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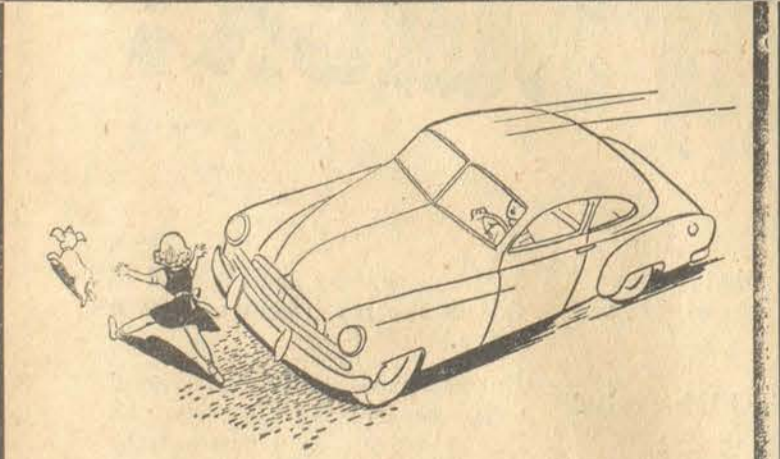



**HEAT TREAT RAW
 MILK FOR SAFETY**

For prevention of diseases such as undulant fever, tuberculosis, scarlet fever, septic sore throat, and dysentery, milk should be heat treated, Floyd county sanitarian M. V. Clark said this week.

He advised that immediately after milking and before cooling the milk be placed in an aluminum vessel over a hot flame and heated to 160 degrees Fahrenheit, using a thermometer to test it and stirring constantly. When the milk reaches 165 degrees, immediately set the vessel in cold water, continue stirring until the milk is cold, then pour into clean container and place in the refrigerator.

If further information is desired see Mr. Clark.

Many folks visiting in the county are apt to comment on "that good well water," but well water is not always good.

To be safe from possible contamination, a well must have a casing or lining deep enough to exclude underground seepage of contaminated water and a water-tight platform or cover to prevent surface water from running into the well. However, these safeguards are not necessarily enough if the well is located in a limestone region. In such a region, a chlorinator should be used or the water from the well should be boiled.

Since the source of contamination in the water are human excreta, having a safe sewage disposal system goes hand in hand with a safe water supply. If connection with a sewer system is not available, a sanitary pit privy or a septic tank disposal system is recommended. Open privies provide a breeding place for flies and mosquitoes.

A septic tank makes it possible for farm homes to enjoy the convenience of indoor plumbing. It also provides a safe and sanitary manner of waste disposal.

Plans for building a sanitary pit privy and a septic tank disposal system are available through the Floyd County Health Unit.

Improper waste disposal methods can cause illness or death of a member of the family or of a neighbor. Safe waste disposal is, therefore, actually a matter of life and death.

For further advice about making sure that water supplies are safe and sewage disposal systems adequate, consult M. V. Clark, Floyd County Health Department Sanitarian. He will be glad to be of service.

**Kentucky Widows, Orphans
 Of Veterans Due Benefits
 May Be Unaware of Fact**

Louisville, Ky., Sept. 4 (SPL)—There are undoubtedly hundreds of widows and orphans of both World War I and World War II in Kentucky who are entitled to pensions and compensation rights, but are unaware of the fact," Stanley Hudson, acting director of the Kentucky Disabled Ex-Service Men's Board, declared today.

He cited, for example: Widows of World War I veterans whose income is \$1,000 a year, or less, are entitled to a pension of \$42 per month from the federal government. Widows of World War I veterans with dependent children whose income does not exceed \$2,500 per year, are also eligible for a widow's pension. In order for persons to receive this pension, proper application and proof must be presented.

World War II widows are eligible for death compensation only when the deceased veteran had a service-connected disability of at least 10 per cent, which existed at the time of the veteran's death.

His reminder, he stated, is a means of acquainting all veterans' dependents with the fact that pension and compensation rights are available under certain specified conditions for non-service-connected deaths as well as for service-connected deaths.

Hudson stated that specified questions and inquiries should be directed to the Kentucky Disabled Ex-Service Men's Board, 1405 W. Broadway, Louisville, Ky.

WHY PLUMBING REGULATIONS?

Why Control Plumbing?

Plumbing came into being through the struggle of mankind to store, treat, and distribute safe running water for drinking, bathing, cooking, laundering and cleaning, and later for refrigerating, heating, cooling, manufacturing power. An equally important use from the start was to remove human waste matter, thereby preventing unpleasantness and sickness.

