2. This contest is open to all residents of Floyd county and members of the Floyd County Fish and Game Club, irrespective of residence, from January 1, 1949 to December 31, 1949.

3. No entry will be accepted of any fish caught outside the boundaries of the Seventh Conservation District, as defined by the Division of Game and Fish, comprising the counties of Pike, Floyd, Johnson, Letcher, Martin, Knott, Perry, Leslie. Breathitt and Magoffin.

Fish must be caught with pole and line only to be eligible for entry in this contest. (Cane pole, casting rod or fly rod using live or artificial

5. No contestant may receive more than one prize. In case of ties, the first entry received will be adjudged the winner provided the contestant has adhered to all rules and regulations herein

6. No other specie of fish except Smallmouth Black Bass or Largemouth Black Bass and Walleyes will be permitted to be entered in this contest. To be eligible for a prize the Black Bass must be at least 15" long and the Walleye must be at least 18" long. Measurement from tip of closed mouth to the longest part of the tail

will be considered correct. 7. Taking of the fish need not be witnessed. However, at least two persons must witness the weighing and measuring of your fish.

8. Your entry must be on a special form which the secretary of the club will provide immediately on request. To be eligible the special form must be returned to the club within 30 days after catch has been made. All fish caught between December 15, 1949 and December 31, 1949 must be entered not later than January 15, 1950.

9. Contest judges will be appointed by the president of the club at a later date and their decisions will be final.

10. All entries must be mailed to: Ray Stephens, secretary, Floyd County Fish and Game Club, Prestonsburg, Kentucky.
