

The Princess Elkhorn Coal Company not only volunteered rights-of-way privileges to the county but has pledged that it will construct remainder of the route to the mouth of Howard Branch to connect with Ky. 7. Thus Prestonsburg will be made almost equi-distant by highway with Salyersville from the coal development on Quicksand and other parts of the county will be linked with the same section through a road from Brush Creek to Middle Creek, a project expected to be begun next year.

PHONE FIRM LOSES FIGHT

Public Service Board Orders Old Charges Returned to Effect

The state's Public Service Commission quickly wrote Tuesday an "As You Were" decision in the Southern Bell Telephone & Telegraph Company's request for higher phone rates.

Both the company and its subscribers go back to the old rates in effect till June 16 when the company announced it would ask the raise, actually put the increase into effect and posted \$750,000 cash bond to insure subscribers in the event the boost was finally denied.

The decision, if finally upheld, means an average of \$7.91 a year will be lopped off current bills of each of the company's 260,000 subscribers. In addition, refunds amounting to around \$185,000 a month would be made to users who have been paying the higher rate since July 16.

The commission gave Southern Bell until Nov. 19 to decide what to do next. The company can, accept the P.S.C. decision as final, 2. ask the P.S.C. to rehear the case, 3. appeal to circuit court for a review.

The action took completely by surprise both company officials and protesting cities. The city of Louisville had prepared to rebut some 50,000 words of Southern Bell testimony. But the rebuttal was not needed.

Chairman Robert M. Coleman opened the session by announcing the P.S.C. decision. Mimeographed copies of the opinion were handed around. The hearing was recessed and the commission left the room.

Astonished litigants silently started studying the 31-page opinion written by Commissioner Charles E. Whittle. It was concurred in by Coleman and Commissioner Cass Walden.

The vigorous opinion took exception to almost every claim set out by the company. It declared, in effect, that Southern Bell's old rates were sufficient and that a 12 per cent rate increase was unwarranted.

If the old rate of earnings are realized throughout the Bell System, the opinion said, American Telephone & Telegraph "can continue to meet its debt demands, pay its 9 per cent dividends, and generally augment its surplus." Southern Bell is entirely owned by A.T.&T.

"It is natural for the management and the investment banker to yearn for 7 per cent net earnings, 11 per cent equity, lush dividends, and a soaring surplus," the opinion continued. "But one of the functions of this commission is to guard the public against such..."

JUDGE'S PAY IN MIX-UP

Hatcher Says Delay In Extra Pay Caused By Lack of Notice

Frankfort, Ky., Nov. 6—Payment of \$100 monthly expense allowances to Kentucky's 47 circuit judges has been delayed because of a mixup in the office of the Secretary of State, it was reported today.

George Glenn Hatcher, Secretary of State, said his office would tackle the task "the first thing on Monday." State offices generally are closed on Saturdays.

By arrangement with the Finance Department, Hatcher's office prepares monthly payrolls for circuit judges and commonwealth's attorneys. Hatcher said today his office did not know, until a few days ago, that it also would have to compute the new expense allowances.

Hatcher said he had received "no official notice" of the action of the special court of appeals upholding the new law. It calls for payment of \$100 a month to circuit judges and \$150 a month to judges and commissioners of the court of appeals. The special court on October 15 issued a mandate ordering the expense allowances paid.

The new law became effective March 24, the day Governor Earle Clements signed it. Consequently, payments to the judges will be retroactive to that date.

But Hatcher explained this will call for an examination of records in his office to determine how much each judge will receive. Some new judges have been appointed since March 24 and some judges may have resigned or died, he added.

In addition, Hatcher said he had no official notification of whether federal income taxes should be withheld from the expense allowances. He said he understood the expense

All doubt that the voters of Floyd county know how to "cross their ballot" when they want to was dispelled by results of last week's election.

A comparison of the vote totals makes this evident, but a look at the vote by precincts emphasizes the certainty that the Floyd county voter knows definitely how to cross from one party to the other.

President Truman's vote in this county totaled 8,823 to 3,127 for Dewey. But Virgil Chapman, Democratic candidate for U.S. Senator, polled 2,120 fewer votes than did the President while his Republican opponent, U.S. Senator John Sherman Cooper, was receiving 1,426 more votes than were polled for Governor Dewey.

