The land must then be plowed, disked, and sown with a mixture of some of the following legumes and grasses; lespedeza, hop clover, trefcil, ladino clover in coves, bottom-land, or where there is plenty of moisture, orchard grass, Kentucky 31 fescue, and red top grass.




