Senator Virgil M. Chapman, announced last Friday that the Senate Committee on Public Works, of which Chapman is a member, had authorized an apportionment of \$10,-792,000 in federal highway aid for Kentucky for the 1952 fiscal year. A like apportionment was authorized by the committee for the 1953 fiscal year.

Chapman said this figure was \$2,-814,519 in excess of the apportionment for the fiscal year which began July 1, 1950, and \$2,826,328 higher than that for the 1949-50 fiscal period. The apportionment authorized by the Senate for Kentucky also is

During that period no coons were to be taken in gny manner by the hunters, the Commission points out, but due to flagrant violations of this order many coons were killed and for this reason the training period has been eliminated for 1950. However, the coon hunter may take coons by dog only during the month of November. During this month he is not permitted to carry a gun or kill a coon in any way
