

The five-year penitentiary sentence imposed on 18-year-old Betty Spears by a jury of the Floyd circuit court for the slaying of Edmund Walters, near Betsy Layne, was reversed by the Court of Appeals last week. The court said the jury should have been directed to acquit her.

The Appellate Court pointed to the girl's testimony to the effect Walters, a war veteran, came to the home of her mother, Mrs. E. Spears, and attempted to force Miss Spears to drink beer with him, chasing her with a beer can in his hand. She seized a .22-caliber rifle and fired.

The Commonwealth contended, at trial here, that the shot was fired at a distance which indicated the girl was not in danger of her life at the time.

The Appellate Court also ruled Perry county, not Jefferson, has jurisdiction in the trial of Bus-Fugate for the fatal shooting in July last summer of Wallace Amory, of Hindman. Amburgy died at Nichols General Hospital, Louisville, but the court pointed out that since Perry county issued the first warrant served on Fugate, that county had first call on him.

CLUB TO HEAR DISCUSSIONS Of Deway Dam Area Recreation Plans At Langley Meet

The Floyd County Fish & Game Club this week announced that a meeting will be held Tuesday evening, Dec. 21, in the Maytown high school auditorium at which members of the club and the public will hear a discussion of recreation and other facilities to be made available in the Johns Creek reservoir area.

Frank Bunch, of the U.S. district corps of engineers, Huntington, has been asked to meet with officials of the state Division of Game & Fish and Floyd sportsmen and other citizens, and to discuss possibilities of the area.

Mr. Bunch will be asked to discuss provisions for a camp site for the Floyd club and the Division of Game & Fish on the lake. At the same time, private citizens who have applied for sites may learn their chances of being granted such rights.

It is possible that the exact location sought by the sportsmen and the state division will be decided upon at the meeting. E. R. Burke, district supervisor, Division of Game & Fish, said this week. A lease on approximately 100 acres has been applied for, he said.

Minor Clarke, superintendent of fisheries, state Division of Game & Fish, will discuss fishing and fish propagation in the lake. Ed Adams, state Junior Conservation Club organizer, and John Curry, game management superintendent, will make talks on their fields of work in connection with the reservoir.

The meeting will be held at 7 p.m. Date for official completion of the Deway dam has been set for July 11.

FLOYD'S 1949 HIWAY SHARE IS \$173,038.06

'Gas' Tax Increases County's Rural Road Total by \$104,784

Distribution of approximately \$13,000,000 among the 120 counties of the state for an expanded rural road program will bring Floyd county next year \$173,038.06 as compared with the \$68,254.76 allotted the county last year from the old \$5,000,000 rural highway fund, Emerson Beauchamp, Commissioner of Rural Highways, announced today (Thursday).

Increased funds provided by the 1948 General Assembly session, most derived from the state gasoline tax, make possible this greater aid to the counties in their rural road programs, it was said. Floyd county will receive \$68,254.75, as last year, from the regular \$5,000,000 fund and \$104,783.10 from the additional funds from new sources.

The counties' share of the \$8,000,000 fund is provided solely for rural and secondary highway improvement.

Decision of Beauchamp for distribution of the fund was made following a conference with Governor Earle C. Clements, Commissioner of Highways, and Dwight H. Withers, Chief Highway Engineer. Mr. Withers, and members of the engineering staff of the Highway Department.

Additional increased revenues that will accrue beyond the \$8,000,000 fund will be distributed on the same basis as the present allotment is made. The \$8,000,000 fund, in addition to the \$5,000,000 statutory fund for that purpose, makes a total of some \$13,000,000 (not considering additional funds that will accrue) for rural and secondary roads next year.

MANY ATTEND MAY FUNERAL

H. F. May, on Way Here, Found Dead Dec. 2nd, Heart Attack Victim

Funeral rites for Harry F. May, 71 years old, prominent Maytown man, who died suddenly last Thursday morning, were conducted Saturday afternoon from the Maytown Methodist Church, with a large gathering of sorrowing relatives and friends attending.

