Of County Officials Over Minimum Period To Cover Five Years

The fiscal court at its meeting Friday rescinded its order author izing the County Judge to employ an auditor to make an accounting of county officials' pay over a period of years and then, acting as a group accepted the proposal submitted by the William Cotton Company, Louisville accountant firm, to audit the

The Louisville firm's offer was to audit the offices at a fee ranging from \$1,000 to \$1,250 for each year covered by the audit. This was ex plained as a proposal to audit all of the offices for a period, say, of five years for a fee which would be at least \$5,000 or at most \$6,250. The offer was considered the best sub mitted, one or two others asking fee of \$50 a day, plus expenses, for the time covered by the audit. This type of proposal was not considered definite enough for the court to arrive at any definite figure of the cost an audit would entail.

The ruffed grouse season also was extended but the bag and possession limit left at two and four. Last year the season on this species opened on Nov. 20 and extends through January 18. The season for trapping furbearers, raccoon, opossum, mink, muskrat, skunk and red fox, also was unchanged. The season was set to open on Nov. 20 and extend through January 18.

> It would require volumes to detail the story of the descendants of Adam Herman. His son Mathias built the first settlement on the Big Sandy when he erected Harman's Station at Blockhouse Bottom, near the mouth of Johns Creek. The descendants of Mathias were prominent in the coal development on the headwaters of Tug River, In Tazewell and near the ancestral seat of the family they were prominent. Other Harmans emigrated westward and helped build new lands as their forefathers had built Southwest Virginia and Eastern Kentucky.

> Daniel Harman, Sr., is the ancestor of the Eastern Kentucky branch. He was a son of Adam and Louisa, born in Pennsylvania, as stated. He was present when his father and his uncle (or brother) Jacob when the fight occurred on Tug River and Draper and McGary were killed. He was present when his brother Valentine was killed by the Indians in 1757. He stated afterwards that he was standing within one foot of Valentine when he was killed. Daniel was taken prisoner but escaped.

Daniel married Anna Bughsen in Rowan county, North Carolina. He lived there until 1773 when he moved back to Virginia, settling on the Clinch. He made a trip with Peter Harman down the Sandy in 1777. While on this trip they were attacked by a band of 40 Indians but escaped. He died either in late 1819, or early in January, 1820, and his will was probated in Tazewell coun-
