

> Proposing universil compliance with the company's minimum timbering standards for the Drift mine, the inspector said temporary safety posts should always be set close to the faces before other operations are begun, and all working places adequately timbered. He endorsed using permissible explosives, but advised safer underground transportation and storage.

Although ventilation was generally good and the 2-north ventilating fan wis equipped with an automatic stoppage alarm, the inspector recomended installing another of the three fans on the surface, equipping it with a fireproof air duct and a pressure-recording gauge and an automatic signalling device, clearing the fan areas of combustible materials, installing paired air-lock doors or constantly attending the single doors, promptly closing ventilation doors, and instituting pre-shift examinations Inspector Wilson said that while the mine was rock-dusted to within 50 feet of the faces, more was needed; dust should be allayed during cutting, coal dust accumulations should be removed, and smoking in the mine discontinued. Other recommendations included completion of removing refuse and other obstructions from the roadbeds and clearance space, clean shelter holes, proper rerailing devices for the locomotives, effectively guarding the high-potential power wires from contact with the mine circuit, framegrounding and providing overload protection for the mining machines, locomotives and the trailing cables, and wearing protective apparel by all the employes and goggles for eyehazardous work. Fire-fighting equipment was adequate, design ted escapeways were reasonably free of obstructions, direction signs were posted, and all the employes used permissible electric cap lamps, Inspector Wilson noted with approval.







Pointing out that the current budget exceeds aniticpated revenue, the Commissioner said it includes two items of \$1,000,000 each which are revolving funds and are supported by sums from other accounts within the budget. These are the allotments for equipment and payroll clearings. An additional amount of \$1,757,752 represents revenue received last year and carried over for expenditure this year.

The budget includes a total of \$8,365,672 for all types of federal aid construction. It will be used to match a like amount to be granted from the federal government. An additional sum of \$5,700,000 was included for non-federal aid road work incluing \$1,500,000 for all types of state-bnanced construction \$4.000,000 for re-surfacing and \$200,000 for reconstruction of old or washed-out bridges. A majority of the resurfacing work will be a continuation of repairing the damage caused by the severe winter of 1947-48, Commissioner Keck said.





#### WHAT THEN?

TYE who have had, by hook or crock, superior educational advantages sometimes, I fear, find ourselves discounting the brains of plain

people around us who came up the hard way and do not have a diploma, except one from the school that Franklin says only fools will learn in. When we know where to find the expression of this or that philosophy and the name of its author or promulgator, we imagine that we thereby know the philosophy itself better than the man who might have trouble even in finding his own name in a telephone directory. I do not want to discount what books can and do bring, but even educators like me, from the soil and not the least bit ashamed of it, need to be reminded again and again that human beings pass through life, with or without book learning, meet experiences that teach, sometimes more than courses of study that lead to diplomas and commencements.

The chief trouble with most of the public display of knowledge at Fidelity was its self-assurance. Seemingly anybody with a public ax to grind could say anything he wanted to and get away with it. For example, we were told every campaign that all the good people were Democrats and all the bad ones Republicans, that a great calamity would happen if we trusted our lives and our sacred honor to the opposing party. So far as I know, none of our neighbrs made a record of these one-sided prophecies and checked them later with accomplished facts. In religion we were told, according to where we were that this or that of our three denominations would lead us to Beulah Land and that any other faith would lead us astray. Again, there was no accurate way of finding out whether the facile prophets "knew their onions." Probably that accounted for the cocksure way in which the prophets kept us prophesying. Some of those sure-fire fellows would probably have died of shock or humiliation if they had known that some of the respectable ones sitting quietly before them and seeming to swallow their oracular words, inwardly questioned, even as had many of our own people, there must have been others who knew how to suffer for what they thought right. Whittier, I early learned, was an Abolitionist, a horrible word in our little world. The truth to life in his "Snow-Bound" made me feel that he was not a false one but could tell the truth elsewhere. Without parading my belief, for fear of stirring up a fight, I went on my way, casting out many of the one-sided views for a broader tolerance. Sometimes I felt very lonely in this struggle, but in later life I have learned from some of the old-timers, as I have suggested heretofore, that the same silent fight was going on in many another breast in our little remote community. Outwardly we may have conformed pretty well to the narrow-mindedness of our neighborhood, but inwardly we were longing to be citizens of a little bigger world. One of the astounding things that I learned early was that some of our so-called ignorant neighbors sometimes had progressed farther on a world view than some of the literate ones, even the leaders. Leaders have a way of becoming involved in things; they have vested interests, they might want to run for office, they might be afraid of running counter to social opinion. Some of our people, like the village wag I mentioned in "Fidelity Folks," have no vested interests and could see straight and talk straight, regardless of the impression they might make. Since polls have become so common and often so misleading, maybe it would have been fine if we could have had an opinion poll after some cocksure fellow spouted off in Fidelity and left the community feeling that he had told the rustics some brand-new things. He might have been as surprised as Dr. Gallup or Mr. Roper or Mr. Crossley.



### **REA MANAGER ASKS SUPPORT**

#### **Of Poage Bill If Phones** For Rural Areas Wanted; 'Tell Congress,' Advice

"If you want you and your neighbors to have a telephone some time in the future, write your Congressman to support the Poage Bill," is the advice given rural people by J. K. Smith, executive manager of the statewide REA office in Louisville. This statement was prompted by the fact that the bill which would set up rural telephone co-ops under the REA program, is "bogging down' for lack of "grass-roots" support,

"The people can pass any legislation they want, if they express themselves, but no Congressman can read the minds of his constituents-they must tell him what they want," Smith stated.

The Poage Bill, he explained, has been misunderstood by many people. "It will not force an REA electric co-op to turn itself into a telephone co-op; in fact, independent and mutual companies, rather than electric co-ops, will be given first preference on the money which the bill is to make available.'

Smith quoted figures from a recent survey conducted by the state wide REA newspaper, The Kentucky Electric Co-Op News. The poll showed that something less than 15 percent of the rural people in Kentucky have phones, but that a good three-fourths of those who do not have a phone, want one.

## To the People of Floyd County:

There are more than 15,000 young boys and girls in our county whose character and citizenship depend largely on the leadership and the proper enforcement of the law. As Sheriff I will not spend all my time in the office; I will send no man where I myself would not go. I will be out over the county with my deputies, helping the good citizens in their desire for peace and happiness, enforcing the law without fear or favor. If the good people of Floyd county want their county to be better, and to see those things done which they have long dreamed of, they have the opportunity now to join me in a fight for that very cause. I welcome the friendship and support of all, and promise every service of which I am capable.




