Owners having ponds they wish stocked should contact their conservation officer immediately who will file the applications with the main office at Frankfort.

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
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## Floyd Singing Master 'Burned' 'Bad John' in Unwilling Trade

Last summer during the Floyd County Sesquicentennial celebration there appeared on the streets of Prestonsburg a figure whose dress, appearance and manner marked him as one stepped directly out of a page from colonial history.

This was "Rob" Vest, a Floyd county native about whom Gerald Griffin, Courier-Journal staff writer, recently wrote the feature story which follows .- Editor.

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


