It also serves to draw the roots down to where the soil is most moist, Side dressing, or "putting in the hill," should be discouraged, as then the roots may not run so far as they sometimes must in dry seasons, or even in seasons when there is plenty of moisture. (The exception is white potatoes, where the fertilizer is always put under the seed pieces. Potato roots tend not to run far, any-

For the leafy crops, side-dressings of poultry manure or some chemical nitrogen, as nitrate of soda or ammonium nitrate, should be given, one pound to 100 feet of row.
