An accounting of Judge Stumbo's salaries and fees paid to him by the county in excess of the rate of pay set by the court at its April, 1949 meeting.

2. A judgment against the defendants, jointly and severally, for any sums which may appear to be due after this accounting is had.

3. The Floyd circuit court to restrain the fiscal court from paying any further salary or compensation





Reports from throughout the state, the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources claims, indicate that hunting for both rabbits and quail generally throughout the state should be better than for the last season. In many sections great increases in the supply of rabbits and birds are claimed, while in other areas it is reported that the populations are just about the same as for last season.

The ruffed grouse hunting season also opens today, as well as hunting with dogs and guns for furbearing animals. The trapping season, beginning at the same time, continues through Jan. 18.
