School districts in Floyd county will receive \$257,017.34 of the \$5,-573,000 equalization fund to be distributed last year for educational purposes, it was announced last week by Superintendest of Public Instruction Wendell P. Butler.

The equalization fund-a supplement to the common school fund-is distributed on a basis of need to school districts in the state any may be spent either for teacher salaries or other educational purposes approved by the school authorities. The \$26,212,500 common school fund is distributed on a census basis and nust be spent for teacher salaries.