In practically every precinct of the county's 54 Chapman ran behind all other Democratic candidates. The county's nimer vote was heavily against Chapman, but this senti-

\$200,000.00 FIRE DAMAGE AT MARTIN

Five Fire Departments Called to Battle Blaze Early This Morning

Raging flames, discovered at 1:30 a.m. this morning (Friday) resulted in an estimated \$200,000 in the business section of Martin, 15 miles from here.

The inferno, which raged for several hours, required the facilities of five fire departments, those of Prestonsburg, Wayland, Pikeville, Painsville and Wheelwright to bring the fire under control.

Occupants of the Dermont building barely escaped with their lives. Reports state the blaze was not discovered until the roof was on the verge of collapsing.

The Dermont building, housing the heavily stocked grocery and dry-goods store of S. D. Dermont on the first floor, a full stock-room basement and expensively furnished apartments on the second floor was declared a total loss with only slight insurance coverage.

Abutting the Dermont structure, the Dr. G. C. Collins building, containing a variety store, a shoe store, dental offices and apartments suffered partial loss of approximately \$10,000, according to reports. Adjoining Dermont's, on the other side, the roof of Frasure's restaurant caved in, effecting unestimated damage.

The First Guaranty Bank, drug store and other buildings across the street also suffered damage and an estimated \$1,000 of plate glass windows was destroyed in adjacent buildings in the fire area. Nearby, Our Lady of the Way hospital containing several patients was threatened during the height of the fire.

No telephone service into Martin was available today. About 500 feet of cable and over 200 phones were out of operation. Power lines, serving Martin and immediate vicinity, were severed by the flames and service curtailed for several hours. Traffic on State Highway 80 was halted and remained hampered today by the threat of falling walls.

Martin, a railroad center, has water facilities but no organized fire department other than volunteer service.

Origin of the blaze was not authoritatively reported as The Times goes to press.

JUDGES MAY MAKE RULING DURING WEEK

Hobson and Cornett Assail Legislation As Unconstitutional

The Eastern Kentucky judicial redistricting bill—described by those opposing it as "the Ervine Turner bill," designed to create for the Jackson friend of Governor Earle C. Clements a circuit judgeship—was attacked before the Court of Appeals Friday as unconstitutional on four specific counts.

The Appellate Court is expected to make a final decision in the case this week.

Oral arguments against the legislation were made by Commonwealth's Attorney John Cornett, of the 31st judicial district, and Joe Hobson, Prestonsburg attorney.

The redistricting legislation is constitutionally defective, they argued, on these points: 1. It provides that Commonwealth's Attorneys and Circuit Judges not residing in the new district boundaries may move into the new district at any time before the expiration of their terms of office, whereas the Constitution demands that they shall move within a reasonable time. But for this concession to officials, it was contended, the Legislature would not have passed the bill.

2. The bill, becoming effective June 17, 1948, cancelled the regular June term of the Knott circuit court, making possible only two court terms in that county this year. Section 131 of the Constitution provides that there shall be at least three terms of circuit court in every county every year.

3. The redistricting bill provides a continuous session for the Boyd circuit court at Ashland, with no provision for court at Catlettsburg, the county seat. This, it was claimed, amounted to special legislation, in violation of the Constitutional provision that at least three terms of court be held in the county seat, Kenton and Campbell counties, it was admitted, have courts of continuous session in Covington and Newport but litigants may demand trial at the county seat, whereas in the Boyd case no such right is granted by the redistricting bill.

4. The bill fails to change the districts with due regard to territory, business and population as provided by the Constitution. Except for the matter of divorce cases, it was claimed, the Floyd circuit court has much more business than Boyd county's.

Assailing the "necessity" of a continuous session in Boyd county, the appellants' brief pointed out that when Judge Erichard was asked why he did not call a special term there during July and August this year, he replied, "I would be afraid to do that, afraid the bar might jump me. These fellows here, or some of them, want to loaf a little

A thorough investigation into all Johnson county roadhouses, prompted by two recent mysterious deaths in the area, has been ordered by Circuit Judge James W. Turner.

