In Newman's Death; Floyd War Veteran Hurt on Ohio Visit

Body of Harvie G. Newman, 22 years old, whose death relatives believe to have been the result of foul play rather than a highway accident as reported, was taken Monday to the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Roscoe Newman, at East McDowell.

Newman, a veteran of World War I, was fatally injured near Wheelburg, O., June 9. He died Monday at Veterans hospital, Huntington. His injury was originally reported as an accident in which a river figured.

It was pointed out, however, that Newman left home to visit his grandfather, Harve Newman, near Warsaw, and that when picked up on a highway had only a bus in his wallet.

Parents and the following brothers and sisters survive: Inis, Jewel, B. B., Kit Carson, Betty Jo and John Ray Newman.

TWO RESIGN CITY COUNCIL

Allen, Hatcher Quit, Succeeded by Cooley, Fannin Monday Night

Prestonsburg had two new members of the City Council this week as two Councilmen elected at the last city election resigned Monday night.

Shortly after William C. Allen, West Prestonsburg, and Sam K. Hatcher, representing Ward 2, had handed in their resignations, Billy Fannin was appointed from West Prestonsburg, and Otis Cooley from Ward 2 by other Councilmen. They took oath of office during the Council meeting.

Press of other business was given as the reason for Hatcher's resignation. Allen had resided outside the corporate limits of town for several months, and resigned to permit a resident of Prestonsburg to serve in his stead.

Continuing with plans for annexation of suburban territory here at either end of town, the Council named Councilman Eddie Worland to negotiate with an engineer to make the necessary survey of the section from the lower limits of Prestonsburg to the Cliff bridge and from the upper limits to "Ball Alley." This in the face of a move made by residents of Porter Addition and vicinity to form an incorporated town of their own.

The Council signed a contract with Penn Fitzpatrick and others for the purchase of gas from the group if a well they propose to drill in the Porter addition is productive. Gas now used by the City Gas System is purchased under a contract with the Kentucky West Virginia Gas Company, but members of the Council said Kentucky West Virginia, hard-pressed to fill gas commitments, was glad to suspend the contract in the event the drilling venture is successful.

No action was taken toward issuing a formal invitation to the State Police to enter Prestonsburg, but this will be done, it was said, when City Attorney Joe Hobson has the proper ordinance prepared.

There was no discussion of Prestonsburg's financial plight at Monday's meeting, but Councilman Ray Howard said later that definite action will be taken on the question of inviting H. Clyde Reeves, state Commissioner of Revenue, to come here, make an impartial tax survey and set up a system for equalization of property assessments.

PRATER FREED ON \$500 BOND

Analysis of Stains In His Car Planned In Christian Death

With the release from jail here Monday of Earl Prater, 28, former Haysville man, the death of John Edward Christian, whose body was found last Wednesday morning on the highway, between Allen and Martin, reverted for the time being to that of a hit-run tragedy.

Prater was released under \$500 bond in connection with a liquor possession charge. His automobile which had been in the care of county and state authorities since his arrest was returned to him.

Meanwhile, stains taken from the interior of the auto are being analyzed. Prater told authorities smudges on the rear seat and the floor of the car were caused by tobacco juice, not blood.

Prater was arrested last Thursday after Deputy Sheriff John Hopson, of Allen, was told he was jealous of Christian, a timekeeper for the Kentucky & West Virginia Power Company on a line construction job in the vicinity of Garrett. He maintained his innocence.

WAGE PACT TALK SEEN

While Bus Company Workers on Strike; Friday Parley Fails

The Sparks Brothers Bus Company and its employees face the possibility of attempting the negotiation of a wage contract while the workers remain on strike.

This became apparent this week as the present contract is due to expire July 10 and after a three-hour parley last Friday failed to settle differences between the company and its employees which came to a head June 7, with the drivers and other employees, 18 in all, refusing to work.

The bus company employees, members of Local Union No. 547, United Construction Workers, voted Tuesday night at the scheduled election of officers to retain the old officers until they return to work. Early Report Expected On Big Sandy Project

CARL PERKINS CITES LETTER OF CHAIRMAN

After Wells' Radio Talk; Claims Administration Neutral on Project

The Public Works Committee of Congress may make a decision on proposed legislation providing for canalization of the Big Sandy river within the next week, Congressman Carl D. Perkins told The Times in a telephone conversation from Washington Tuesday morning.

The committee's report could be longer away, even as much as three weeks, Congressman Perkins added. "If we get two or three Republican votes in the committee, the report will be favorable," he said, "but if all Republican committee members vote against it, I am afraid of the consequences. However, I am hopeful all will not be."

The Congressman's statement to The Times followed reports reaching him on a radio talk made recently by J. B. Wells, Paintsville, in which Perkins was accused of "double-dealing" in his support of the project, publicly professing loyalty to canalization but privately opposing it. In reply he referred to a letter written him by Will M. Whittington, chairman of the Public Works committee, a copy of which was made available for publication. The Whittington letter, dated June 8, said:

"I recall your several interviews with me in behalf of the Big Sandy valley project and your helpful and constructive statement in behalf of the project before the Committee. I am in receipt of your letter of the 7th inst. telling me of your recent visit to the district and of the importance of the project at this critical time. I will be glad to present your letter to the Committee. I again assure you that the Committee is giving most careful thought to your request for favorable consideration."

"The Administration," Congressman Perkins declared in his telephone call to The Times, "is not making any move one way or the other."

Proponents of canalization have counted heavily on Administration support, particularly from Vice-President Barkley.

Discussing other legislation, Mr. Perkins reported a legislative jam. The minimum wage bill, which would establish a 75-cents-an-hour minimum, wound up in committee with a 10-10 vote, and the federal aid to education bill was snarled by introduction of a new bill in the House.