Mr. May, who had been in failing health for five years, was en route from his home to catch an early-morning bus to Prestonsburg when stricken. He was found by workmen. Death is believed to have been instantaneous and the result of a heart attack.

He was born March 12, 1877, the son of the late Jack and Nancy Haggans May, and spent his entire life in Maytown. He had been land agent for the Beaver Creek Consolidated Coal Company for 40 years and was well-known over a wide section of Eastern Kentucky. His friendliness and hospitality held for him the deep friendship of hundreds of acquaintances. A man of wide interests, he took an active part in Floyd county politics for many years. Although his condition had been declared critical over the past year, he was energetic by nature and found it difficult to live the sedentary life recommended by physicians.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Rebecca Allen May, one son, E. R. May, of Langley, two daughters, Mrs. G. R. Martin, Sr., of Drift, and Miss Nancy May, Langley, Miss Sallie Sizemore May who had resided with the family since childhood, one brother, G. A. May, Sr., of Langley, and four grandchildren.

Officiating at the funeral were the Rev. O. P. Smith, of Catlettsburg, former pastor of the Maytown Methodist Church and a close friend of the family, and the Rev. S. B. Rucker, present pastor of the church. Burial was made in the May cemetery under direction of the Arnold Funeral Home.

PARATROOPER AND COUSIN, VICTIMS DURING WORLD WAR II ACTION, BURIED IN ADJOINING FLOYD COUNTY GRAVES

T/5 Russell Olin Ratliff and his cousin, Seaman 1/c Ralph Hopkins were inseparable through their boyhood days at Harold, and this week the two, who met death in World War II action, lie in adjoining graves, with a double monument to mark their resting places.

Hopkins, who was killed at Palermo, Sicily, was buried in the Ferguson cemetery at Laynesville, August 15. Body of Ratliff arrived at Pikeville Tuesday and he was buried today (Thursday) with military honors.

Ratliff, who enlisted as a paratrooper while a Betsy Layne high school student, was killed in a jump

over Naples, Italy, Oct. 10, 1943, at the age of 22. He was a son of George B. and Gypsy Layne Ratliff and was born and reared at Harold. He was a member of the Methodist Church.

Surviving, besides his parents, are four brothers and one sister, Raymond Ratliff, of Harold, Jack, George Ed, Carl Buford and Miss Lois Rose Ratliff, all of Vinton, O.

Funeral rites were conducted from the Laynesville Methodist Church, the Rev. Robert L. Anderson officiating. Burial was directed by the Baker Funeral Home, under auspices of Pikeville Veterans of Foreign Wars Post.

State, Federal Aid Promised In Ringworm Situation Here

Acknowledging numerous letters and telegrams from Prestonsburg parents who are disturbed about the wide spread of ringworm among schoolchildren, Dr. Tracy Jones, director of the Bureau of County Health Work, State Board of Health, this week notified Dr. Marvin Ransdell, director of the Floyd County Health Department, that outside help will be forthcoming in battling the infection.

Dr. Ransdell said Tuesday a new Wood light for detection of ringworm is being sent here by the State Board of Health, that a doctor doing research work in the South will be here for a few days next week to study the fungus infection, and that a clinic will soon be set up here.

The doctor doing research work is with the U.S. Public Health Service and this week was at Tulane University, New Orleans, La. The bacteriology department, University of

Louisville, is ready to give assistance in any way possible, Dr. Jones said.

Dr. Ransdell recently placed in operation a Wood light he had himself assembled, but a newer light was held needed. When Dr. Jones asked for the light used in Winchester during an outbreak similar to that here, he learned the infection has not been stamped out there.

Dr. Ransdell said the ringworm clinic will probably not be opened till after Christmas since the school's Christmas vacation begins Saturday of next week. Clubwomen of Prestonsburg have already been contacted, he said, to aid in the clinic. Miss Smith, field supervisor of public health nurses, will be here from time to time, he added, to help with the work.

One other school in the county, that at Price (Gearheart), has had an outbreak of ringworm, Dr. Ransdell said.

The work of increasing line service here was almost done when the mishap occurred, it was said.