He instructed the grand jury Monday to make the investigation and told Johnson county law enforcement officers to start proceedings if evidence merits it.

The latest death was that of a 38-year-old G.I. student, Hager C. McCarty, of Paintsville, who attended the Mayo Vocational School, McCarty, father of five children, was found dead in bed Sunday at a roadhouse west of Paintsville on U.S. Route 23.

No definite verdict in his death had been announced, but Judge Turner said the circumstances were suspicious. He did not elaborate.

No marks of violence had been found on McCarty's body. The other death was that of 22-year-old Vernon Castle, whose body was found in the Big Sandy river near Paintsville, Oct. 30. Castle had been last seen at a roadhouse shortly before he disappeared the night of Oct. 16.

The first G.I. Bill deadline is not far away. Veterans Administration said this week.

Veterans discharged before July 25, 1947, have only until July 25, 1949, to apply for readjustment allowances for unemployment and self-employment.

G.I.'s discharged after the 1947 date have until two years after discharge.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. I enlisted in the army during July, 1947. Am I entitled to loan benefits under the G.I. Bill?

A. If you served at any time between September 16, 1940 and July 25, 1947, and you were discharged under conditions other than dishonorable after at least 90 days of active service, or for a service-incurred disability in less than 90 days, you may qualify for a G.I. loan.

Q. My son was disabled during World War II. Will VA pay him an additional sum for dependents?

A. If your son is rated 60 per cent or more disabled he is entitled to an additional sum for his dependents.

**OF INTEREST TO VETERANS**

Documentary evidence of dependency should be submitted to Veterans Administration immediately by veterans with disability ratings of 60 per cent or more in order that they may qualify for increased compensation payments. Public Law 877 of the 80th Congress provides additional allowances for such disabled veterans who have a wife, children or dependent parents. The married veteran may receive up to \$21 extra, with added amounts for additional dependents.

Veterans whose dependents are recorded in their VA claims folders as of September 1, 1948, will have until December 1 to file their evidence. These awards will be retroactive to September 1, the effective date of the law. Otherwise, the effective date of the increase will be the date of receipt of the evidence.

As evidence of a wife and children, a veteran may submit certified copies of public or church records. If for any reason these are not available, he should submit the best evidence at hand, such as sworn statements of responsible persons. For parents, proof of dependency in

during July and August." Defenders of the act asserted it was constitutional and declared the only complaints against it are "based on personal grievances, technicalities and trivialities." The case came before the Court of Appeals from the Franklin circuit court where it was upheld.

The 1948 General Assembly in making Boyd a separate judicial district with a circuit court of continuous session at Ashland, changed the setup in five other nearby judicial districts, including the 31st.

That made an additional circuit judge necessary and Governor Earle Clements appointed Turner, chief clerk of the 1948 State Senate, to the new 39th district. Breathitt, Powell and Wolfe counties, Douglas Graham, also of Jackson, was appointed Commonwealth's Attorney. Both men were elected last Tuesday to their posts without opposition.

In addition to the new 39th district, the changes shifted other counties as follows: 24th district, Johnson and Lawrence; 25th, Clark, Jessamine and Madison; 31st, Floyd and Martin; 32nd, Boyd only, and 36th, Knott and Magoffin.

The test suit was filed by three Commonwealth's Attorneys, John Chris Cornett, 31st judicial district; Blaine Clark, 24th, Earl R. Cooper, 36th, and two circuit judges, Walter D. Prater of the 36th, and Edward P. Hill, of the 31st.

Under the shift of counties from one district to another, Cornett will have to move from Knott to either Floyd or Martin, and Clark from Martin to Johnson or Lawrence.

Magistrate May said, in making the motion, "You fellows fired Pat Bentley to save money. Now, save the county some money by getting rid of Mrs. Davidson and Mrs. Burchett."

Before all that, the court employed Woodrow Fitzpatrick as a bulldozer operator at a salary of \$200 a month.

A resolution also was adopted authorizing the purchase from R. L. Gardner of outstanding Floyd county road and bridge bonds to a par value of \$50,400 and a 2 1/2 per cent yield basis.

