EDITORS HEAR DRIVE PLANS

The editors and publishers assembled in Louisville for an organization meeting of the newly appointed state advertising committee for U.S. Savings Bonds by Martin K. Specker, Louisville, public relations representative for the Kentucky Brewers, Distillers and Distributors, and Victor R. Portman, Lexington, secretary of the Kentucky Press Association, co-chairmen of the committee.

"Purchasers of U.S. Savings Bonds become better citizens because they feel they are closer to the financial structure of their government," Eilhu Harris, Washington, national director of advertising of the U.S. Savings Bonds Division, Treasury Department, told the editors in a talk during the meeting.

He said the Treasury Department was following a policy of getting as many people as possible to purchase savings bonds so that "all Americans can own more shares of their country."

He said Kentuckians now hold \$270,000,000 worth of bonds which pays them an annual interest of \$5,000,000. Interest from these bonds, he declared, amounts to as much in any Kentucky county as the annual payroll of the county's largest industry.

These savings bonds constitute a financial reserve for the people themselves, Harris declared. Newspaper advertising, he pointed out, is the only hope the government has to reach all of the people of Kentucky.

Surviving, besides the parents, are five brothers and sisters, Mrs. Billie Bellamy, of Hueysville, Orgie, Tramble, Ezra and Mildred Adkins, all at home. Funeral rites were conducted from the Adkins home Monday, with burial being made on Brush Creek under direction of the Ryan Funeral Home.

SENATE POST NOT VACANT

Frankfort, Ky., ov. 27—Governor Earle Clements declared with a laugh today there is no basis for renewed reports that he is about to fill a vacancy in the United States Senate.

Stating he has been bombarded with telephone calls since Senator Alben W. Barkley became Vice-President-elect, the Governor issued a statement saying: "There is no vacancy now and I do not anticipate there will be a Senate vacancy before next January 20, at the earliest."

"Under our statute, it will be the duty of the Chief Executive to fill the vacancy by appointment. Since the statute was enacted, no Kentucky Governor has delayed very long filling any Senatorial vacancy."

Senator Barkley will be sworn in as Vice-President on Jan. 20. Until then, he can continue to serve as Senator.

Friends of the Governor say he has not started a single discussion with any one concerning the filling of the upcoming vacancy. They also are sure Clements will consult with Barkley, who is now at his home in Paducah, before naming the Senator's successor.

A friend of Clements said informally: "It is known that Governor Clements has been advised of the willingness of many Kentuckians to fill the Barkley vacancy when it occurs."

A visitor who saw Clements recently said he understood about 45 persons have been recommended to the Governor as candidates for the appointment. Of the 45 candidates, 15 reportedly asked the Governor personally for the appointment and 30 were recommended by go-betweens, the visitor said.

Emergency Teachers in County Slightly Above State Average

Almost one-fourth of the 18,929 persons engaged in the profession of teaching in Kentucky's public schools are emergency teachers, a report released recently by State Superintendent Boswell Hodgkin's office shows.

The average percentage of emergency teachers in county school systems over the state is 31.3 and in independent districts, 5.9.

Floyd county schools are slightly higher in this respect than the state average, with 135 emergencies out of a total of 381 for a percentage of 35.5. Greenup county with 70 per cent of its teachers emergencies and Crittenden with 61.7 per cent are highest in the state. Jefferson is the only county in the state without an emergency teacher. It employs 502, exclusive of Louisville, Anchorage and Elkes.

To Curb Roadhouse Operation

OPERATORS MUST APPLY BY DEC. 15TH

Otherwise, Roadhouses To Be Closed; Search Will Be by Invitation

All Floyd county roadhouses outside the limits of incorporated towns which have not applied by December 15 for county license to operate will be closed as of that date, Judge Alex L. Davidson announced Wednesday.

There is not a roadhouse operating in the county at this time which has a license, the official added. He estimated the number of places of "amusement" or where drinks, soft or otherwise, are sold as 200.

Application blanks will be ready for operators of such places by December 10 so that no person in business will be denied an opportunity to apply for license before the Dec. 15 deadline.

The decision to make application for license mandatory was reached as officials sought a new way of meeting the bootlegging situation which, they say, is admittedly bad.

The application which operators of roadhouses will be required to sign will waive the operators' constitutional rights against search and seizure and will expressly invite "all duly constituted and appointed" peace officers "to enter said premises at any time and search said place of entertainment and all the rooms and buildings adjacent thereto and under our control or occupancy."

