

### SPORTS AFIELD

Why does the Atlantic salmon take an artificial fly? A trout fisherman might say: A salmon takes the fly because it looks like food and he's hungry.

But one of the few proved facts about the Atlantic salmon is that they virtually stop feeding after they come from the sea into the river where we fish for them. Besides there are hours when salmon takes the fly, but many more hours when they refuse it.

Dr. William J. Long thinks the answer is mainly that they take it by force of habit in a subconscious reaction, or reflex which has nothing to do with hunger. But, you may ask, if this is so why is the habit active at times but dormant at others? Could it be water temeprature?

Dr. Long thinks that water temperature of itself has little effect on why he is more active in cool water is that it holds more oxygen in

The point is that every change in the oxygen content of a river from more to less or from less to more, has its effect on a salmon's

So long as salmon are in a comfortable mood they rest for hours or days and until they wake up "You wanted to know if I was one might as well go fishing for

It changes from sleepy to alert when an otter glides into the pool or slowly from comfort to restlessness when the supply of oxygen decreases. The conviction of many anglers that no salmon takes the fly unless disturbed or restless, is right I think, but impossible to
