L. Rice, moved toward them.

Is This Law Necessary?

THE TIMES knows of no flagrant abuses of the law which empowers circuit judges to probate persons convicted of crimes and given sentences of five years or less, but the danger is there that the law could be turned against the common-

We fail to comprehend the necessity for such a law. If an individual violates the law to the extent that the proof is so positive that a jury (a Floyd county jury, say, which is not renowned for severity) declares him guilty and fixes for him a sentence, what supernal wisdom does the presiding judge possesses qualifying him to abrogate the rights of the trial jury in the matter? If probationary powers should be exercised, why a trial in the first place, and all the expense to the taxpayer?

Federal judges, it is true, have long had the right to suspend sentence, but to our unjudicial mind this is a circumvention of the more democratic processes of the court—that is, a trial by a jury of the defendant's peers. For the result of the trial is nullified, wiped out, by a stroke of the judge's pen.

This state probation law, moreover, adds to the responsibility of the judge, leaves him open to criticism and even to retaliation from those who, having seen others win clemency, are themselves denied.


