Beer Held Nontaxable If Bought Outside State, Attorney General Says

Beer bought in Virginia for personal use in Kentucky is not subject to Kentucky's excise taxes, Assistant Attorney General William F Simpson said recently at Frankfort He said the tax applies only to the sale or distribution of beer and is paid by those dealing commercially n malt beverages.

The opinion went to Elmo Cody, Three Point, Harlan county, who said he bought eight cans of legal beer in Virginia for personal consumption in Kentucky. He said he has been charged with unlawful possessing and transportation of beer not bearing Kentucky tax stamps. The facts in Cody's letter do not make him subject to arrest in this

East St. Louis, Ill., and St. Louis. The agency, with headquarters at Madisonville, said its members produce about 80 per cent of all Western Kentucky coal. It claimed its members must compete with Illinois coal producing areas which it said enjoy lower rates to St. Louis and East St. Louis.

The agency petition contended that this gives Illincis producers a preferred rate ranging from 25 cents