COLLEGE WINS OLD STANDING

Reinstatement News Celebration Signal; Baird Lauds Students

Morehead State College last week regained its standing with the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, and word of its re-instatement was the signal for the biggest Morehead celebration since V-J Day.

That was last Thursday, but the bigger celebration—the planned one—was staged Tuesday.

Topping the program was a big convocation at 11 a.m., in the college auditorium. It was strictly informal.

Dr. William Jesse Baird, president of the college, told the approximately 1,800 persons in attendance: "I'm as happy today as a Republican before the election and a Democrat afterwards."

There were no formal, prepared speeches, yet everything that was said smacked of the sincere, serious determination of all concerned with the welfare of the college—and that seems to be everybody in this part of the state—to see that these two goals are accomplished:

Never again let anything happen that will take the school off the accredited list of the association.

Do everything possible to make the institution an even better school in every way.

Dr. Baird said he was not in the least concerned about "who gets the credit for the reinstatement."

"The fact that it has been achieved is the important thing—important for the boys and girls here now and those who will come here in the future."

The college president commended the students for "sticking by the college when you felt insecure."

"You kept faith in the college in its time of adversity and now that faith has been justified."

The faculty and staff came in for a large measure of praise from their top executive, too.

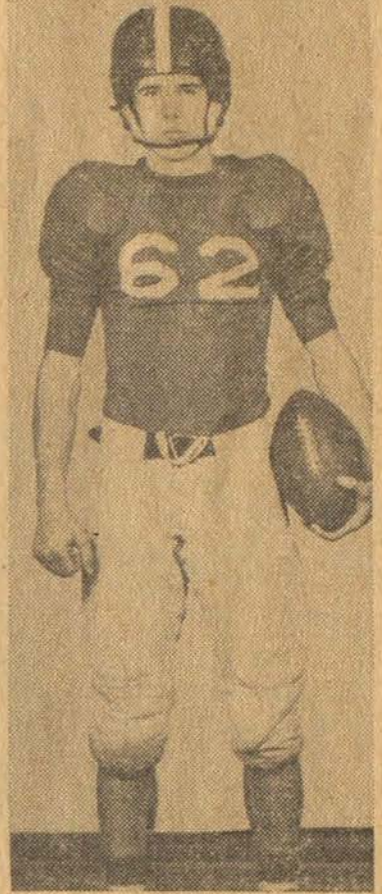

WEBB TO DIE ON MARCH 8

Hill Passes Sentence On Martin-co. Slayer As Court Term Closes

Edward P. Hill sentenced Webb to die in the electric chair at Eddyville, before daybreak March 8. The condemned man did not answer when asked if he had any reason why sentence should not be pronounced.

Columbus Webb, former West Virginia convict who was held in the county jail here for safekeeping until last week when he was taken to Inez for trial on a charge of murder, received the death penalty at the hands of a Martin county jury Monday afternoon for the robbery-murder of Lige Davis, 40, in September.

The 40-year-old defendant heard the verdict of death in the electric chair without visible sign of emotion. As he was led, handcuffed, across a wind-swept jailyard from the courtroom he remarked to Deputy Sheriff Nelson Booth:

"It's a mighty cold day."

The verdict was made by 10 men and two women, one of the latter a Martin county teacher, within 25 minutes after County Attorney W. H. McCoy for the Commonwealth and Jasper Preece for the defense had concluded their arguments.

Circuit Judge Edward P. Hill passed sentence on Webb Wednesday, last day of his first session on the Martin court bench.

Webb's is the first death penalty ever imposed by a Martin county jury, court officials said.

His trial probably would have been concluded Saturday, had he not come into possession of a narcotic Friday night, Judge Hill said. Saturday morning, Webb was in a

ONE-BOARD OWNERSHIP IS STUDIED

For P'Burg Hi School; City Board Proposes Partnership Offer

County Superintendent Palmer L. Hall, on authority of the County Board of Education, Tuesday proposed in a joint session of the County and City Boards here a settlement of the partnership operation of Prestonsburg and Floyd county high school on a buy-or-sell basis.