Allen Child, Believed Sufferer from Polio, Is Under Observation

Eleven-year-old Katherine Smith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Smith, of Allen, was removed Tuesday from Our Lady of the Way hospital at Martin to Morris Memorial hospital, Milton, W. Va., after physicians had diagnosed her ailment as infantile paralysis.

The child is under observation at the Milton hospital but a diagnosis had not been received from that institution Wednesday morning.

Because of the polo scare resulting from the child's illness, friends of the Rev. George W. Nerbonne, Martin, who had planned a benefit supper in his honor at the Allen golf course has been indefinitely postponed.

Lexington doctors last week agreed in a poll taken by newspapers that this may be a polo year in Kentucky. Angelo, Texas, where James Morell, Jr., former Prestonsburg man, now resides, is a polo center at this time, Mr. Morell said this week.

WOULD DROP BEAVER TRAINS

C. & O. Files for Permit To Quit Passenger Runs On Both Beaver Lines

The Chesapeake & Ohio Railway Company has filed with the Kentucky Railroad Commission application for permission to discontinue all passenger train service on both Right and Left Beaver Creeks and between Allen and Martin.

Public hearings on proposed discontinuances on both branches will be held in Frankfort, July 13. One notice of hearing describes proposed train discontinuance as affecting the Elkhorn and Beaver Valley sub-division, between Allen and Wayland; the other as discontinuing service on the Long Fork, Clear Creek and Wheelwright sub-division.

Hearings already have been held, in Frankfort and Pikeville, on the C. & O.'s plan to discontinue two passenger trains on the Big Sandy division between Ashland and Elkhorn City.

SAYS CHANCES FOR BILL GOOD

Perkins Backs Measure Giving Mine Inspectors Broad Police Powers

Washington, June 19.—The prospects of Congress coming up with a tight federal coal-mine inspection law are good, says Representative Carl Perkins, Democrat, of Hindman.

He was on the job this week as the House Labor Committee, of which he is one of the more active members, took up a bill to equip the federal authorities with police authority.

The bill, drawn up by Representative Price (D., Ill.), would give the inspectors the authority to order an operator to close any mine or section of a mine which was determined to be of "imminent danger."

It would mean that if the operator didn't send the miners out of the diggings right then and there he would be liable to a fine of \$500 and 60 days' imprisonment.

Perkins is flat-footedly in favor of the bill. So is the Bureau of Mines. So are the United Mine Workers. The coal operators don't want it. Their spokesmen have expressed not only their opposition, but their intention to test it in the courts if it becomes law.

"In my judgment," says Perkins, "the U. S. Bureau of Mines should have power to police unsafe mines when imminent danger exists."

"It is estimated that 85 per cent of all accidents could be prevented if knowledge we now possess was put into practice. Many of the worst mine explosions would be prevented by the enactment of such a law."

"In the past we have had instances where as many as 361 men were killed in a single explosion. From a humanitarian standpoint we should have this measure."

Perkins says he thinks the Labor Committee will report the bill out all right, probably by a 13-to-12 vote. And he expresses belief there won't be any trouble about getting it to the House for action this session. In case there is, though, he says he thinks chairman, Representative Lesinski, will take advantage of a parliamentary wrinkle to get it past the powerful Rules Committee.

The Bureau of Mines spokesman told the committee that since the federal inspectors can only recommend corrections in mines when hazardous conditions are found, the burden of enforcing safety measures falls to the state mine departments.

Sometimes they are enforced and sometimes they aren't, the spokesman said.

During the year that ended on June 30, 1948, officials testified, federal inspectors found 2,825 violations of state mining laws in Kentucky. The infractions included 631 on ventilation, 614 on timbering, 439 on coal and rock dust, and 390 on electricity.

Among the coal states only Pennsylvania and West Virginia had more violations than Kentucky in that period.

SEIZE LIQUOR, TRUCK DRIVER

Deputy Constables Nab Wine, Beer and Whiskey Here Tuesday Morning

Three deputy constables, one of whom was acting as Prestonsburg night policeman, captured a truckload of whiskey, wine and beer here, shortly before daybreak Tuesday morning.

"Where you going with that liquor?" the officers, Night Policeman Monroe Green, Deputy Constables Vernon Wright and Ben Castle, challenged the driver, Shelby Jones, of Harold.

"Home," was the reply.

He went to jail, instead. Later in the day, he was released, with the truck, under \$500 bond by County Judge Alex L. Davidson. William Hamilton, of the Mud Creek section, who officers said owned the truck, was released without bond. Jones was charged with possession of illegal whiskey.

The truck's cargo consisted of a reported 150 cases of spirits, which were confiscated by Chief of Police Bill Blackburn.

Capture by State Detective Arch Thompson of a truck loaded with 75 cases of whiskey in dry Johnson county recently was reported here this week.

The trip was given the Scouts by their sponsors, the Princess Elkhorn Coal Company, as a reward for the fine record made last year in promotions. Out of a membership of 34 Scouts the troop had 30 promotions, ranging from Second Class to Eagle Scout.

FIRE DAMAGE OVER \$10,000

Temporary Coal Tipple, Bath House Destroyed As Gas Main Explodes

Damage placed at \$20,000 to \$30,000 resulted Sunday morning in the destruction by fire of a temporary coal tipple and bathhouse of the Inland Steel Company at Buckingham, near Wheelwright.

The blaze, said to have been caused by a gas leak and the subsequent explosion of an 18-inch gas line of the United Fuel Company, also destroyed transformer lines and a small bridge spanning Left Beaver Creek. Clothing left by miners in the bathhouse was lost. The tipple had not been recently used.

Wilson Stepp, head of the gas company's office here, said the leak may have been caused by a faulty weld of the pipe by the manufacturer. Company officials immediately began an investigation of the blaze. They declined to make an estimate of damage.

