During the past year, \$489,188 vent to residents of Floyd county in public assistance payments, according to a year-end report released Sunday by Vego Barnes, commissioner, Department of Economic Se-

Under the public assistance program, three types of aid are administered: Old age assistance, aid to needy blind, and aid to dependent children. Total 1951 payments in Floyd county were distributed among the three types of recipients as follows: \$237,397 to aged people; \$236,149 to dependent children; and

5-Year Plan Envisions \$1,312,500 Expenditure Outside Rural Roads

Construction projects costing approximately \$1,312,500 are scheduled for Highways KY. 80 and U.S. 23 in Floyd county in a proposed five-year program announced by State High way Commissioner W. P. Curlin.

Projects proposed in Floyd county

KY. 80-Lackey-Allen road, revision at Maytown, bridge over Beaver Creek and C. & O. railroad. mile, relocation, grade, drain, and the south city limits of Martin, re Surviving brothers and sisters are surfacing and widening, 2.7 miles miles, widening, \$90,000.

U.S. 23 - Prestonsburg-Pikeville road, from east city limits of Pres tonsburg to the Pike county line 19.7 miles, widen, revise alignmen where practical, and resurface \$775,000. Prestonsburg - Paintsville road, from north city limits of Prestonsburg to the Johnson county line 6.1 miles, widen, revise alignment where practical, and resurface \$250,000.

The program, affecting more than tucky, would cost an estimated \$42. 000,000. All projects are in the primary road system and are to be financed on a fifty-fifty basis by the state and Federal Bureau of Public Roads. The program does not in-

clude rural road construction which is financed by a separate fund. Curlin said the plan is the most far-reaching in the history of the Department of Highways. He said the proposal has been under study by state and federal engineers for the last year and its purpose is to

provide systematic improvement of the state's key highways. Included in the program are new resurfacing, and bridge construction. All projects are subject to restrictions on steel by the Defense Pro-

duction Administration. Pike county is scheduled to benework under this program.

Pigures released in conne with the suit filed at the behin the Kentucky Chamber of Commerc to force the state to distribute the common school fund on the basis of attendance rather than on th school census disclosed that school attendance in Floyd county is above the state average of 70 per cent of those listed in the census and, too, that this county is high among seven Eastern Kentucky counties listed as examples of nonattendance The state average of attendance

onsburg, was solemnized, Dec. 29, tendance average for last year was 72.5 per cent, with a census total of 15.088 and 10.942 of these in school

Floyd, Bell, Breathitt, Harlan, Letcher, Perry and Pike were listed as examples in a Courier-Journal story of the court action, because few Catholics live in these counties and few children attend parochial schools here.

With 23,654 children in the school census and 17,017 of these attending school last year, Pike county' attendance percentage stood at 71.9

In counties such as Campbel Kenton, Jefferson and Nelso where a large part of the scho population attends parochial school the percentage of public school a tendance in relation to those in th census was lower even than in East ern Kentucky counties. These coun ties, however, are paid on the basis of the census, as are all others.

FLOYD MEETS US STANDARD

(Special to The Times) NEW YORK, Jan. 9 county is one of a limited number of communities in the United States which have sanitation regulations for public eating and drinking establishments that meet official Government standards This was revealed by the U. S.

Public Health Service in a study of the progress made in restaurant sanitation in recent years. Ordinances and other regulations

meeting federal standards are now in effect in but 675 municipalities and 346 counties across the country. This, however, represents considerable advance since 1946 when the tabulation was made. The number of people under protection then was only half what it is now. The government's model ordinance

was developed as an aid in protecting citizens from food-borne diseases emanating from public dining and drinking places. It provides for the purity of edibles and beverages sold their proper storage and handling and for the cleanliness of utensils and equipment.

In addition to Floyd county there are only 25 municipalities and 31 counties in the State of Kentucky that have adopted these federal sanitary standards, the survey

"We know a good deal about food-borne diseases and how to prevent them but this knowledge has to be translated into practical programs," stated a spokesman for the government bureau. "The actual regulation of eating and drinking establishments is, of course, a matter for the States, counties and municipalities, and they, in turn, need the whole-hearted cooperation of the restaurant operators and others concerned."

The sanitation ordinance has been in effect in Floyd county since 1946, when the county adopted it.