He made the City Board a tentative offer of \$40,000 for its interest in the high school or to sell the County Board's interest for the same amount.

There was no official discussion of any agreement whereby the County Board would assume full ownership and control of both the grade and high schools, with the Prestonsburg independent district dissolved and residents of the town having a vote in County Board elections.

Nor was there any official reaction on the part of the City Board to Mr. Hall's proposal.

Instead, the City Board made a counter proposal, offering continued joint-ownership of the high school, with its facilities shared by both Boards but with the County Board having full administrative control over the second, third and fourth years of high school, leaving the first year of high school and the grade school in charge of the City Board. Expenses would be shared under the plan, as heretofore.

If either Board should buy the other's equity in the high school, the school would be operated on a tuition basis for pupils residing in Prestonsburg, if the purchase were made by the County Board, and for pupils from outside Prestonsburg, if the City Board buys. This tuition fee was estimated at \$100 per year per pupil.

Parents of pupils, in either case, would be paying school tax, plus tuition; and in Prestonsburg, they would be paying double, without a vote in Board elections, it was pointed out after the meeting.

There is a possibility that, if the City Board buys the County's interest in the high school, the County Board would eventually build a high school outside the Prestonsburg district.

Discussion of the situation here consumed much of a previous County Board meeting, at which Mr. Hall was authorized to submit the offer made Tuesday.

At that meeting Mr. Hall reviewed at length the building program sought and actually needed by the county's schools. On the basis of present prices of material and labor he estimated the full program would necessitate the outlay of more than \$1,000,000.

These projects were listed as: Melvin and Prestonsburg buildings, additions to the McDowell, Allen and Clear Creek schools, auditoriums for Weeksburg, Drift and David, new buildings for Ligon and Bosco, gyms at Wheelwright and Martin for which plans have already been prepared, several one- and two-room rural schools and minor repair jobs over the county.

Prestonsburg high school, it has been pointed out by City Superintendent Chalmer H. Frazier, must have more room if it is to operate successfully. The City Board has for some time had funds available for its share of the building costs.

The County Board at Tuesday's meeting awarded a contract of \$4,200 to the Home Appliance Company, Prestonsburg, for installation of inside toilets at Auxler consolidated school.

stupor and unable to be brought into court. When taken into the courtroom Saturday afternoon, he still was "rocky," officials said, and so Judge Hill continued the case till Monday.

The defendant did not testify. Only two women appeared as witnesses in his behalf and their testimony sought merely to show "he was not right" mentally. Before the trial began, an unsuccessful effort was made to have Webb pronounced insane.

His counsel relied on Webb's statement, made shortly after his arrest, that he went to the hills near Davis' home to rob him, not to kill him. This statement said he told Davis, "Me and your wife want your money," the slayer contending Mrs. Davis had agreed to meet him soon afterward.

Commonwealth testimony, however, showed that Mrs. Davis ran to the home of neighbors, warning of her husband's danger after Webb had knocked her down, taken Davis' gun and gone on to where Davis was working. The statement the accused man signed was admitted as testimony and in it he confessed shooting the other and beating him with the butt of the pistol until "I knew he was dead."

Webb admitted taking \$400 from Davis' pockets and to covering the body with leaves. He was arrested at Kermit, W. Va., two days later.

A special guard is being posted nightly at the Martin county jail while the condemned man remains a prisoner there. An appeal from the verdict is expected.



Measure and sift dry ingredients into a bowl. Cut or work in fat until the mixture has a coarse granular appearance. Add liquid and combine thoroughly. Turn dough out on lightly floured board, gather up into a ball and knead lightly until the dough appears somewhat smooth. Roll to one-half inch thickness. Dip cutter into flour. Cut biscuits and place upon ungreased baking sheet. If crusty biscuits are desired place about one inch apart, otherwise biscuits may touch each other. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) for about 10 minutes.

"Speck" Blackburn was fined \$20 and given a 30-day jail sentence, a verdict which he is appealing to the Floyd circuit court. Earl Walters was fined \$100 and given 30 days for liquor possession. He was absent from home when officers raided his place and he concurred with his wife in placing the responsibility on her.

