#### SCHOOL BOARD TALKS PLANS FOR BUILDING

22-Classroom Structure. With Gym-Auditorium May Cost \$350.000

Plans for a new high school building on the property purchased here a few months ago by the Flovo County Board of Education were studied at Tuesday's special meetin of the Board, and Gordie Young, a sistant Superintendent of Public In struction, is being asked to come here this week to confer with th Education Board on the genera building scheme and site.

Although detailed plans have no yet been prepared and cost estiracy, it is believed the school plan will entail an expenditure of \$350. 000 or more.

The plans, prepared by Hayes & Lusk, Ashland architects, provide fo a two-story building to contain 21 classrooms, plus a gymnasium-audi orium, a study hall and library.

One plan envisions a gymnasiun with seating accommodations on the floor level and in the balcony for between 1,500 and 1,600. The other provides for a gymnasium-audito rium, with seating space on eithe side of the playing floor and from the auditorium for around 1,400 gymnasium proper and the audito rium, and for sports events these would be opened to provide unobstructed view from the auditorium An additional 400 seats are possible it was said, through extension of the building at the back approximately 15 feet.

Keeping warm is the No. 1 wint problem of most outdoorsmen this country. So let's consider how it can best be done without carrying along some heated bricks.

We can start by disposing of two fallacies. One, drink is a fine social practice but it is of no value keep you as warm as a big one If I want to get warm quickly in cold weather. I increase the size of the fire as quickly as possible one thing sportsmen too of food in heating the body. I have en deer hunters take only a cup onder later why they were so S. Carter hilly even in moderate weather. The reason was plain; they hadn't toked the furnace, they had failed to put fuel in the stomach.

To keep moving also means to keep warm. Certainly, no one has ever frozen to death in our temperate zone while moving, Therefore, all winter clothing should be worn with one purpose in mind-keeping warm when not on the go.

Veteran outdoorsman Bill Wolf thinks two things are most essential to have warm cloth next to the body, and an outside shell of something windproof and, preferably waterproof. The best materials are

Next most important is dressing in layers. That is, it is warmer to put on two or three light shirts and a light hunting coat than it is to don one heavy shirt and one heavy hunting jacket, even though these weigh more than several light

As for socks, I don't agree with these who advise wearing a pair of silk or cotton under woolen hunt ing stockings. I much prefer soft wool athletic socks. Wear a clear pair daily if possible; clean woo by-layers principle here too, using two or more pair of socks As for the outer boot, leather is warmer than rubber. But in we ountry or when snow is on the ground, wear rubber-bottomed shoes

If you use down bags or blankets get down to earth when sleepin outdoors in winter. Cots, or any hing that raises you above the round admits air underneath and this can chill the marrow in your spine and associated regions.

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
