

During this same month an average of \$14.80 per child was paid for aid to dependent children. These enefits were available to about 38,000 children in Kentucky.

"Aid to the needy blind during this period averaged \$18.58 for the 1,900 recipients under this program It was possible to pay these amount which approximate the average payments during the previous fiscal year, because Governor Clements transferred \$57,000 from his emergency fund to the Department. For the month of October, 1948, and for the rest of the quarter the average old age assistance checks will be inreased to \$20.90; aid to dependent children checks to \$15.60; and aid to he needy blind checks to \$22 pe month. But for the fact that it was necessary to absorb a deficit incurred by the previous administra ion, this additional amount would have been available for expenditure during the present fiscal year. 

"COME TO THE FAIR"

Today's Sunday paper contains a good-sized advertisement that takes me squarely back to Fidelity and the very earliest days of this century. A GREAT CIRCUS IS COMING! It is even advertised as combining the "new look" with the old-time circus feeling, as if anyone wants a circus to be anything but a circus. There are hosts of elephants, marvelous horses and their riders, trapeze artists, bareback riders, cowboys, clowns, trained animals, a band, and on and on. How much like the older ads it sounds! I can see one of the old, unsightly stores in Fidelity all covered up with the big sign, with animals that Noah evidently left out of the ark, and certainly the circus left out, too. I can hear the callione and see the clowns and hear the rumble of the gilt-decorated wagons, and catch an occasional glimpse of some wild creature pecking out through the Iron bars. And I can see the throngs, too, and smell peanuts and see pink lemonade and ballcons. And all this is for one dollar plus tax, not too much more than the circus I attended in 1905. It almost tempts me to set aside my classes, wade through the crowds and dust, and get a look at and smell of the circus, the "greatest on earth." Many of you read, as I did, the excellent article on the really big

circus in a recent issue of The National Geographic Magazine, Among other things I learned from that article is that the American people like their circus straight. For example, clowns never vary in the pattern of marks they put on their faces or the queer dress they assume. Once a clown of that sort, always a clown. The public erpects it, and that is where the money comes from. Not to see a clown dressed as a clown would be like seeing Hamlet without its leading character,

And yet, with all the quickened pulses, I wonder whether the dustcovered throngs that will come here to a circus can ever know how much they missed by being born in an age too late. I know that pink lemonade or a reasonable facsimile will be consumed, that the balloon man will do a thriving business, that games of chance will somehow get by the authorities, that elephants and other animals will do their tricks as planned, but the visitors have lived their whole lives in a circus already. Let me take you 35 years into the past and a distance of 2,500 miles. I was going by train from Portland, Oregon, to San Francisco. Soon after billboards high up on mountainsides. They were so high I wondered how the sign builders ever got the material up there. One sign would say Siskiyou county marketed umpty. million board feet of lumber annually. Another proclaimed the production of hundreds of thousands of sheep. And so on.

I don't know when California started publicizing itself. In all probability there were born press agents among the Forty-niners. Anyway, here are about three million people in the state now who could be classed as first-rate press agents. And after hearing Californians ballyhoo their state for a century, Kentuckians are just now beginning to realize what publicity means.

What did California have in natural resources 100 years ago? Some gold mines and timber were her chief assets. The land that now nelps to feed a very large part of the ountry's population was desert and had to be irrigated with costly water. The desert land needed people from this side of the Sierra Nevada mountains to work it. And the ballyhoo got them-got them from Kentucky and other states where fertility was high, water fell from clouds, and markets were 2,000 miles closer. California became a magnet through advertising. Capital, brains, ambition, courage, the assets California needed were lured from regions that had better natural resources than the Pacific coast could naturally Humphrey Bogart, Lauren Bacall,

During the century California has been getting richer and richer, Kentucky has been lagging behind the more progressive states. And one of the main reasons is that our people just haven't realized the value of nationwide publicity. But, thank goodness, we are waking up.
