

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

Itility Firm Announces Plans for Construction Of \$40,000,000 Plant

The Appalachian Electric Pow Company plans to start construction of a steam electric power plant at Glasgow, West Virginia, on the Kanawha River, approximately 20 miles above Charleston. This announcement was made today by Philip Sporn, president of the American Gas and Electric Company the Appalachian Electric Power Company and the Kentucky and West Virginia Power Company, who stated that authorization has been given by the executive committee of the board of directors to proceed with the immediate construction of 350,000 kilowatts of steam electric generating capacity.

The new plant is being projected for ultimate capacity of 1,050,000. Estimated cost of the initial installation of 350,000 kilowatts is about \$40,000,000. This authorization part of a \$251,000,000 budget of the American Gas and Electric system projected for the years 1951-1953, and which is close to \$100,000,000 greater than any amount previously budgeted for that period.

Included in this budget is provision for construction of the first section of a 300,000-315,000 volt super high voltage transmission system. This high voltage transmission line will connect the new plant to the Philip Sporn plant near Graham Station, West Virginia.

The initial installation at the new plant will consist of two large high pressure, high temperature turbo generators with a total capability of 350,000 kilowatts. Construction will start immediately. It is expected to have 175,00 kilowatts of capacity in operation by late 1952 and the next 175,00 kilowatts by the summer of 1953.

They returned here Sunday evening with a story that they had been arrested and fined for hunting on Sunday . . . that Nicholas county officials invoked a "blue" law passed 75 years ago.

The men are Pete Brown, Jim Brown, Luster Brown, Clinton Jones and Arthur Gee, Jr. Here is the story they tell:

A group of officers-deputy sher-Sunday while they were hunting squirrels near Carlisle. They said they presented state-wide hunting licenses, their guns were in proper shape to hold no more than three shells and they inquired why they were being arrested.

"For hunting on Sunday," was the reply of the officers and they were whisked off for trial. The judge refused to listen to their pleas that there was no law in Kentucky against hunting on Sunday and fined each \$16.50; the total sum mounting to \$82.50. They paid off o keep from going to jail.

After the men returned to Morenead they contacted officials here and a game warden who advised there was no such law. They are taking their case to Earl Wallace, director of the Fish and Game Commission at Frankfort.

Press releases from Frankfort have, for years, pointed out that it s legal to hunt or fish on Sunday and newspapers all over the state carried stories about squirrel hunters who went out the first day of the season-which was on Sunday.-Rowan County News.





There's been a lot of talk about released fish dying or not dying is expected to be from 25 to 30 per But experiments have pretty well proved that trout caught on artificial flies, even when handled roughly, can be put back with practically no less. But those caught on live bait present a much more serious problem. Then, they usually swallow the bait and gills or other vital organs are badly damaged. A fish so caught almost always dies

Most game authorities recognize this, and since live-bait fishing is so prevalent, insist that anglers keep all the trout they land. Only where artificial lures are permitted could angler to release his small fish.

Now a bass is a much hardier fish than a trout, and there's even less likelihood of one caught on artificial bait dying after having been released. But even a bass could not be expected to survive damage to vital organs. The case is much the same with walleyes which take an artificial lure lightly, with the lips, as a bass does. True pike present a more serious problem, since a pike often takes an artificial lure so savagly and deeply as to be hooked on the gills inside, and such injury often causes prompt bleeding to death.

Great care should be used in releasing a pike hooked deeply. Use a strong gag to hold its mouth open, and a long disgorger to remove the hook. The same applies to musky, although he doesn't seem to take a lure as deeply as a pike. But since a musky is a rather rare fish, no time or pains should be spared in releasing one uninjured.

Music, like many other arts, is a summary of what has The Assom Government, India, gone before; whole compositions nobody can copyright a phrase of music. Besides, copyrights run out after a few years, and then the music is common property. Nobcdy knows this any better than Tin Pan composers. Dr. Sigmund Spaeth has detected hundreds of song phases that reappear in our popular airs. His analysis of "Yes, We Have No Bananas Today" has become a classic and shows that this once-popular nonsense song has well-known pharases from such diverse scurces as the "Hallelujah Chorus" from Handel's Messiah, 'I Was Seeing Nellie Home," "I Dreamt That I Dwelt in Marble Halls," and "Old-Fashioned Gardens." If one could hear the airs that the composers of these songs knew, still further ancestry could be devised for a modern silly song. Dr. Jackson said another thing

that I liked: that many of the most tuneful airs that we sing today as new songs will be sung by our greatgrandchildren as folk tunes of the good year 1950. In two senses his words sound true to me. If we agree that catchy airs are often of folk origin, certainly many of our present-day songs have them and thereby can hope for immortality. Then it is possible that many a person will never have seen the sheet music known them only by ear. having seen the printed words, the singers will transmit the words as they seemed to be, with the usual folk forgetfulness and the usual folk improvisation from other songs and ballads. As bookish as we are, we still have many folk elements in our culture. Listening to a radio is in many ways like listening to a minstrel singing in a palace or a college. Most of the listeners never see the words; they memorize, accurately or partially so, the music; they pass both words and music


