The Commission is granted authority to take action against any person or company discharging anything into the waters of the State which contributes to their pollution

Commissioner Ward also is chairman of the Ohio River Valley Water Sanitation Commission, which is composed of eight states in the Ohio River basin and which seeks through interstate consolidation to combat pollution in this basin.

FOR WHOM?

The people of Floyd county, just now, are being told by a few office-holders and State Administration hangers-on that in the man from Union county—Governor Clements—lies the Democratic party's strength.

Not until this election year was a road contract of any importance whatever awarded in Floyd county, and even now, although an e'eventh hour attempt is being made to fool the people by asking road contract bids and starting some work which should have been done, long ago, the highway work promised Floyd county is insignificant in comparison with the road favors granted other counties of the state.

Your taxes haven't been lowered. On the contrary, they are going up. And you're getting little in return except promises on which we all have lived in hope and died in despair for these many years.

At the recent session of the Legislature, you will recall, the people even were robbed of the Constitutional procedures of government on which our fathers before us had depended. That was only a few short months go when the Constitution of Kentucky became "another scrap of paper." Remember?

Floyd county and the entire Big Sandy section also lost, partly because this strong man from Union failed us, to win their fight for canalization of the Big Sandy river, the one hope of economic salvation we have. It is true, the Governor said he was "for it" and that he sent a few telegrams. But, except for lip tribute, he gave no strength to that great cause.

The people of Arkansas won their fight for river improvement, a project much below the economic ratio of Big Sandy canalization, BECAUSE THE GOVERNOR OF ARKAN-SAS WENT TO WASHINGTON AND THERE PERSONALLY LED THE FIGHT.

The teachers of Floyd and every other county, unless their memories are more fickle than we think they are, have not forgotten the scorn with which their pleas for higher salaries were met by this same Strong Man from Union. At the same time, the Governor was the leader in seeing that the salaries of elective efficials—men who had spent perhaps thousands of dollars to get their jobs-are greatly increased.

The people also will doubtless recall the petty spirit which prompted the Governor to beat down every bill introduced by Harry Lee waterfield, regardless of the merit of the Waterfield legislation, simply because Waterfield had dared oppose him for office and had declined to bow the knee to him.

From Union there comes Strength only for the "elect," the members of the inner circle who bask in the sunshine of the master's smile because they roll over and play dead at the enap of a finger, or spring to his beck and call.

And Labor, the miners in particular, surely remember that the man from Union county gave to them none of his strength. Only a few short months ago, when the fight led by Floyd county legislators and Harry Lee Waterfield for a Mine Safety bill had been beaten down by Administration forces, Sam Caddy told newspaper men the United Mine Workers of America backed the wrong man when they supported Clements for Governor. Does he expect the miners now to believe they would be backing the right man for Senator if they support this same Earle Clements?

The men who do the work in the mines are not fools. They are as capable of doing their own thinking as anybody. They know that men do not change their sympathies over-night. They know that if Earle Clements wasn't their friend, last January, he isn't their friend these last few days before a primary election is held, and will not be their friend later.

In Union there is strength? For whom? You answer that one.

We lift up our eyes unto the Hills whence cometh our strength. George Glenn Hatcher, now Kentucky's Secretary of State, was born and reared in these Hills-in Floyd county's hills-and the loyalty and voting power of all of us of Floyd county belong to him.

We beg of you-Do not throw your own down and embrace the occasional visitor whose only interest in you lies in what you can do for him at the polls.







Fishing Reported Better Than Isaak Walton Dream At Kentucky Dam Vicinity

"Old Izaak never dreamed it could

That's the word coming from Ken tucky Lake and Kentucky Dam exponents of the laudable art advocated by Mr. Walton are pulling them in with everything from a royal coachman to a bent pin and a silver minnow. But the best is yet to come. At least that's the information received Monday from the Division of Game & Fish at Frankfort as they made preparations for the expected mid-summer bonanza of bass and crappie.

