2. The Southerner who is not educated may not know the details. but he doesn't need them. Probably more unreservedly than any resident of any other section of the land, he accepts the Bible as "the inspired word of God " its words as the literal, eternal truth. In this group, I would say, you will find fewer atheists than any other place in the world except foxholes. I have known, rather intinately, moonshiners, murderers and other with a disregard and contempt for the law which the civilized citizen cannot understand. These were men to whom the law and fear of the law and almost anything else were strangers-and yet I'd say there wasn't a laddy-buck of the lot but who believed in the reality of God. Not just a Supreme Being or a Cosmic Force or Naturebut a real, living God. One who had taken the lives of four men before he was 50 calmly replied when asked what he expected of the hereafter: "I'll answer to my God for everything I ever done."

3. I have found, I concede, that there are a lot of these rural people who do not belong to a church. Whether their non-membership is more in proportion to population than that of more thickly populated sections, I do not know. But I also have found that to those of the rural South who do belong Christianity s a very real and important thing. It's so real and so important to them that they even do not believe a hurch member should get drunk or ake the name of the Lord in vain. To sum up my views, which are ree, with or without the asking:

The South can come as near quot ing you chapter and verse as any section of any land, and it will come a lot nearer believing what it finds therein. It needs, exactly like the rest of the country, not so much of technical Bible knowledge about which to argue and create dissension but more of the simple teachings of the Man who in one brief statement epitomized the soul of Christianity and pointed the way to fredom from fear and hatred, greed and war: all things whatsoever ye

### ORDINANCE

PROVIDING A CURFEW HOUR TO PROHIBIT LOITERING IN THE CITY OF PRESTONSBURG:

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Prestonsburg:


SEC. 1. From the 16th day of March 1950, it will be unlawful for any person to loiter on the streets or places of business after 1:00 a.m. All persons having lawful or legitimate reasons for being on the treets after this hour, such as employment, going to and from work, getting a doctor, etc., will be exempt from this law.

SEC. 2. Any person violating this ordinance, or any part thereof, shall be fined not less than \$5.00, nor more than \$10,00 for each offense, and/or not less than one (1), nor more than five (5) days in jail. The Police Department is hereby instructed to strictly enforce this aw.

KENTUCKY:

The Kentucky & West Virginia Power Company announced that to become effective May 1, it has made available an improved retirement plan under which its 530 employes who retire at age 65 will receive substantially increased pen-

According to F. M. Baker, Pikeville district manager, the improved plan will provide pensions which, on the average, will be over 50 per cent higher than the present plan. The plan covers not only currently employed persons but also the future payments to those already retired. Under this plan, as outlined to employes of the company, the retired employe's pension will be based on his average annual earnings in the five highest consecutive years of the last 10 years of service.

The company has had a retirement plan in effect since December, 1940, the cost of which has been borne on an equal basis between employes and the company. Under this impoved plan, employes' payments will not be higher and may be less than would have been under the present plan.


