

Henry was charged with robbing D. C. Stephens, Prestonsburg dental laboratory owner, of \$30,000, last January at the point of a gun.

The break in the case came after Thursday and a part of Friday morning had been consumed in attempts to select a jury and after eight men had tentatively been acceped for the panel. The regular panel had been exhausted, and 80 additional veireman had been summoned for Friday morning. The first motion, made in cham-

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OF THE

COUNTY TREASURER

The Duties of the County Treasurer as Described By the Kentucky Statutes, are as follows:

The county treasurer shall receive and receipt for all money due the county from its collecting officers or from any other person whose duty it is to pay money into the county treasury, and shall hold such money subject to the order of the fiscal court. He shall not disburse any money received by him for any purpose other than that for which it was collected and paid over to him, and when he pays out money he shall take a receipt therefor.

He may, and when directed by the fiscal court shall, institute actions in the name of the county against all delinquent sheriffs or collectors of the county, and against any one having money belonging to the county who fails or refuses to pay it over on demand when due. He shall keep a record of all actions he is directed to institute on behalf of the county, showing their condition and the money collected thereunder.

He shall keep an acurate detailed account of all money received and disbursed by him for the county, and shall keep books of accounts of the financial transactions of the county in the manner required by any uniform system of accounting prescribed by the Department of Revenue.

. He shall keep his office at the county seat, in a room or rooms provided by the fiscal court. He shall keep his office open for the collection of money at all reasonable times, except on Sundays and legal holidays.

5. The county treasurer shall, when required by the fiscal court, settle his accounts as county treasurer, and, at each regular April term of the fiscal court held after his appointment, on a day in the term fixed by the fiscal court, he shall make a full and complete settlement for the preceding year, with the fiscal court or with a person or person whom the fiscal court, by order of record, appoints to make settlement with him. In case of a vacancy the county Judge shall call a special term which shall proceed in the manner it deems proper to settle the accounts of the county treasurer.

In Floyd county the salary of the county treasurer shall not be more than \$2,000.00 per year.

Falke, Pittsburgh, Pa., area medical director for the Welfare Fund, U.M.W.A., said free trips to the dentist will be financed only in the case of severely disabled persons who qualify for treatment in special rehabilitation centers.

The physician said the fund had been too hard hit by applicants for dental aid. He also reported the fund has shut off payments for removal of tonsils and adenoids.

Although the fund is reported to have more than \$100,000,000 in the treasury, it went into the red to the tune of \$1,500,000 last month. The fund comes from royalties of 30 cents which coal oprators pay on every ton of coal mined

February 14, 1797 he was the grantee of 200 acres of land on the Little Branch of New River The consideration was 100 pounds indicating that it was of good qaulity. Here to this transaction he signs his name Godcy Augustine Jean Schmidt Baisden.

There were several children to this union. One son, Joseph married Lucinda Osborne, of Floyd county. Perhaps it was this marriage of his son to a Floyd countian that caused his removal from the mouth of Laurel creek in the present Logan county, West Virginia, to the Big Sandy.

The researchers Livingstons wondered why Baisden emigrated from New River to the mouth of Laurel creek in southwest Virginia. The answer seems to be that he, in common with innumerable other western migrants were feeling their way towards the setting sun the best way they knew. Another consideration was the lurking savage. Although General "Mad" Anthony Wayne had destroyed the power of the Indian at Fallen Timbers in 1795, yet nests of renegade Indians roamed or camped in the Allehenny mountains. So Baisden came to Laurel creek. Here after a few years and the rearing of a family he moved to Big Sandy. He left a numerous progeny in the present Logan county.

J. E. Akers, of Dwale, contributes some information on the Akers family. Little research has been done on the family but a wealth of data seems to be dormant awaiting recovery. This family was one of the earliest in Floyd. They came with the Mead family and settled on Big Mud Creek.

One of the early Akers was Thom. as Blackburn Akers. The name has been copiled Thomas Blagburn which is an incorrect rendering of the old goose quill penmanship. Thomas married Kisiah Mead, April 24, 1823, daughter of Samuel Mead. of Bedford county, Virginia. This Samuel Mead, if a digression is allowed, married Katy Goodbeard about 1789, in Bedford county. They moved to Big Sandy, in the presen Floyd county, near the turn of the nineteenth century. Some writers have it as 1794 but this column is convinced this is at least five years too early. The date was nearer 1801. Anyway Samuel was one of Floyd county's very earliest settlers.

Jonathan and Solomon Akers were two other early Akers. They were probably brothers, and brothers, too, of Thomas Blackburn Akers, although we have no proof except that the ages correspond to that assumption.

Jonathan married Kitty Mead May 19, 1812. Kitty was the daughter of Robert Mead, the settler of 1801 at the mouth of Big Mud creek. Another daughter of Robert