Delong May Lose Eye, Result of Slatefall

Estill Delong, 38 years old, mine motorman, was taken to the Beaver Valley hospital, Martin, Tuesday afternoon after he had been severely injured by a slatefall in the Kathryn Elkhorn Coal Company mine. His right eye may be lost, it was said.

MAY ATTACK CANDIDATE'S ELIGIBILITY

New Aspirant to Office Not a Registered Voter, Is Claim Heard Locally

At the close of registration, Wednesday midnight, 143 Democrats and 38 Republicans had filed for Floyd county offices.

The expected rush of candidates to file at the last minute failed to materialize. Nor were the expected withdrawals from the primary filed.

Only one office in the county will go uncontested, and this is that of Tax Commissioner, with Clive Akers, Democratic incumbent, the only candidate in the coming primary.

Candidacy of one newcomer to the County Judge's race on the Democratic ticket will be attacked, it was said here this morning. The candidate, registered as Bob "L." Davidson, of Drift, is ineligible to seek office, since he was not a registered voter at the 1947 and 1948 elections and has not since registered, it was claimed.

Davidson's name appears only on the "master" registration book on which he was originally listed as a Republican. A change in party affiliation had been made, however--by whom, the County Clerk's office said nobody there knew.

In addition to the candidates listed are 39 Democrats and 11 Republicans seeking nomination for Constable in the county's four Magisterial districts. The list of candidates:

ONE KILLED, TWO INJURED

In Wreck Near Drift; Blackburn Is Victim, Banner Couple Hurt

Leek Blackburn, 62 years old, retired miner and Drift business man, was fatally injured in an auto accident Saturday evening near Drift and a few miles from Hite where his son, Tracey, was killed in a motor tragedy, little more than a year ago.

Seriously injured in the wreck which claimed Blackburn's life were Luther Compton, 33, of Banner, and his wife, Mrs. Lily Blackburn, 30. Their 11-year-old daughter, Phyllis, and their baby escaped with lesser hurts.

Blackburn's car, said by state police to have been driven at high speed on a wet road, and the Comptons' met, head-on. Blackburn, owner of a place of business at Drift and of a motel near Martin, died of internal injuries at the Beaver Valley hospital. Mrs. Compton's leg was broken in three places. Her husband suffered a severe head injury and a broken arm. They were later taken to St. Mary's hospital, Huntington, W. Va.

Victim of the smashup was a native of the Johns Creek section of the county, the son of the late John and Susie James Blackburn. He had resided at Drift 16 years. Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Boggs Blackburn, three sons and one daughter, Walter Blackburn, Drift, James Albert Blackburn, McDowell, Robert Lee Blackburn, with the army at Key West, Fla., and Miss Billie Jean Blackburn, of Drift. Two brothers and three sisters also survive: Billy Blackburn, Printer, Dodge Blackburn, Catlettsburg, Mrs. Maudie James, Margaret Blackburn and Mrs. Annie Cisco, all of Johns Creek.

The funeral was conducted Wednesday afternoon from the Drift theatre under auspices of Prestonsburg lodge, Independent Order of Odd Fellows. Officiating ministers were the Revs. Robert Martin, Ollie Sammons, Saul Sexton and Tommy Hughes. Burial at Drift was under direction of the Arnold Funeral Home.

All or parts of Pike, Knott, Magoffin, Johnson, Martin, Clay, Harlan, Perry, Lawrence, Morgan, Breathitt, Letcher, Rowan, Boyd, Wolfe, Elliott and Lee counties were carved from the vast territory that was the original Floyd formed 150 years ago, and it is expected that residents of these counties will find an interest in the county's Sesquicentennial.