The sheep family is still royalty and there's just no substitute for wool—especially on those late dusk season days when there's a fast north wind.

There are sportsmen who "can't wear wool next to my skin—makes me itchy." In most cases this is just a phobia, and if they really do itch, what's wrong with scratching? You may be crude, but you'll be warm and comfortable.

Basic garments for cold-weather sports start with underwear which is all-wool, spring needle knit, with full length sleeves and legs, and a high neckline. Suit yourself whether it shall be the two-piece outfit of the union suit.

Now and then a store will come up with the old-fashioned two-piece red flannels, but don't be fooled by the light-weight kind used by many skiers. It's a good idea to wear a pair about four sizes bigger than your true size.

The well-socked man of rod and gun wears wool on his feet, often during both summer and winter.

If your enthusiasm for wool includes jackets, pants, mitts, caps, etc., the question arises: "How do you keep the moths out?"

The answer: Assign one closet in the house as the wool closet. Clear sun and air all woollens thoroughly, hang or stack them away in this closet. Now, hang up as many cans of — hang on — paradichlorobenzene as space affords.

It comes under various trade names, but somewhere on the container you'll find the real name. The crystals will in time evaporate and fill the closet with a gas fatal to moths. Comes cold weather, your flannels will still be "all" wool.

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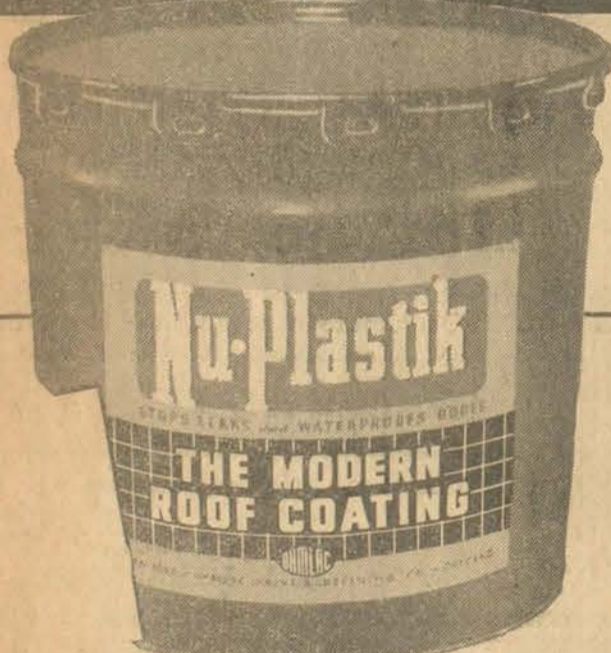

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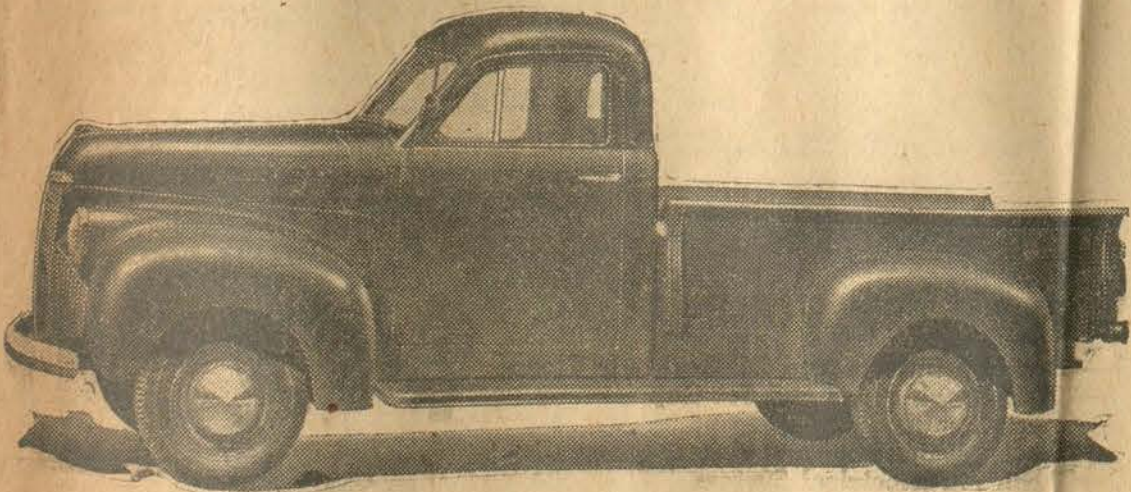

