A county hospital also would relieve present hos-pitals of their load of "councases—those patients who are unable to pay their bills and who must rely on the county to pay their way. Such cases are a heavy expense to the county, and a county hospital would re-lieve much of this burden.

This county, industrialized as it is, sorely needs the services of specialists, and with-out a hospital of the type contemplated, such profes-sional men will not locate in Floyd county.

The taxpayers of this county should remember another thing: The present 20cent levy to pay the county's old debt will be no more after this year. Therefore, the 20-cent levy necessary to re tire the hospital bonds would in a taxation rate no higher than that at present.

Over and beyond all the practical features of the undertaking, there is this also to consider:

Till this good day Floyd county has provided no memorial to the men who fought the battles of two World Wars. We have talk-ed much and done nothing. Have we forgotten? Can we ever forget those who served -those who died? What could be finer as a memorial to these than a hospital, dedicated to suffering human-