Because of the illness of her two young children, Mrs. Walters was unable to appear in answer to a charge of selling whiskey. The court agreed that, if the Walters family will leave the county, it will not push her prosecution.

"We are endeavoring to spend the increased revenues in a just manner that will do justice among all the counties," said Beauchamp. "In spending funds for an expanded rural and secondary road program it will be our purpose to work in close harmony and cooperation with local officials."

"It is the aim of the Department to channel the greater part of the increased funds into construction and re-construction projects in the counties to the end that Kentucky have a constantly improving system of rural and secondary roads."

Approximate figures for each county under the new formula provide that each county in the state will be entitled to receive road improvements aggregating more than twice what was received under the previous \$5,000,000 allocation of funds.

"I am greatly pleased with the decision of Mr. Beauchamp and his associates in the Highway Department in announcing the initial allocation of funds. More improved rural highways make for a greater Kentucky," said Governor Clements.

It will be the plan of the Department of Highways to map plans with the local county groups during the winter months for road improvements in each county, preparatory to a full-scale work program to be initiated in the spring.

For instance, under the plan announced Pike county will receive a minimum of \$148,546.64 from the added revenue, in addition to \$96,840 its statutory allotment under the old law, making a total of \$245,386.64 available for expenditure in the county next year.

Any moneys not spent one year in a county to which it was allotted will be carried over for expenditure in the county next year.

STATE TAXES NOT HIGHEST

Average Kentuckian Pays Less in Taxes Than Others, Claim

Taxes for the average Kentuckian are much lower than those for the average American even though, for the past 35 years, taxes for state and local purposes in Kentucky have gone up rapidly.

This conclusion was made by Dr. James W. Martin, director, Bureau of Business Research of the University of Kentucky in presenting a report on "Taxation" in Kentucky. The report was prepared for the Committee for Kentucky and presented to the 87 member organization delegates assembled at the Henry Clay hotel in Louisville Friday night, Nov. 19.

Dr. Martin said, "Most citizens are interested in taxes but many of us are concerned only with the taxes we as individuals pay. However, to understand our position as a taxpayer, we must look at the total tax picture and understand the use that is made of our taxes in this state." He continued by stating that the average Kentuckian paid about \$50 in taxes in 1947 while the average amount paid by citizens in other states was approximately \$90 per person.

"State and local taxes, since 1913, have risen in Kentucky, as has been the case throughout the country," Dr. Martin said. "Before World War II, the Kentucky advance was slower than the average. Since then, however, the rise in Kentucky has been a trifle faster than in other states." "In 1913, 80 per cent of all our taxes in Kentucky were based on property but by 1947 the property based tax dropped to 41 per cent." Dr. Martin stated that, "although local government taxes in Kentucky have risen in the last five years, this rise has not been as fast as in the average of all states."

The expert declared that, "Property assessments are so low in certain areas that the effect is to cut the rate restrictions to one-third or one-half those provided by law. The variations are so unequal as to make heavy property taxes highly discriminatory."

"A modernized assessment program," the author explained, "would provide at least two most important by-products: 1. Greater equality among our taxpayers and, 2. Reduced interference with business."

Kentuckians therefore may be consoled in the fact that taxes per average person are much lower in Kentucky than in the group of all other states.

OF INTEREST TO VETERANS

An enrollment of 248,246 World War II veterans in educational and job-training courses in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky on Nov. 1 was reported this week by the Veterans Administration Branch Office in Columbus, Ohio. The number is 25,663 less than last May 1 prior to the summer school recess. The total includes veterans studying and training under the G.I. Bill and Public Law 16 (Vocational Rehabilitation Act for the disabled).

The enrollment on November 1 included 118,459 in Ohio, 88,963 in Michigan and 40,824 in Kentucky.

Attending educational institutions were 82,312 in Ohio, 71,632 in Michigan and 19,162 in Kentucky. On-job training totals included 26,427 in Ohio, 13,550 in Michigan and 6,171 in Kentucky. Enrolled in institutional on-the-farm training were 9,729 in Ohio, 3,781 in Michigan and 13,491 in Kentucky.