With the season's hottest days coming on, lake experts are touting local and out-of-state fishermen to the fast waters below Kentucky Dam where exceptional catches of crapple have been recorded in the past two

Camp attendants say that better than good strings of bass and crappie have been taken in the last 10 to 12 days on surface lures and minnows. Should the weather remain fair, bass fishing is expected to hit its peak in the next two weeks.

Pointing out that during this time of the year most lakes become poor fishing spots, experts assure anglers that catches in Kentucky lake should not diminish. Game fish, throughout most of the summer months, seek to avoid hot surface water by lying idle in the deepest holes, thereby limiting the effectiveness of bait fishing and casting. However, Kentucky Lake offers an alternative.

"Kentucky Lake will remain the best fishing spot in the state," says Earl Wallace, director of the Division of Game & Fish, "In seeking cool waters, large droves of crappie and bass have moved into the area around Kentucky Dam and immediately below it in the Tennessee river. It is not unusual to catch the limit of 30 crappie in an hour or

Catering to the likes of fishermen who prefer comfort with their sport, the state has installed many modern cabins at both Kentucky Lake State Park and Kentucky Dam Village. A community center, comfortable cabins, tennis courts and swimming add to the attractions at Kentucky Dam Village. Rambling cottages and excellent boating facilities are an added incentive to anglers at Ken-





Champion of the People and for the People

Dr. Thompson is a citizen and resident of Pikeville, Pike county, Kentucky. He was born at Zebulon, Kentucky, the son of Richard and Nancy Charles Thompson. He was married to Hattie Weddington, a daughter of Ella Brown Weddington and the late Ballard Weddington. There was born to Dr. Thompson and Hattie one son and one daughter, Tommie and

While Dr. Thompson was born and reared in Pike county he has been a champion of the development of the natural resources of Eastern Kentucky for a good many years and is still giving of his time, energy and money to try and develop the riverways and waterways of Kentucky; to try and give better living conditions to all of us; to preserve our forests and wild life; to preserve our waterways in the way of locks and dams and ridding our waterways of pollution, etc. He is a full believer in the preservation of all our natural resources and gives his time and energy daily to that end; he is doing these things and has been for twenty years, so that you and I and our children and our children's children may have the advantages provided for us by nature if they are properly preserved and improved.

Dr. Thompson resigned as president of the Big Sandy Valley Association on June 12, 1950 to become a candidate for Congress from the Seventh District of Kentucky and he resigned so that this group could not be called a political group and could remain non-partisan.

Dr. Thompson has been very much interested in the improvement of farming conditions, having worked with and having been an active member of different farming organizations in and around Pike county.

He has worked with and among the miners in their ambitions and the things they have stood for and has never failed them at any time or place. The fact of the matter is he has given of his time, energy, and the most of his life working for the betterment of his immediate community and the state at

The Pikeville dentist was one of the founders of the 60,-000-member Big Sandy Valley Association. In announcing his resignation President Dr. Thompson said:

"I hereby submit my resignation as president of the Big Sandy Valley Association, effective today, in order that the organization may continue to function as it has in the past as a non-profit and non-partisan group devoted to canalization of the Big Sandy River, and the promotion of Agriculture, commerce, and industry in our area for the economic wellbeing of our people."

It is Dr. Thompson's first venture in politics. For eight years he has been president of the Big Sandy Valley Association and was president of its forerunner, The Pike County Economic Improvement Association.

He is the former president and one of the organizers of the League of Kentucky Sportsmen, and was chairman of the State Fish and Game Commission under Governors A. B. Chandler, Keen Johnson and Simeon S. Willis.

Dr. Thompson was in the army from 1917 to 1922 and spent two years overseas. He is a member of the American

Dr. Thompson headed a group of 93 men from Kentucky and Virginia who went to Washington several years ago in the interest of obtaining a national park for the Breaks of the Big Sandy River. At that time the government bought thousands of acres in the area for a national forest.

He served several years as a director and official of the Eastern Kentucky Reforestation Association.
