SUMMARY

Garbage collections amounting to \$7,034.00 were promptly paid to the City of Prestonsburg. The receipts and disbursements of this account are omitted from the Gas System audit report due to the fact that such collections are for the benefit of the City of Prestonsburg and no part accrues to the Gas System.