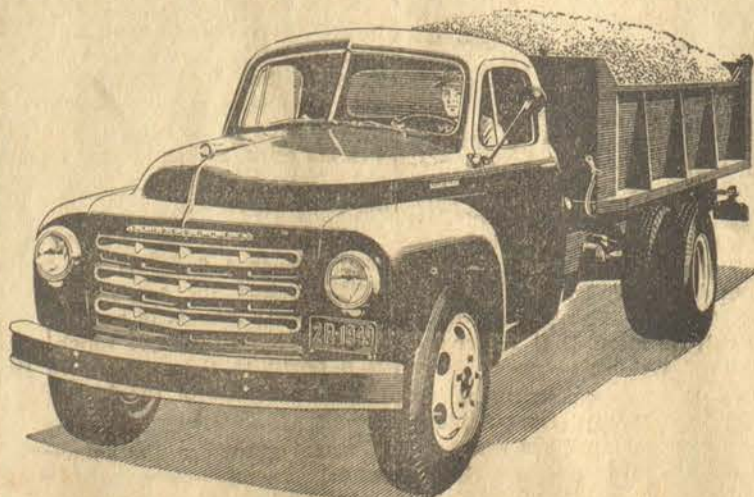

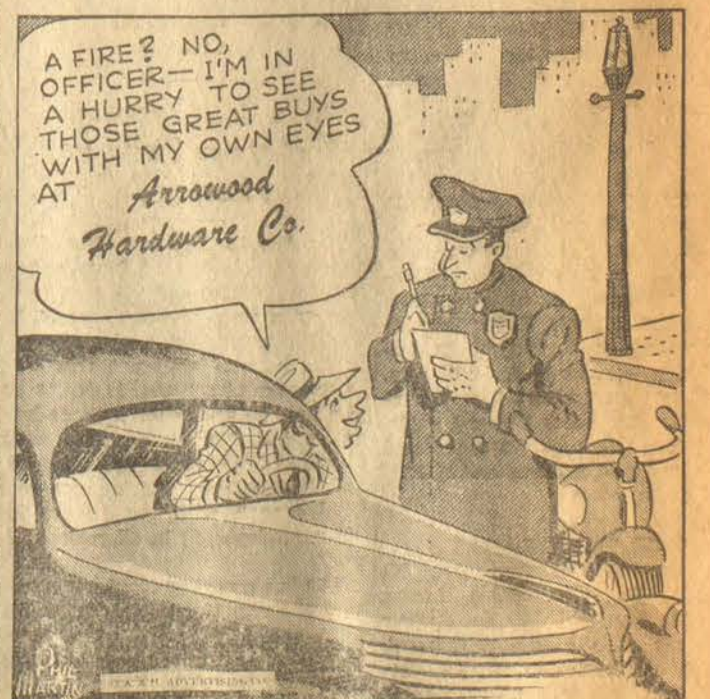

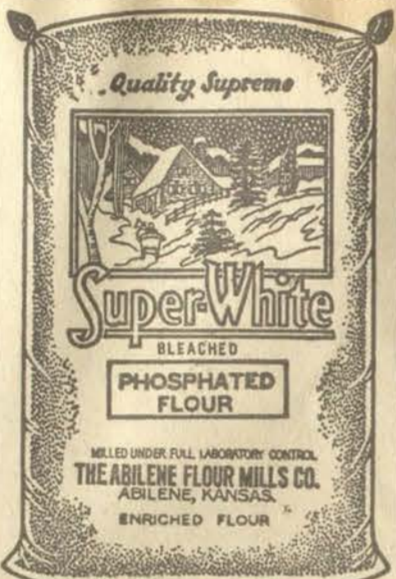

SAYS T-H BILL FORBIDS STOP

Of Work in Some Fields But Stoppage in South Within Law, Is Claim

Although it is conceded John L. Lewis could call his United Mine Workers from their work in the Southern coal fields, June 30, he was warned Tuesday he will be violating the Taft-Hartley Act if he orders them out in some other fields.

The warning was issued by George H. Love, president of the Pittsburgh Consolidation Coal Company, as Lewis and Northern and Western Commercial operators met in an effort to write a new contract that may set a pattern for the entire coal industry.

"We don't think the no-contract, no work policy applies to us on June 30," Love told newspapermen. "We consider that we have a contract that runs to August 14. That's the law of the land. You can't make a contract that supersedes the law of the land."

He based his interpretation on a section of the Taft-Hartley Law that requires unions to stay on the job for 60 days during negotiations for a new contract.

Under the notice given by Lewis, the 60-day period will not expire for U.S. Steel Corporation and its subsidiaries until August 13. It will expire August 14 for other steel companies operating "captive" mines and for Northern and Western commercial operators.

The Southern Coal Producers Association which has been meeting independently with the Mine Workers at Bluefield, W. Va., gave their own notice some seven weeks ago. That means Lewis could shut down their mines June 30.

Lewis previously told reporters that the legal rights of the operators were "unimpaired" by the union's notice of contract termination. But he ducked questions whether the miners will work in other pits if they close down the Southern fields July 5 after their traditional 10-day vacation.

Informed that reporters had been given the "dope" in Washington, Lewis retorted, "Why don't you go back and ask the 'dope'?"

Spurlock Wins Trip For Insurance Work

Richard Spurlock, Prestonsburg insurance man, with his wife and son, Dickie, left Wednesday on a 10-day trip to Detroit and Canada as guests of the Kansas City Life Insurance Company.

Mr. Spurlock will attend in Detroit the fifth annual meeting of the company's select President's Club of which he is a member. Less than 10 per cent of the company's 2,000 agents in 39 states and the District of Columbia attain membership in the President's Club, Ray Schwybold, Covington, general agent, said.

Following the Detroit meeting, the Spurlocks will go to the Crateau Frontenac, Quebec and there they will be guests at the celebration of 25 years of service with the company by W. E. Bixby, president. The trip will also include a St. Lawrence river cruise.

WHAT ARE SOME OF THE POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE COUNTY ATTORNEY?



In traveling over the county, I find in every section the good citizens are outspoken in criticism of the manner in which our local option laws are being enforced. The "Illegal Liquor Traffic" in this county needs no discussion in this writing as it is well aired throughout the county. "Rumors" as to the reason it is not being enforced is talked also. Your guess as to this is as good as mine.

I challenge any person as well as my opponent to deny that it cannot be enforced. We have sufficient and adequate laws for its enforcement and need only an officer with a "willing mind" to carry out such laws.

Being a candidate for County Attorney, I want to point out the powers and duties of the County Attorney in dealing with "Illegal Liquor Traffic," then judge for yourself whether proper steps have been taken to curb this unwholesome "rumor" that has caused the good name of Floyd county to be questioned among its better neighbors.

Can the County Attorney Enforce Local Option Laws?

Under our system of law enforcement your "Key Man" in every Commonwealth proceeding, whether it be a minor offense or the commission of a serious crime, is your COUNTY ATTORNEY. Why? Before any person is brought to trial he must be informed of the charge whether the proceeding is had in the Justice, County, Quarterly or Circuit Court either by warrant, or indictment if in the latter court.

The manner in which a warrant or indictment is obtained is rather well known by all, namely, by affidavit or the presenting of evidence before the grand jury.

Who Presents This Evidence?

Your County Attorney is charged with the duty of presenting evidence before the grand jury by the presentation of witnesses and the interrogation of them in regard to the offenses and crimes committed in your county, without limitation or rules of evidence.

How Is Such Evidence Obtained?

(a) By power vested in our Circuit Court, your County Attorney may require the attendance of any person within its jurisdiction to give testimony before the grand jury pertaining to any violation. We all know that the members of the grand jury are only in session for a limited number of days and depend wholly upon the County Attorney to present the witnesses and obtain the necessary evidence as to all the violations. (b) Persons holding United States license for sale of Alcoholic Beverages in Floyd county, name and place of business may be obtained from office of Collector of Internal Revenue, Louisville, Ky.

