The Valentine Act makes it unlawful for persons, firms, partnerships, or corporations in combina-

1. To create or carry out restrictions in trade or commerce.

2. To limit or reduce the production or increase, or reduce, the price of a commodity.

3. To prevent competition in production of a commodity.

The operators said strikes and work stoppages ordered by Lewis in 1949 had cost his miners wages totaling \$11,000,000, an average of \$1,-300 a miner. The welfare fund for the miners also lost \$2,450,000, the suits declared.







### Attorney General Rules On Inquest Jurisdiction

The coroner in whose county a death occurs has authority to conduct an inquest

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