Elmer W. Rice, local plumbing and heating contractor, Allen, Ky., writes some interesting comments on plumbing. "The reason for plumbing is water." Plumbing provided safe water for human consumption at convenient locations, with no lapse in continuous service. Plumbing provides the means for the removal of human excrement, sewage and wastes, which are 90 per cent water. Without water, there is no life.

The Master Plumber's ability to furnish safe running water has made modern civilization possible. Without it, our American homes could not be run, our cities could not exist.

Why Plumbing Codes?

To protect the public from unsanitary plumbing, the use of cheap and defective material, and improper installation, sanitary regulations are provided to control the location, construction, installation, inspection and safe maintenance of plumbing. The reason for the protection of persons against injury to health. The health factor of safety is the minimum requirement and should never be lowered for reasons of economy.

Why Regulations?

"Power," or "Community Power" is that power inherent in government which protects the people against harmful acts of individuals, insofar as, matters of health, safety, morals, and the like, are concerned. Persons are protected from the things from which they, as individuals, cannot protect themselves. Thus, we find the safety of a public system of water supply, the efficiency of a public system of sewerage, the safe disposal and treatment of sewage and the installation, location, inspection and sanitary maintenance of plumbing all come under the police power of the state. Scientific plumbing holds a check on epidemics while unsanitary plumbing may be the cause of conveying and spreading disease which could wipe out great populations.

Why Have Inspectors?

Plumbing inspectors necessarily follows the adoption of plumbing regulations. The plumbing inspector is the public representative of the people to protect their health against harm. The plumbing inspector is required to have the ability to interpret correctly the more than 200 sections of the detailed plumbing code. His first duty is to correct improper installations. He must condemn, and order removed, faulty construction.

Why Control Plumbers?

The control of plumbing by a system of examination is for the public's benefit. In order to receive a certificate of competency a master or journeyman plumber must give public demonstration of his skill. This means that, like the inspector, he must have knowledge of the 200 or more sections of the plumbing code. Prevention of unsanitary plumbing, which usually results in a nuisance and may injure human health, is always more economical than condemnation and removal of bad plumbing.

The counties of the state of Kentucky with first, second and third class cities have and are governed by the State Plumbing Code. Our smaller counties have no code for plumbing.

The only answer is that the citizens of these areas do not fully realize the dangers.

What is the result of no plumbing regulations? Plumbing is being installed every day that has practically no resemblance to a safe job. Sometimes the workman does not know any better, and neither does the owner. Sometimes the workman's only interest is to finish just any kind of a job, collect his money, and be gone. The final result is that the owner does not know what has happened until he begins to smell foul odors or until the water he drinks begins to taste bad. Then it is too late to prevent illnesses or even death in his family. PREVENTION OF DISEASE IS ALWAYS BETTER THAN TRYING TO CURE IT. Who wants to allow some handyman to make blundering connections to our domestic drinking water supply from septic tanks, sewers that carry germs, from funeral homes and stables? Only by proper plumbing regulations can these hazards be prevented.

STATE FIRMS EMPLOY MORE

Manufacturing Plants Add 2,600 to Payroll During June and July

Kentucky manufacturing firms increased employment by 2,200 from June to July to continue the upward drive which started last March. The estimate of current employment trends, made by the Kentucky Department of Economic Security, revealed that this increase pushed total employment in manufacturing to 138,800, the highest level in the last 18 months and only 3 percent below the postwar high in October 1948. Both durable and nondurable goods producers showed moderate gains.

Employment in the soft goods group has risen 6 percent in the past year; distilleries increased by approximately 11 percent, clothing by 9 percent, and chemicals and petroleum by 16 percent. According to the report, indications are that the war threat has stimulated some distillers to maintain high output during a normally slack season. The clothing industry, hard-hit by the 1949 "inventory recession," has been recovering steadily on a national scale.

Durable goods producers were employing 10 percent more workers than in July 1949. Employment increases in the machinery, metal products, and equipment industries have been dominated by expansion at a few Kentucky firms. It was estimated that the lumber and furniture industries upped their work forces by 6 percent from June to July and that the primary metals increased by 13 percent. Employment in both industries, however, was still below the postwar peak.

Employment in coal mining operations was estimated to have decreased slightly during the month, but the 58,800 working in mid-July was 14 percent above July 1949. Many operations were working less than a full week, some for lack of orders and others due to a shortage of railroad cars.

Employment in other non-manufacturing industries showed only minor changes. According to the estimate, most industries were employing a few more workers than a year ago with the largest gain, almost 10 percent, in retail trade. Employment in laundries and dry cleaning establishments was 6 percent lower than in July of last year.