Is our County Attorney not aware of Section 242.400 Kentucky Statutes, which provides:

The possession of a United States tax stamp commonly called a United States License for the carrying on the business of a retail dealer in Alcoholic Beverages or the having the tax stamp or license at the place of business in a dry territory shall be prima facie evidence of guilt under this Chapter.

(2) An attested copy of the record of the office issuing such license showing its issuance shall be admissible in evidence in any action under this section.

Have the facts concerning these licenses been called to the attention of the County Attorney? If you will recall, not too long ago your Circuit Judge, according to your local paper, commented to the grand jury that there were more than 20 federal liquor licenses issued to persons in Floyd county. Was any action taken by your County Attorney?

What About the "Cry" that the citizens fail to help?

I believe you will agree that this is a very "poor excuse" as no person will wilfully disobey the orders of our court and refuse to testify before a grand jury. If he does, there are ample penalties provided for such refusal. The citizens as a whole are anxious to have good law enforcement and need only the cooperation of the official seeking to enforce the law. It should not be necessary for the citizens and taxpayers of this county to pay the County Attorney a large salary and at the same time set up "enforcement headquarters" at the courthouse.

What Is Your Remedy to Correct the Situation?

And there it is—"How to Catch Bass—ALWAYS!" (with the "ALWAYS" printed in red.) You see red in the title and see redder as you go on into this learned discourse.

So you think there aren't any fish left in the river or the lake or wherever you've been wasting your time and drawing on your wife's patience! Let Jason tell you about it.

It's all so simple. Why, you just hook on your hardware, something that'll sink, say, toss it out there, smack where you want it to go, then let it sink. No, no, don't start your lure back. Wait—let it sink. Steady does it. Down, down she goes to the

depth the fish are lying—if you know—and then start 'er back. No, don't be in a hurry. Reel a few turns, slow down, jerk it.

(It doesn't say here what you do about such small matters as hooks catching in submerged logs, partially buried cans, automobile radiators and the like. Besides, it's your hook and your problem.)

And for the floating lures and surface plugs, take your time, too. The same procedure, with modifications.

And that's how you catch bass every time.

Sez Mr. Jason Lucas.

After reading what this fellow had to say by way of advice, the editor of this bit of lore hastened to interview two other fishermen who had come home with nothing to boast of except the fact they didn't lose a lure during the day. 2. Mebbe he held his mouth right and they didn't.

You Can Train Yourself To Train a Dog

It's easy to control and use any dog's natural instinct to retrieve and it's a cinch to train a keen young Labrador, golden, Chesapeake or Irish water spaniel (if he descends from hunting ancestors and not bench dogs.)

James Lamb Free, authority on dog training, says that you gain nothing by starting a dog retrieving before he's 12 months old. A good young dog can be ready to hunt in one month with proper training.

Work him only 10 minutes a day—don't risk boring him. Never throw a ball or stick, but use a training dummy which is a burlap bundle tightly rolled, tied with string. It should measure 12 inches long and two inches thick. In water, use a small, cork-filled boat fender.

To start a young dog retrieving dummy: Tease pup with the training dummy until he is frantic to get it. Then toss dummy and speak his name to send him after it. The instant he sees it, run from him, clapping your hands and shouting, "Come!" He will chase you. Keep running, and just as he catches you, grab the dummy from his mouth. He will quickly form good habits of coming in fast and delivering to hand.

Curing playing with or chewing dummy: If he tries to chew the dummy, tease him with it, but hold a hand over it so he can't clamp down on it without biting you. Keep saying, "Ah, ah, be careful." He won't bite, and he will soon understand that anything he retrieves, whether the dummy or real bird, must be handled with care.

Beginning the steady: Don't steady your dog until after he is retrieving to hand with great enthusiasm. Then have him sit. Hold his collar while throwing the dummy. When it hits the ground, call his name, turn him loose, watch him go. Next, stand in front of him when throwing in case he breaks. Make him sit for a bit longer now before speaking his name to send