The applicant also will be required to list his or her court or criminal record, if any, and to state specifically what person will be in charge of the business.

Before the court will consider any application, it also must be signed by the owner of the property in which the business is located, and in so doing the owner states he or she has full knowledge of the Kentucky statute which provides that any property, including buildings and motor vehicles, used for the purpose of unlawfully selling, transporting or possessing intoxicants, may be sold and forfeited to the state.

This, Judge Davidson explained, "is not intended to work a hardship on a citizen operating a bona fide place of legal business. I feel certain, however, that persons operating within the law will have no objection to signing the application."

Kentucky's roadhouse law includes within the broad term, "roadhouse," all amusement spots and places where food and drink are sold, including soft drinks.

The applicant for a roadhouse license will be required to file application with the County Clerk, with a fee of \$10. Then a hearing will be held in open court during January to determine if license shall be issued. Until the hearing is held, operators of roadhouses will be permitted to continue operation under the present set-up, provided that they file application for license by December 15.

Commenting on anonymous letters received, with citizens inquiring why certain places are not raided, Judge Davidson pointed out that search cannot be made without a search warrant and that such warrant must be sworn out by some person who has seen intoxicants sold at the specific location in question.

Such evidence lacking, officials decided to attack the problem from the angle of stricter demands, including the right of search at any time by peace officers, on persons applying for license.

In addition to his work as a minister and teacher, he was widely known for his mechanical aptitude. At one time, he edited a weekly newspaper at Allen. He was known and revered throughout Eastern Kentucky.

His wife, Mrs. Mary Allen, preceded him in death 24 years ago. Surviving are four sons and two daughters: Eugene and Alex Vernon Allen, both of Allen, Bill Allen, of Martin, Jack Allen, of Harold, Mrs. Myrtle Childers, Ashland, and Mrs. Edna Mae Callison, of Allen. SCHOOL HIT BY RINGWORM

At Least 50 Cases Here; 'Dark Light' Installed At Health Department

With at least 50 cases of ringworm in the grade school here, the Floyd County Health Department has placed in operation a Woods light in a move to discover the infection at its outset, and approximately 100 pupils were examined Tuesday, Dr. Marvin Ransdell, department director, said.

The "dark light" makes clearly visible any infected area. Ringworm was first discovered in the schools here two years ago, but its spread became wide only this year.

Children infected are permitted to continue school but are being required to wear a head-covering as a protection to others.

The late Dr. Fred Caudill, director of the Division of Epidemiology, a few years ago gave advice relative to the disease which is still considered high authority on the subject. His statement was contained in a letter to the chairman of the Clark county board of health, Winchester, where a severe outbreak had occurred. Excerpts from his statement follow:

Ringworm of the scalp is a fungus disease in which the fungus invades the hair follicles from which it is extremely difficult to kill or dislodge. It is largely a disease of children under puberty, hence its tendency to become epidemic in children of grade school age. It is transmitted by passing the fungus directly from child to child in scales or on dead hair from the lesions of scalp infections. It occurs six times more frequently among boys than among girls. In boys, the early lesions first appear most frequently on the crown of the head.

The current shortage of qualified teachers is greatest among country school systems, the report said, with 32 of every hundred being emergency teachers. In the independent school districts, only six of every 100 are emergency teachers.

