
Judge Hill, a few days ago, decided the suit of Rebecca Ellis, court reporter, vs. Floyd county, holding that the county should pay her \$150 a month. The fiscal cour previously had set her salary at \$75 a month.

Wednesday afternoon, the court decided to ask the Court of Appeals to reverse Judge Hill's decision in the case.

County Judge Henry Stumbo said neighboring countles had not yet set a definite amount for their court reporters' salaries, although Johnson county tentatively had agreed on \$100 a month. He indicated Floyd county might have agreed on that figure. "The court reporter is paid \$15



#### Filing Delay May Cost Some Workers Social Security Pay

Many retired workers, their families, or dependent survivors may lose some of their social security benefit payments, says Thomas Thompson of the Pikeville social security office because of delay in

filing or refiling a claim. He will be in Prestonsburg each Thursday morning and urges every retired person over 65 not now receiving benefit payments, but who has worked for at least a year and a half in a job covered by social security to call on him at the State Employment office in the Midland Building. If the worker died after a year and a half of such employment, his widow or other depend-

ent should see Mr. Thompson. The revised law provides for six instead of three months retroactive payments. Payments cannot be made, however, for months prior to September 1950. If a retired worker who was 65 or over on that date qualifies for old-age benefit payments this March, he will get six months in back payments. If he delays filing his claim until after March, he will lose his September

1950 benefit. Retired workers or survivors whose claims were disallowed when filed before last September, should file new claims promptly. As Mr. Thompson points out, in many instances, the new law makes it possible to allow refiled claims. The six months restriction on back payments is inflexible, however, so he urges all such people in the Prestonsburg area to get in touch with him at the State Employment office in Prestonsburg on any Thursday morning.







in the Louisville Invitational. For the state tournamen Copper" John Campbell's Wasps drew into the tougher, upper bracket along with Clark County, the favorites, Manual, Owensboro, et al. But the team apparently has regained the final edge it attained, earlier in the season, and will have a large following in the stands at Memorial Coliseum, Lexington, when it meets Lyon County, "Eck" Branham's old team, at 10:45 this morning.

The Martin Purple Flash, which had the state's best won-lost record for the year was a weary, banged up team when it met a rangy, speedy Inez five last Friday evening. Inez won, 75 to 54, and many doubted the ability of Wayland to defeat the Martin county five.

But, playing with only one subst itution, the Wasps came through with a last-quarter drive which downed Inez, 69 to 61, in a game which was closer than the score in

Although it got off behind, Way land led most of the game. But i had to regain the advantage twice in a vicious third quarter.

It was a taller, clever Inez tear that Wayland conquered.

The defensive board-work and the driving and shooting, of forward Paul Hopper, who came up with 14 points, were the major facts in the Wasps' win Fred Fraley and Bill Griffith aided with 21 and 14 points

Opening with a hard-driving game and an aggressive defense, Inez imped into a 6-2 lead.

"In such critical periods petroleum must fill a vast need for aviation gasoline, jet fuel, diesel oil, heating oil, and chemicals. Each of these products becomes increasingly vital during a war and important competing needs clamor to be supplied. While the demands for coal also increase, these can be supplied from the vast resources of the United States alone. During World War II, coal production rose from about 500 million tons per year to a maximum of about 650 million tons. This or a greater expansion can be achieved again when it becomes necessary.

"The building of hydrogen plants is the first step to allow coal, the largest fuel reserve in the United States, to begin to carry some of the heavy demands for liquid



#### VA Making Direct Loans To Veterans at 4 Percent

Under a recent act of Congres the Veterans Administration is authorized to make a loan directly to an eligible veteran of World War II under the following circum-

stances and conditions: The loan does not exceed \$10,000.00; is made before June 30, 1951; and is used for the purchase or construction of a home, or for the construction or improvement of a farmhouse, and,

2. The home or farmhouse is located in one of the counties designated as an area in which direct loans may be made, and,

3. The veteran is unable to obtain from a bank or other private lender a loan for such purposes at 4 percent interest, and,

4. The veteran has not previously obtained a VA guaranteed or insured loan; is a satisfactory credit risk; makes a cash down payment on the purchase price in the amount required by recent credit restrictions; and is eligible in all other respects for such a loan.



## SPORTS AFIELD

Sometimes even the most experienced sportsmen run out of supplies before getting back to their base. So Paul Johnson has planned an emergency kit that weighs only 1 3-4 pounds and can be carried in your hunting coat pocket. This will supply sufficient nourishment

and shelter for a three-day trip. that measres 5 x 31/2 x 21/2 inches, This is a standard size tin and is easy to find.