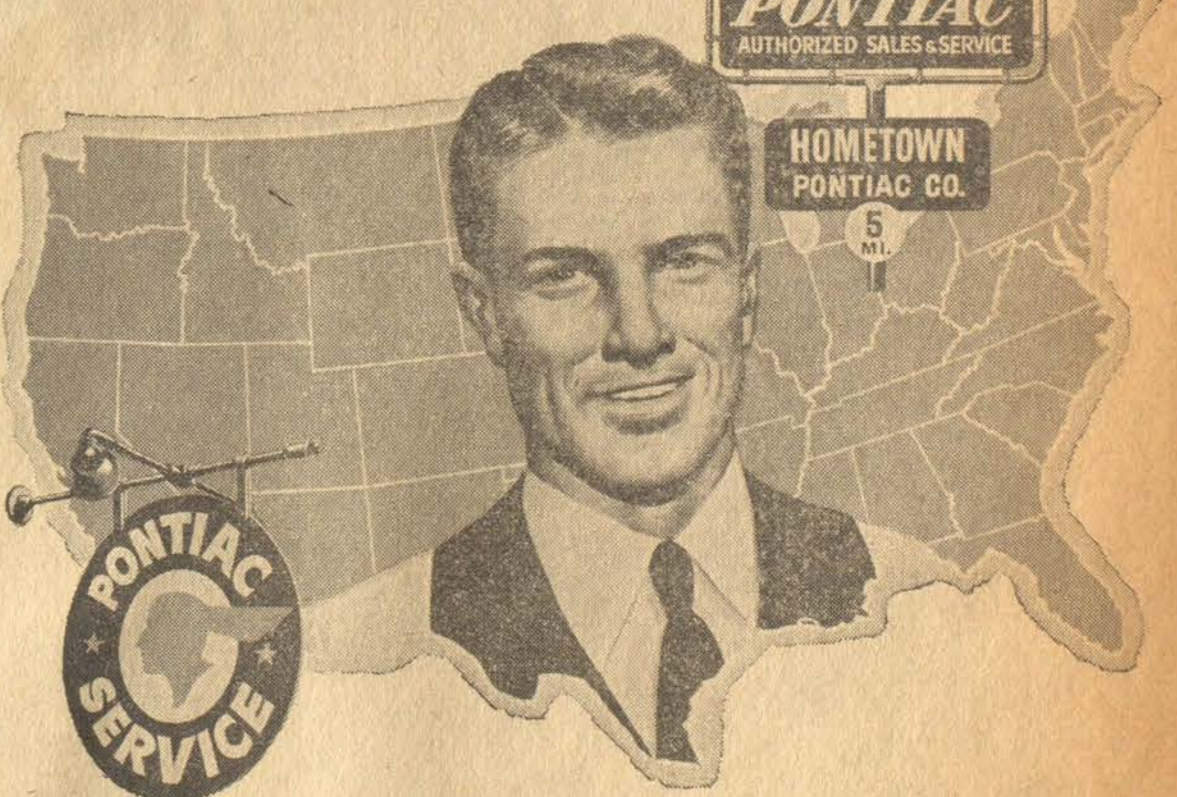

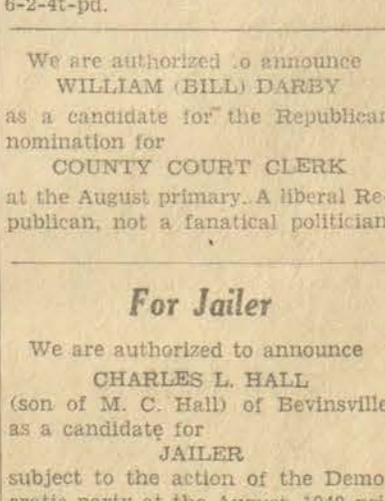

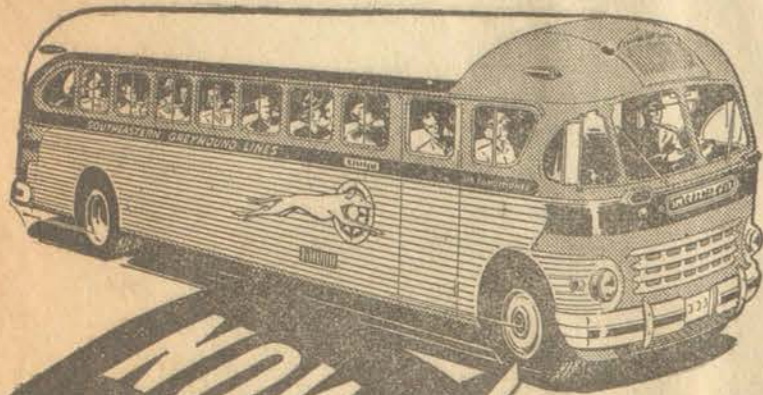

I am not a politician who will shake your hand and hug your neck or make wild promises in order to get your vote. I am just a veteran who is trying to do a good job for the people and do service which will permit me to go to sleep at night knowing that I have wronged no one, but feeling that I have contributed something to the betterment of my country.

Some folks fail to keep in mind at all times that the lasting things and the truest friendships are based on things deeper than "glad-handing," back-slapping and honeyed, hypocritical phrases. There are some who may expect of me a loud welcome and a show of cheerfulness for their particular benefit. Such folks call me a poor politician, and I admit I am. BUT I CONTENTEND IT IS NO DISGRACE TO BE A POOR POLITICIAN.

I prefer to be an every-day friend, treating all alike, going about the business of being a public servant with as little show as possible. Frankly, some of my experiences of recent years have been such that being gay and light-hearted comes hard to me.

I have served you as County Clerk for the past four years. I have done the work as it should be done, keeping the office open six days a week and I have never refused to open the office for the public at any hour of the day or night since I have been in office.

I am not trying to get rich by collecting every dime possible but have given free services in many cases, thus looking to the welfare of the citizens of this county.

The teachers of Floyd county who came to me to have their retirement papers filled out and acknowledged did not pay, although according to law I should have collected at least one dollar from each of them.

I have turned over to the Floyd County Fish and Game Club the hunting and fishing licenses so that they might be sold in various places convenient to the public. I permitted the Club to retain a major share of the fees, thus contributing hundreds of dollars each year to help it protect and increase game and fish reserves in Floyd county. Floyd county stands near the top in the sale of hunting and fishing licenses as a result of my cooperation with the Fish and Game Club.

No person has ever been charged by me for writing a deed, regardless of how far I have gone out in the county to take the acknowledgement. All blank deeds, mortgages, bills of sale, and every other blank form have been furnished free of charge to the public and never have I charged or permitted anyone to charge for them. I have paid the postage on all deeds, other documents and automobile licenses mailed from this office. That service alone saves the public hundreds of dollars a year.

We spend hours each day looking up deeds and mortgages and other public records for people and never make any charge for this service.

We acknowledge and place the county seal on thousands of papers for veterans, miners, teachers and old people and never do I charge, although you all know the law says that I shall collect fifty cents for each time I use the seal.

People, I have tried to comply with the law in all respects and have been frank and honest in dealing with you and in handling your business, thus looking to your happiness and making sure that every transaction recorded here is legally executed for your protection. I have examined each paper you have lodged for record and have advised you if I saw anything wrong.

I have handled the elections for the last four years as straight and as honest as possible, giving advice and fair treatment to all parties concerned. I believe the public appreciates the fairness and rapidity with which the votes have been counted during my term of office. All past elections as well as the coming ones have been and will be handled with strict impartiality on my part.

