#### LIST OF IDLE IN FLOYD-CO. IS SHRINKING

#### Pick-Up of Mine Work, Shift of Population Arc Seen As Causes

Unemployment in Floyd county has nad a pleasing drop, Glenn S Anderson, head of the Kentucky Emplofment Service office here noted this week.

The claim load has dropped from a peak of approximately 1,300 persons six weeks ago to less than 600 as of this week.

Instances of the employment climb are found in empty file boxes at the Employment Service office, A ew weeks ago, the community of Hi Hat had 16 file boxes averaging 50 cards to the box filled; now there are only two full boxes. Wayland's unemployed had eight file boxes filled; now three serve that community. Prestonsburg had a peak unemployment list of around 500. That

figure has dropped to 300. The claim-load in Johnson coun ty also is down 100 from a peak of 300. The four counties served by the Prestonsburg office-Floyd, Johnson Magoffin and Martin-had approximately 2,000 unemployed six weeks ago, it was said.

The climb in employment is laid in part, to increased activity of coal mines as stockpiling against possibility of a strike has kept them busy. Then, too, some of this county's unemployed have gone elsewhere to work. At least 150 persons, Mr Anderson said, have gone to other states within the last month to work n canning plants, but few if any miners are in that group.

West Kentucky's coal is no more valuable than that of this section. Indeed, Fastern Kentucky produces a quality of coal which cannot be matched. Here lie vast, undeveloped deposits of fine domestic and metallurgical coal without which the nation would sorely suffer in time of emergency. In addition to all that, the timber products of this section and its agricultural potential are matters which the Corps of Engineers have little consid-

The Big Sandy pours its huge floodtime volume into the Ohio, just as does the Green. Its soil is wasting away through erosion, even as is that of the Green River valley, although strip-mining has not yet been a causative factor here as along the Green. Nowhere is soil conservation and reforestation needed more than here.

We mention these facts to point to the Corps of Engineers, Senator Clements, et al, the needs of another part of Kentucky—a part of the Commonwealth whose future, we are convinced, is more firmly linked to river transportation than that section which last Saturday was given the bright hope of an early solution.