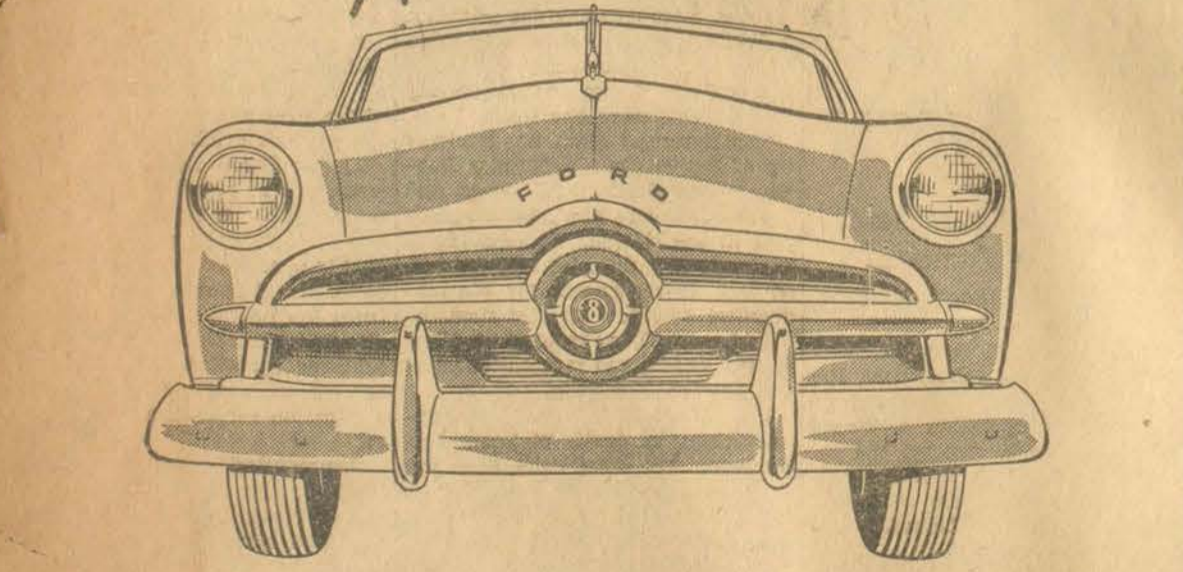

of the head and neck where clippers are used in barber shops, strongly suggests that the transfer of the infection most often takes place in barber shops. The early lesions in girls are usually found along the part of the head where the hair is parted. This would suggest that the girls get their infection from contaminated combs, mostly in the home, since girls under puberty rarely patronize barber shops and beauty parlors. Of course, it may be transferred by the interchange of caps, combs, toys or other articles which may become contaminated.

While the transfer of the fungus may take place in picture shows from the backs of seats, it is felt that if the seats in picture shows were a significant factor in its transmission, the disease would be more equally divided between boys and girls, since boys and girls attend picture shows in approximately equal numbers. Further, it is felt that if school were the place where a significant amount of it was transmitted, boys and girls would also be more equally infected since boys and girls attend school in approximately equal numbers. Further, studies have been made in which infectious material was not found on the backs of picture show seats to any appreciable extent, nor has it been found that there is opportunity for the transfer of any appreciable amount of infection in schools.

Hence, it is my opinion, and I think this opinion is pretty well borne out by the literature on the subject, that the transmission of ringworm of the scalp takes place largely in two places: first, and most important of which is in barber shops and, second, is in the home. In barber shops it is transferred largely by clippers and infected combs, whereas in the home it is transferred largely by the family comb and hair brush.

I think children with ringworm of the scalp should be permitted to continue in school but I think they should be required to wear tight-

fitting caps which will prevent dead hair and infected scales from dropping from the lesions. A proper cap would be a tight-fitting linen cap with elastic around the periphery so as to make it stay on the head in such a fashion as adequately to cover the scalp. The cap fashioned from the top of a female stocking would serve the purpose quite nicely. Such caps should be kept clean by washing as often as necessary. Even though such caps are worn, it would be preferable to clip all of the hair off of the scalp as closely as possible. All children with ringworm infection of the scalp should be placed under the care of a physician or clinic and kept there until the lesions are all healed.

As indicated above, ringworm of the scalp is hard to cure. With the best known treatment it requires from one to several months to effect a cure. Infected hairs may be removed from lesions by plucking the hairs by hand or by x-ray epilation. After the hairs are removed there are ointments which aid in gradually killing the fungus thus aiding the lesions to heal. Where the disease becomes widespread in a community it may be necessary to establish a treatment clinic. Establishment of such clinics would have to be determined by the local board of health and the local medical society.

2 c. milk  
4 tsp. salt  
1 1/2 c. fat  
1 1/2 c. sugar

2 eggs  
2 c. yeast dissolved in 1 c. lukewarm water  
10 c. Snow Flour

Scald milk, add salt. Cool. Cream together shortening and sugar. Beat eggs. Add to sugar mixture. Add milk to soaked yeast. Blend with flour sifted into mixing bowl. Beat well. Add sugar, egg mixture. Mix. Knead into smooth dough. Place in greased bowl. Cover. Let rise until double its bulk. Knead dough down. Put back into greased bowl. Cover closely with lid. Set in refrigerator. Each day punch dough down to let out gas, returning dough to the refrigerator at once. About two hours before rolls are wanted, shape as desired. Place in greased pan. Cover. Let rise in warm place until very light. Bake in moderately hot oven (400° F.) for 15-20 minutes.

**Magoffin Residents Injured in Auto Wreck**