Never has any veteran been charged for having his discharge recorded. I have paid thousands of dollars in salary to persons to record these discharges without remuneration to myself. I have furnished hundreds of free copies of discharges to the Veterans Administration and no man has ever paid more than one dollar for a copy of his discharge from this office, for his personal use, although at least sixty-two other counties in this state charge one dollar and fifty cents for this same service. It was necessary for me to charge this one dollar fee, which is permitted by law, to help defray the cost of hiring typists for this work.

I have conducted my private life in a sober and dignified manner so that you, the public, could be proud of me as a public official. When I have told you anything, you know that I have told you the truth. I may not be a "Back-Slapper" or a "Smooth-Tongued" politician but I have served you with complete honesty and truthfulness.

Friends, you don't owe me a thing for the services I have performed, but you do owe yourselves every effort possible in selecting the person who you know will faithfully and honestly serve you as your County Clerk. This is perhaps the most important office in the county in its effect on your personal life and well-being because here are recorded the deeds which protect your title to your home; the marriage records which protect your rights and titles to property; your voting records which insure the exercise of your birthright; and virtually every document concerning your happiness and welfare. You owe it to yourself to place a man in charge who will protect and safeguard these documents as he would his life.

Move Started To Curb Fireworks on July 4; Sale Forbidden Here

A cooperative effort designed to curb the annual July Fourth use of fireworks is announced by W. L. Martin, state fire marshal. The move will involve the combined work of two state agencies, the State Fire Marshal's office and the Kentucky State Police and one federal agency, the Interstate Commerce Commission.

The drive will be directed principally against the unlawful sale and transportation of fireworks. It will be concentrated in the areas where the fire hazard has assumed the greatest proportion in previous years and in those areas in which local citizens requested that regulations against the sale and transportation of fireworks and explosives be enforced.

"Each year," Martin pointed out, "the stories carried in our newspapers and over radio stations paint a sordid picture of the toll of both life and property claimed by fireworks, not to mention the untold human suffering and misery they bring. Annually large shipments of explosives reach Kentucky from other states. Our plans call for a drastic drive against the source of supply and the mode of making these dangerous explosives available to the public."

(In Eastern Kentucky the Christmas season is the time when fireworks are most used. One noise-maker even has become locally known as a "Christmas Cracker.")

All vehicles used to transport explosives, Martin explained, are required to have permits from either the Interstate Commerce Commission or the State Fire Marshal. The Interstate Commerce Commission plans to make spot checks of Kentucky's highways for trucks without permits carrying these types of explosives. At the same time, the Kentucky State Police will be active in preventing the establishment and maintenance of roadside stands on rights-of-way throughout the state. A special drive will also be waged against operators of these stands who are residents of other states where the sale of fireworks and explosives are prohibited by statute.

Many towns and cities in Kentucky, including Prestonsburg, have ordinances prohibiting the sale of fireworks. Approximately 85 towns and cities, ranging from the second through the sixth class, have adopted the 1948 standards of safety by ordinance which automatically brings the sale and use of fireworks under the control of the town, and among these is Prestonsburg.

The sale of explosives which are capable of destroying life or property or inflicting heavy damage under Kentucky law constitutes a misdemeanor punishable by a maximum of 30 days in jail or a fine of \$10 to \$500, or both.

"In 1940, the last year for which figures are available, more than 4,000 persons were killed or maimed by fireworks," Martin recalled. "We certainly are anxious to do our part to lower the figure to the lowest possible minimum."

Much of the trouble in Kentucky, Martin explained, comes from various irresponsible persons from states bordering Kentucky. Ohio, Indiana and West Virginia have laws prohibiting the sale of fireworks but not prohibiting their manufacture. Transportation from other states into Kentucky without the necessary permit constitutes a violation of Interstate Commerce Commission regulations.

"These persons," Martin said, "in previous years have set up temporary roadside stands along public highways in violation of law. When state police apply the "heat" to their operations they moved to railway rights-of-way. The cooperation of both the railway companies and the state police will be potent factors in helping to correct this condition."

