"When do I get paid," is the question many former prisoners of war, civilian internees, or their surnumbers have been assigned to all claims received by the War Claims SAT.—Late show only at 10:30 p.m.

Adjudication of claims has reached a steady pace of 1,000 per week. With this in mind, it is now possible for the veteran to estimate the approximate month in which his claim will come up for adjudication. For example, about 26,000 claims have been paid and 500 disallowed as of November 17, 1950; a claimant with a number under 30,000 has a good chance of being paid ATURDAY, Double Feature, 1 p.m. before January of 1951; a number in the 55,000 series will probably be reached by June of 1951 and so





The Department of Revenue has either sponsored or encouraged complete reappraisal in the counties of Rowan, Magoffin, Garrard, Simpson Jefferson, Muhlenberg and Ohio That means every piece of real property has been mapped, visited, measured and appraised. These new values are ready to guide the tax comnissioner when he begins his official assessment January I

Applications are on file for similar eappraisals in Wayne, Clay, Hardin and Letcher counties. It is the broad plan for the state to sponsor a group of these reappraisals every year, as requested, until all Kentucky has been fairly well covered.

Several counties have been improving their own situations with no help from the state except encouragement and a little guidance. In some cases, fiscal courts have put up the extra money. In the wealthier counties, tax commissioners have been empowered to spend some excess fees on improvement. The following roundup of county programs is taken from a summary by the Department of Revenue:

The commissioner and his deputies in Nelson county are mapping every parcel of land in the 32 precincts with a map for each precinct. The mapping already has located 15 parcels of old property not on the rolls, and 100 parcels of new property that otherwise might have escaped tax-

In Warren county, Bowling Green and suburban environs are being mapped to slow property lines. Buildings have been measured in 60 square blocks.

Johnson county has found 31 farms, aggregating 700 acres and 52 dwellings, that were not on the tax rolls in 1949. In addition, 17 lots in Paintsville, and 20 lots outside the city limits, all with houses, have been located for addition to the rolls January 1.

The work in Breathitt county is about half-finished, and has not touched Jackson. To date, the tax commissioner has found 40 farms with 43 dwellings, aggregating 2,360 acres, that were not listed in 1949. Also located were 10 unlisted houses and lots.

In Scott county, emitted property appraised at \$214,500 already has been found in Georgetown. The property consisted of 64 residences and two commercial buildings con-

But you can hunt without a dog. The main thing is knowing where to look for rabbits. The cettontail can usually be found snoozing in brush lots, meadow-lands, grassy thickets on the fringes of farms and suburbs, on ill-kept farms and cutover wood ots. Never pass up a brushy, sunny slope when hunting on farmland. Buckshot dung, piles of little brown ptllets are the signs to look for.

Then after the first snow blankets the woods, you can try the traditional New England pastime of "Injun-walking" rabbits. This is a simple but stimulating sport because following tracks etched in fresh snow keeps you in contact with the movements of your game.

There is an important rule to renember when Injun-walking raboits: although they are hard to evict from their beds the first time, they are very apt the second time to jump the new lair before you can get close enough to kick the cover. So watch
