#### ABC Board Discloses 4-Year Activity Gain

Frankfort, Ky., June 1 (Spl.) Chairman Guy C. Shearer of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board today reported that there have been convictions of 144 licensees on charges of permitting gambling on licensed whiskey and beer premises during the last four-year period with two such convictions for the preceding four-year term.

Shearer disclosed a heavy increase in the volume of business before the ABC Board-which regulates the liquor and beer traffic in Kentuckywith 880 cases being tried during the period, compared with 549 for the precedingterm.

In addition, he pointed out that 605 convictions have resulted in the last four years, compared with 293 in the comparable period-while still seizures also increased tremendous ly during that period.
