# IS UNFOUNDED

Officials Explain Tests Made at Dewey Lake To Determine Fish Supply

Local officers of the Division of Same & Fish scoffed at rumors circulated this week to the effect that plans to poison Dewey Lake to rid it of an over-supply of rough fish

Biologists from the Division at Frankfort simply are making the same study made last year, by the same method of poisoning a small area," E. R. Burke, supervisor of the Seventh conservation distritct, explained.

Half a dozen men from the Frankort office, assisted by Conservation Officer Raymond Copley, treated the Goble Branch area with rotenone. Tuesday morning. Next month, a spot in the upper part of the lake will be similarly treated. Fish thus poisoned are counted, weighed and measured and the various species noted. Thus biologists arrive at trucks, two centrifugal mine pumps definite conclusions as to control and restocking needs.

A complete and official report on heir findings is expected for publication within the next few days.
