





In replying to your letter of October 25, 1950, which appeared in the Pikeville Daily News, please remember that I have gone to Washington many times at my own expense to work for and fight for the canalizing of the Big Sandy river. Each time I went there, my friend, Dr. O. W. We need other industry to boost our dwindling coal production, and we need lower freight rates to enable Eastern Kentucky to get her just share of our nation's coal business. This can be done only by canalizing the Big Sandy river. Really progressive people are united in this belief, and many of us feel that Dr. O. W. Thompson should be rewarded for his long, hard fight for this principle by electing him and sending him to Washington as a member of the 82nd Congress of the United States.

HUNTERS, GUNS **TO BE BARRED**

To Make Certain None Will Jump Gun Before Season Opens Nov. 19

Earl Wallace, director of the Division of Game and Fish, is trying to make certain again that nobody ett, Chalmer Frazier, Curtis in Kentucky will jump the quail He is seeking to achieve that end

hunters and shotguns from Kentucky fields and woods from midnight Nov. 5 till the official opening

Barring of hunters and shotguns was decided on, the director declared, in order to protect game between the closing of the squirrel season and the opening of the quail and rabbit season. He printed out that violators have used the ruse of hunting groundhogs and crows and other animals in the past, when in reality they were hunting quail and rabbits. By using this ruse many violators have escaped punishment in the courts. With this new emergency regulation being in effect a nunter will have no excuse for carrying a shotgun in the fields during his designated 14-day period, and will be in violation of the law by so doing.

Authority for such emergency regulations was given the director and the Game and Fish Cimmission by an act of the General Assembly 1948.

The Division of Game and Fish has issued a reguest that all farmers, sportsmen and others interested in the conservation of wildlife assist in the enforcement of this regulation, since it is the only method by which the thief and cheater hunter may be kept out of the fields during the period immediately before the opening of the legal hunting season.

It will be a modern, fire-proof building. It will contain all the necessary special and regular class rooms. It will contain a school cafeteria and a generous sized auditorium. The site is large enough to allow for future expansion and play areas. It is away from the congestion of the town with its pool rooms, drug stores, etc., to distract the students. It is what the county people in this area have been waiting for and what they deserve for their children.

This school building will be paid for by the taxpayers of the county school system. It should be owned and operated by the county system to the very best advantage, for the children of those who will pay the bill. It will be county-owned and county operated if ESTILL HOWELL and BILL MALONE are given the opportunity to help carry out with Superintendent Palmer Hall his plans for this high school.

Why do we say IF? Because there might be a joker in the Board of Education races.

Although the Prestonsburg High School has for more than 20 years been a joint high school with the county owning half or more of the real estate and paying more than half of the bills, it has apparently been considered by a small group of Prestonsburg people as the city's high school and under their management, especially where the employment of teachers and the athletic program was concerned.

The present superintendent of Prestonsburg's schools is Chalmer Frazier. Mr. Frazier is sponsoring candidates for the city board and like the dog carrying a bone across the brook he now has his eye on another bone. He is also sponsoring the candidacy of James Greene and Dr. Allen for the county board. It has become more apparent that he is now the favored choice of Greene and Allen.

What is Mr. Frazier's attitude toward the new county high school? He has been one of those clamoring for new additional building(s) but he was opposed to the purchase of the new site. He expressed him-self against it both before and after it was purchased. Mr. Frazier wanted additional building(s) on the old site in the middle of town (which the State Department would not approve) or on a new site next to the city's grade school building.

What is the attitude of James Greene and Dr. Allen toward Mr. Frazier and his ideas? Mr. Frazier (and one of the city board candidates) is vigorously supporting their campaign for re-election. For the past several months he has been one of their chief advisors. Apparently upon their invitation, and as their advisor, Mr. Frazier has recently sat in on several meetings of the county board at times when he had no business to transact which concerned him or the city schools. The law says that the superintendent shall attend all board meetings and shall be the professional advisor of the board but it did not say nor intend that the superintendent of the city system should attend meetings and advise members of the county board.

Could it be that a fine high school plant may be built by the county yet operated largely according to the wishes of a few people in the city district if Greene and Allen are retained on the county board?

Both the city and county children are in need of better high school facilities. A great many of the city paople are interested only in having a good, well-balanced high school program in the best building and on the best site available. The county board is now in the unique position of owning half or more of a high school plant and furnishing more than two-thirds of the children, yet has nothing to say about the employment of teachers or the operation of the school. They will want to make sure that the new school which they must build will be theirs to operate by electing