Veterans Administration is paying more than 12 and one-quarter million dollars each month in disability compensation and pension benefits to approximately 272,500 in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky veterans of World Wars I and II and peacetime service, the VA's tri-state Branch Office in Columbus, O., reported recently.

Latest statistics show the totals to include: \$6,144,761 to 134,625 veterans in Ohio, \$3,719,605 to 84,054 veterans in Michigan and \$2,418,862 to 53,779 veterans in Kentucky. Payments for service-connected disabilities range from \$13.80 to \$360 per month, depending on the degree and type of disability.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

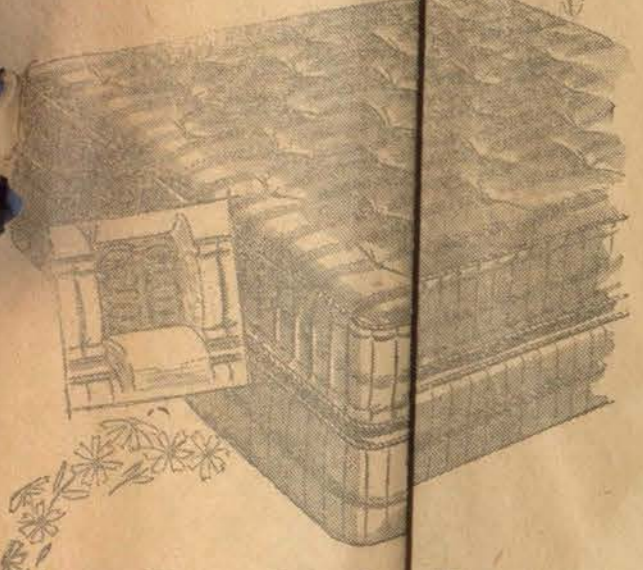

A. Outpatient treatment is available only for service-connected disabilities.

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COURTS GET RATE CASE

Southern Bell Asks Court Permission To Up Charges

Southern Bell Telephone & Telegraph Company has asked Franklin circuit court to let it raise telephone rates in Kentucky 12 per cent.

Its request was previously denied orally by the Public Service Commission. The P.S.C. official order was entered last Thursday and the company appealed to the courts. It asked rate increases totaling \$2,065,000 a year, contending that mounting operation costs had cut its profits under present rates in Kentucky to less than 3 per cent.

The higher rates have been in effect since July 16. Southern Bell has posted bonds totaling \$800,000 with the P.S.C. to guarantee repaying of any excess funds collected in the new rates finally are disapproved by the courts. The company posted another \$1,500,000 as bond with Circuit Court Clerk Kelly Smith in Frankfort.

Smith issued a temporary restraining order against the P.S.C. preventing it from enforcing its order directing Southern Bell to refund excess rates collected from 260,000 subscribers.

The company's petition charged that the P.S.C. had "arbitrarily" dismissed its plea for higher rates without hearing any evidence "to refute the facts."

The P.S.C. acted "in total disregard of the undisputed evidence," the suit continued. The suit called the P.S.C. "arbitrary, unjust, unlawful, unreasonable and is directly contrary to the facts."

Failure of the commission to let the company earn a "fair return" on its investment in Kentucky deprives it of "due process of law" guaranteed under the 14th Amendment of the United States Constitution, the company said.

Presumably, if the company's request for higher rates is met unfavorably in state courts, it will be in a position to ask the U.S. Supreme Court to review the case.

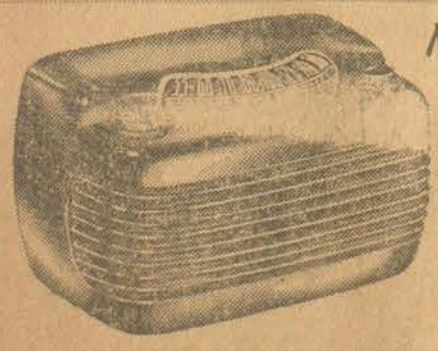