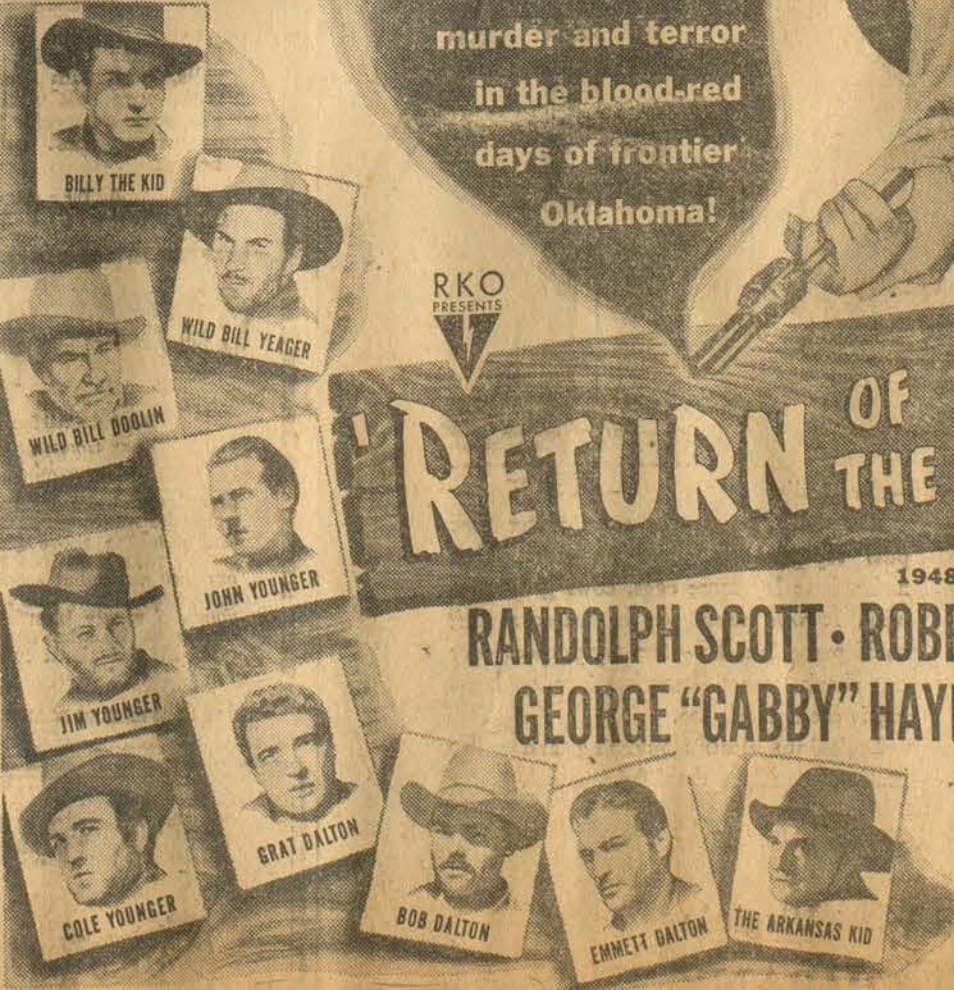

2-1/2 c. sifted Snow Flour 1/2 tsp. salt  
4 tsp. tartaric acid or phosphate 4 tsp. fat  
baking powder 2/3 c. milk

Measure and sift dry ingredients into a bowl. Cut or work in fat until the mixture has a coarse granular appearance. Add liquid and combine thoroughly. Turn dough out on lightly floured board, gather up into a ball and knead lightly until the dough appears somewhat smooth. Roll to one-half inch thickness. Dip cutter into flour. Cut biscuits and place upon ungreased baking sheet. If crusty biscuits are desired place about one inch apart, otherwise biscuits may touch each other. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) for about 10 minutes.
