Unlike Poisonous Types. Says State Health Head

Special brands of salt sold and used this fall to put up country cured meats are not the same as the poisonous salt substitutes removed from the market recently," Dr. Bruce Underwood, State Health Commissioner, has stated. The name of the pecial salt used for meat curing is imilar to the name of one of the ocisonous salt substitutes mentioned in dispatches recently.

Worried farmers are inquiring whether or not their home cured meat should be destroyed. "There is no need for doing this," Mrs. Sarah Vance Dugan, director, Division of Foods, Drugs and Hotels, State Department of Health, says. The salt sold for curing meat was sodium chloride, a pure salt sold in 25, 50 and 100-lb. bags and purchased by farmers for the purpose of meat curing. If the meat curing has been done properly, there is no danger involved.

The products which were withdrawn from the market were sold only in drug stores in Kentucky in two-ounce and 16-ounce packages. The only one found in Kentucky which was of the poisonous salt substitute type was "Westsal."



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



Measure and sift dry ingredients into a bowl. Cut or work in fat until the mixture has a coarse granular appearance. Add liquid and combine thoroughly. Turn dough out on lightly floured board, gather up into a ball and knead lightly until the dough appears somewhat smooth. Roll to one-half inch thickness. Dip cutter into flour. Cut biscuits and place upon ungreased baking sheet. If crusty biscuits are desired place about one inch apart, otherwise biscuits may touch each other. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) for about 10 minutes.