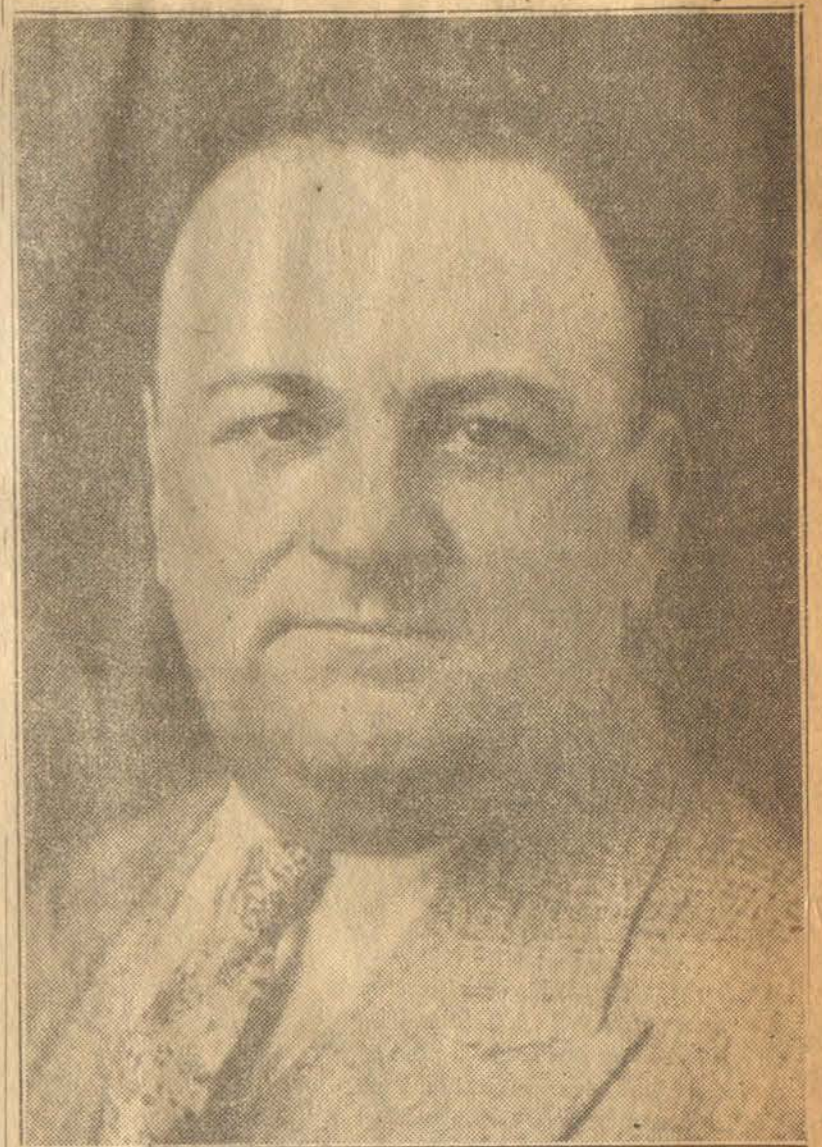

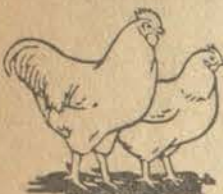

1/2 c. sugar
2 eggs
2 c. yeast dissolved in 1 c. lukewarm water
10 c. Snow Flour

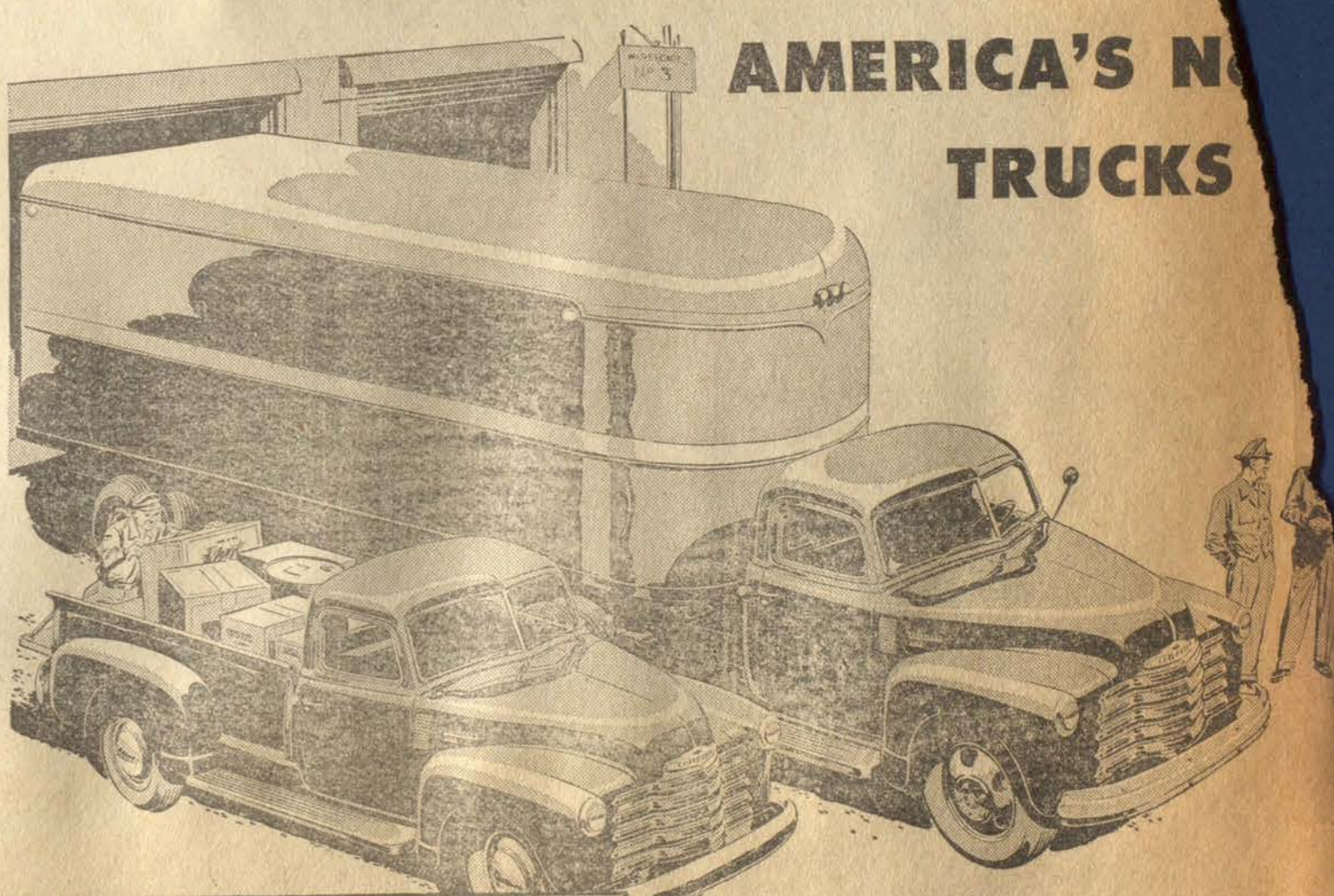
Scald milk, add salt. Cool. Cream together shortening and sugar. Beat eggs. Add to sugar mixture. Add milk to soaked yeast. Blend with flour sifted into mixing bowl. Beat well. Add sugar, egg mixture. Mix. Knead into smooth dough. Place in greased bowl. Cover. Let rise until double its bulk. Knead dough down. Put back into greased bowl. Cover closely with lid. Set in refrigerator. Each day punch dough down to let out gas, returning dough to the refrigerator at once. About two hours before rolls are wanted, shape as desired. Place in greased pan. Cover. Let rise in warm place until very light. Bake in moderately hot oven (400° F.) for 15-20 minutes.
